## THE MARCH BLIZZARD.

An Inept Repetition of That or Signs Years Ago.

NEW YORK, March 12.—The snow storm yesterday was general throughout this state, New Jersey and a portion of New England. At Newburgh, N. Y., the most severe storm since the blizzard of March 12, 1888, raged last night. The gale was from the northeast, and snow fell from noon until early this morning. All trains are late. The country roads are blocked and the trolley cars have been stopped on account of snow drifts.

At Middletown the wind is blowing a hurricane and the snow is drifting badly. Street cars have stopped and the trains are all delayed. Indications are favorable for a blizzard similar to that of 1888. Synoptical reports a heavy snow storm accompanied by heavy wind. The storm last night increased to a blizzard.

At Kingston, N. Y., the blizzard began early yesterday morning with a strong northeast wind, which developed into a violent gale in the afternoon. Snow began about noon, increasing toward night. It is impossible now to see or to stand in the streets, and business is suspended. The mercury is at 25, and is falling rapidly. The snow is drifting badly. Trains are delayed and ferries up the river are blocked.

## Will be a Total Loss.

NOYBPORT, L. I., March 12.—Captain Charles Bates, of the schooner Mary Bates, bound from Sag Harbor for New York in ballast, lost his way in the blinding snow storm, and ran his vessel ashore at Katon's Neck. The crew consisted of five men, including the captain. Two sailors were drowned in trying to reach shore. The schooner will be a total loss.

Steam Railroad Trains Moving, But Electric Roads Stalled.

The snow storm that started so unexpectedly yesterday afternoon sprang the wheels of many avenues of business, but not to an extent that the storm of about thirteen months ago did. All the steam railroad lines are in operation and no trains failed to get through, although several mild obstructions by arriving from thirty to forty-five minutes late.

The electric railways were less fortunate. The tracks were buried last night and no cars were run into town to-day up to noon.

At noon to-day the Lakeside Electric Railway Company succeeded in getting its track clear from Mahanoy City to Indian Ridge colliery, but two cars were required to make a trip one way.

Supervisor Llewellyn was out early this morning with a gang of men who were put to work making passage ways through the drifts at street crossings and to this activity the people were indebted to-day for a reduction of inconvenience in many parts of the town.

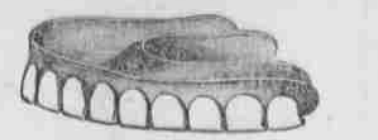
