Singular Blunder of Two Detachments of Spanish Troops.

MISTOOK BACH OTHER FOR ENEMIES

Before the Error Was Discovered a Dozen of the Soldiers Were Killed and a Score Wounded-Insurgents Capture the Town of Batabano and Apply the Torch,

Havaya, March 10.—A deplorable mis-take has resulted in the killing of a num-ber of Spanish soldiers by their fellow Spaniards. The batcallon of San Quintin was approaching the town of Cano, seven miles from Hayana, to save the buildings of a burning plantation. The town shortly before that had been attacked by the in-surgents, and the garrison, without halling the San Quintin battalion, and taking them for the insurgents returned for a second attack, opened upon them with a

The San Quintin battalion, on the other hand, mistook the garrison for insurgents, and charged three times with great determination, taking the town. The blasts from the corner and the cries of "Viva Espana" on the part of the San Quintin soldiers were not sufficient to put a stop to the firing on either side. Before the mistake was discovered the San Quintin battalion had lost twelve soldiers killed and a captain, four lientenants and twenty-seven soldiers wounded.

Antonio Maceo, Quivican, Bandera and Lacrot attacked the town of Batabano on Friday night, and an obstinate fight en-sued. The garrison of the forts, consist-ing of fifty-six men, made a heroic defense, and two Spanish gunboats in the neighboring waters assisted by bombarding the insurgents. The atmost efforts of the Spaniards, however, did not avail to prespanarus, nowever, du not avan to pre-vent the insurgents capturing the town. They had possession of it for a time, and upon retreating in the direction of Pinar del Blo they burned the greater part of the town. The insurgents are reported to have sustained a great loss.

Colonel Figueredo with two squadrons, Pizarro, a guerilla, and the battalion of Valencia overtook the band of Panche Perez, numbering 500, at the Palmas plau-tation, near Desembana, Matanzas, and, opening fire, they charged. The insurgents took to flight, leaving six killed. They were pursued and were overtaken again at Mount Flora, and after making further resistance they again retreated, leaving

three killed, Enrique Machado, a former insurgent leader in the last war, and an officer of the Santa Clara municipality, has joined the

insurgents with six others.

It was the murder of a nighly respectable young girl, Miss Mary Mansell, by Thomas Pelkinton, a farm hand. Pelkinton, immediately after the murder, and with the same weapon with which he committed the murder, took his own life. The young woman received two builets in the head, one entering the brain. Miss Mansell has for two years been em-ployed at the farm house of Edward Mynderse, about a mile north of this village, and Pelkinton had been very attentive, al-though the young lady had many times given him to understand that these attentions were distasteful to her.

THE SOUDAN CAMPAIGN

The Rev. F. I. Rell, a highly externed. The Powers Sanction the British Advance on Dongola.

NOUNDERSTANDING WITH FRANCE

The Latter Nation Unafterably Opposed to the British Campaign, Beclaring That No. Movement in the Sondan Warrants Such a Campaign at This Time.

LONDON, March 13. — The Associated Press is able to state in connection with the respected Egyptian question that the British government consulted and ob-tained the approval of a majority of the powers before deciding upon the advance on Dongola. This makes the new Soudan campaign of far reaching political impor-tance in its bearing upon Great Britain's

relations with the European powers.

That the disclosures by recent events of Great Britain's complete and friendless isolation in the community of nations has given a shock and a feeling of uncasiness to the responsible statesmanship of Great Britain has been frankly admitted by Britfood whether the stomach works or not.

When the terms of the settlement of the dispute over the boundaries between the possessions on the Mekong, in Indo China, of Great Britain and France were made known the world expressed its wonder at the substantial concessions made by Great Britain, and the opinion was generally held that Great Britain sought to secure an entente with France as a consideration for these concessions. Many commenta-tors professed to see confirmation of this opinion in the suggestion offered by the sultan a little later to Lord Salisbury that England should regularize the situation in Egypt. It was suggested that the sul-tan's suggestion was inspired by Great Britain itself, in order to open up a course for the evacuation of Egypt, thus remov ing the principal cause of irritation be-tween Great Britain and France.

The annoueement of the new Soudan campaign is clear and convincing evidence that there is to be no reapproachment be-tween Great Britain and France. If further evidence were needed of this it was seen in the prolonged visit on Friday to the foreign office of Baron De Courcel, the French ambassador in London, and his subsequent departure in person for Paris to impart the result of his interview to the French cobinet.

Corroboration of France's opposition to the proposed Soudan campaign is found in a dispatch from Cairo maining as the explicit grounds of her opposition that no movement in the Soudan exists that warrants such a campaign, and that the Kha-lifa Abdullahi, the successor of the late Mahdi, Mohammed Ahmed, and military chief under him in the former war, has lost all his authority, and has withdrawn his loyal adhorents from the Cassala dis-

The advance upon Dongola was decided upon by the British government with a view to the favorable effect it would have upon the Italian situation in Abyssinia. as was stated by The Times, the organ of the British cabinet, in connection with its announcement of the Soudan campaign.

Almost simultaneously with this ar nouncement comes the news of the visit of Count Goluchowski, the Austro-Hunga-rian prime minister, to Berlin, and the statement that as a result the dreibund is to remain intact, and that the German government's irritable attitude towards Great Britain, as manifested over the Transvaal episode, has been mollified through the exertions of Count Goluch-


