John J. Murphy Dead.

The announcement of the death of John J. Murphy, of Pottsville, following so closely upon the statement appearing in yesterday's HERALD of his serious illness, was not unexpected. Nevertheless it caused much sorrow among his wide circle of friends.

Six months ago Mr. Murphy was appointed Deputy Internal Revenue Collector, and held the position at the time of his death. He was 48 years of age, and taught school at Dunauville for a number of years, which he relinquished to accept a position as reporter on the Pottsville Republican and later on the Chronicle. Mr. Murphy was married twice. By his first wife he had two sons, now nearing manhood. His second wife is the daughter of Francis Altstadt, and she with five children survive him. The sympathy of the whole community is extended to this interesting family in their sad bereavement. The funeral will take place at Pottsville at 9 o'clock on Friday morning.

Telephone in the Mines.

Baird Halberstadt, special representative in this district, furnishes the Colliery Engineer with the following interesting article: "The great value of the telephone in mining operation was demonstrated at the fire which recently occurred at the Packer No. 4 colliery in the workings on the 5th lift. The fire broke out at night and in a few moments after its discovery, a connection was made to a grounded circuit outside and communication established between the superintendent's office at Lost Creek, 11 miles distant, and a point within 200 feet of the fire. The length of the underground line was over 1,800 feet. So efficient was this service that orders were issued to place telephones in all of the company's mines. The Primrose colliery, near Mahanoy City, is now being equipped with a telephone system, which, when completed, will enable communication to be carried out, not only with the colliery office on the surface, but also with the office of Superintendent John A. Grant at Lost Creek, and the office of General Superintendent Lathrop at Wilkesbarre."
