

Telephone in the Mines.

Baird Halberstadt, special representative in this district, furnishes the Colliery Engi-neer with the following interesting article : "The great value of the telephone in mining operation was demonstrated at the fire which recently occurred at the Packer No. 4 col-liery in the workings on the 5th lift. The fire broke out at night and in a few moments after its discovery, a connection was made to a grounded circuit outside and communica-tion established between the superintendent's office at Lost Creek, 1] miles distant, and a point within 200 feet of the fire. The length of the underground line was over 1,800 feet. So efficient was this service that orders were issued to place telephones in all of the com-pany's mines. The Primrose colliery, near Mahanoy City, is now being equipped with a telephone system, which, when completed, will enable communication to be carried ou not only with the colliery office on the sur face, but also with the office of Superinten-dent John A. Grant at Lost Creek, and the
