



House Discussing the Resolutions to Rebuke Our Ambassador.

VEST AGAIN ASSAILS CLEVELAND.

The Missouri Senator Denounces the President's Home Mission Speech and Declares That Executive "Trampling Upon the Laws of Congress Demands Immediate Attention.4

WASHINGTON, March 10.—The house yes Washington, March 10.—The house yesterlay entered upon the consideration of the resolutions consuring Mr. Bayard for speeches delivered by him before the grammar school at Boston, England, and before the Edinburgh (Scalland) Philosophical Institution test full. The galleries were crowded to overflowing. Even the diplomatic gallery, which is usually empty, contained a number of the members of the diplomatic corps and their wives. With the exception of the speech of Mr. Consins, of Iowa, however, the oratory of the occasion was disappointing. Mr. Hitt, chairman of the foreign at

oratory of the occasion was disappointing.

Mr. Hitt, chairman of the foreign affairs committee, and Mr. McCreary, who was chairman of the committee in the last congress, opened respectively for and against the resolutions. Mr. Draper, of Massachusetts, announced his inability to bring himself to vote for the resolutions of censure. If the utterances were imappropriate the puntalment was too harsh. Mr. Cousins' speech in support of the resolutions was the feature of the proceedings. He won for himself high distinction as an orator. His bursts of eloquence, set off by a keen and penetrating wit, aroused the house and the galleries to unbounded enthusiasm.

bounded enthusiasm,
Mr. Dinsmore, of Arkansas, who was minister to Korea during the former ad-ministration of President Cleveland, In closing the debate for the day, defended the utterances of Mr. Bayard as to the effect of protection, and to the great de-light of the Democrats read extracts from Senator Chandler's interview alleging that the McKinley boomers were lovying on the protected industries.

The senate was disturbed by an unex-pected storm of sarcasm and invective from Senator Vest, of Missouri, directed against the president and members of the cabinet. A comparatively minor measure was under consideration, relating to the failure of the secretary of the interior to execute the law for the opening of an In-dian reservation in Utah. This led to some sharp criticism, and finally brought Mr. Vest to his feet for a speech bristling with caustic personal references to the

president. The senator spoke of Mr. Cleveland's re-cent speech in New York, where, said Mr. Vest, "he stood with the ghastly light of the hell holes and the rum sellers of New York blazing upon him, and cantingly said home missions must be used to civil ize and christianize the west." At another point the senator declared that if our president would pause in hunting ducks in South Carolina and silver Democrats in Kentucky long enough to go west he would find a God fearing, self reliant people. Mr. Vest's remarks came with such flery enthusiasm, such picturesque-ness of language and such unctious humor that senators and spectators joined in fre-quent and long continued bursts of laugh-ter. Mr. Vest concluded as follows:

"Our people are worthy the respect of any administration. I do not rise for the any administration. I do not rise for the purpose of again criticizing this adminis-tration. I rose to say most emphatically that this habit of secretaries or members of the cabinet deliberately trampling upon the laws of congress and refusing to carry them out has gone to an extent that demands immediate notice at the hands of the legislative department of the govern-

There was another loud and long dem-onstration on the floor and in the galleries as Mr. Vest closed, and it was increased to a storm of laughter by the announce-ment from the vice president, "The senator from Missouri will suspend while the chair receives a message from the presi-dent of the United States."

Mr. Pruden, of the White House staff,

had stepped forward with the message in hand, but the laughter was so great that he was unable for some time to make the usual announcement. In some confusion the message was finally announced, and then, to add another sting, Mr. Vest rose and said, "I would be very glad if the pre-siding officer of the body would examine that message and see if it is in response to anything that has occurred here today."

York's Mayoralty Contest.

YORK, Pa., March 19.-The proposed contest of the election of Charles W. Brant, as mayor, and George W. Leucks, as treasurer of this city, last February, came to a head yesterday when a petition alleging the illegal voting of eighty-one ballots for them was filed before Judge Stewart by seventy-five Republican petitioners. If the contention of the petitioners is sustained it will elect R. J. Lewis by fifty-three and F. G. Metsgar by thirtynine majority. April 13 was set for the

Collector Houck's Removal.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 19.—The news of the appointment of George P. Decker to be collector of the port of Genessee, to succeed Collector George B. Houck, whose term of office has not half expired, created considerable excitement in political circles here. Some time ago an agent of the treas ury department was sent to Rochester to investigate charges affecting Houck's management of the office, and it is under-stood that the president found cause sufficient to justify Houck's removal.

Governor Bradley Hung in Effigy. DANVILLE, Ky., March 19.-Governor Bradley was hung in effigy in Danville Tuesday night. The perpetrators of the deed are unknown, and it is impossible to identify them. The figure was very skillfully made up, and was topped by the fa-mous white hat which the governor always wears. Across the breast on a card were written the words "Riot Alarm Brad-

France also in-tended unequivocally to intimate that she did not intend to icnore the matter. "But this in no wise implies a hostile attitude. On the contrary, they think that, in view of the mutual friendly rela-

tions, frank and outspoken language will contribute to the removal of misunder-

"The interview between M. Berthelot and the Marquis of Dufferin was of the friendliest character. It was pointed out that it was incumbent upon the guardians of the Egyptian fund to ascertain the necessity for an action entailing large outlays, and that it was preferable that the attitude to be taken should be defined at the outset, instead of being left in doubt."

Despite the government's statement, the serious impression produced by M. Borthelot's statement continues, and it has been brought home to the government that the words of the minister for foreign affairs were of unusual import. It would seem, however, that the desibund has practically triumphed, and that there will be no ser-ious opposition upon the part of France to the British advance up the Nile.

The Egyptian Battation Off for the Front. CAIRO, March 19. - The khedive yesterday witnessed the departure of the Egyptian battalion for the front. He bade a cordial farewell to the officers of the battalion. The reserves are arriving at Cairo and the new Soudanese battalions are forming. Colonel Hunter, with a strong advance guard, will proceed immediately at Akasheh, which will be strongly fortified. The Arab Anglophobe press violently attack the expedition, and accuse Lord Salisbury and Mr. Curzon, who made the statement of the purposes of the expedition in the house of commons, of falsehoods.

The Italians Evacuate Cassala.

London, March 19.—The Times says:
"A rumor was current in London last
evening that the Italians had evacuated Cassala on Saturday. We believe the re-port is correct. The evacuation of Cassals will entirely alter the whole situation for Italy, and it is only too likely to react for Italy, and it is only too likely to react seriously upon the position in Egypt. If the Cassala news be true," The Times goes on to say, "the enemy will probably earry the war into the territory still held by the Italians. Under these circum-stances any help rendered to Italy will be doubly welcome to Germany and Austria."

London, March 19.—A Paris dispach to the Daily Telegraph says: "The fact must be patent to all that the government has not played its cards very eleverly, because, at the moment when England was iso-lated, a false move on the part of France has served to bring England and the dreibund again Into harmony."

Ling Fat May Testify.

WASHINGTON, March 19:- The attorney has rendered an opinion in the case of Chung Ling Fat, a Chinese laundryman of Boston. Some time ago, it is alleged, a countryman of Fat named Joe Tye stole from him several thousand dollars and went to China. Fat also took passage for China in pursuit, but before he could secure his arrest Tye had returned to this country, and on his arrival at Boston was arrested for larceny. Fat, being a laborer, was excluded from returning, even to testify against Tye. The attorney general, however, holds that he may return for the purpose of testifying, but must remain in the continuous custody of an officer while here, and depart from the country as soon as the trial is concluded.

Wisconsin Instructs for McKinley. MILWAUKEE, March 19. - Wisconsin's Republican convention adopted a platform newing their devotion to the doctrines of protection and reciprocity, and favoring the use of silver as currency, but to the extent only and under such restrictions that its parity with gold can be maintained. A resolution was adopted amidst tremendous applause commending the distinguished public services of Will-iam McKinley, and instructing the delegates from Wisconsin to use all reasonable efforts to secure his nomination for the presidency.

May Insist on Six Battleships,

WASHINGTON, March 19.-There is a probability that the question of the num-ber of new battleships to be authorized by this congress, which was passed upon by the naval committee on Tuesday, may be fought over again in the house when the bill comes up. Several of the enthusiasts for the new navy are determined to appeal from the decision of the committee to the house in their efforts to secure six battleships instead of four.
