### FRENCHMEN PROTEST

Against the Use of the Egyptian Fund for England's Advance.

BUT WILL NOT GO TO EXTREMES

In Endeavoring to Obstruct the Nile Expedition-They Deny the Necessity of the Expedition as a Measure of Protection of Egyptian Interests Against the Dervishes

PARIS, March 20.—Egypt continues to be the shief topic of discussion in the lobbies of the chamber of deputies, and the state-ment made by the minister of foreign affeirs, M. Berthelot, adds abundant fresh material for discussion. The general feel-ing is that M. Berthelot's language was moderate and cautions, and it has served to dispel the anxisty of the moderate polito daper the anxiety of the moderate poli-ticians, who were consumed with the fear that France was rushing to an open rup-ture with Great Britain and the drefbund as a result of the semi-official announceconveyed by M. Beethelot to the British

As the situation adjusts itself, and the European balance begin to emerge, it be-nomes more and more evident that France is not prepared to take any extreme measures to avert the Nile campaign. Not that she likes it any better than when it was interests against the dervishes.

They protest that France's interest in the welfare of Egypt is equal to or greater than Great Britain's or the other powers. It is pointedly argued that a large ma jority of all the Egyptian fund holders are French citizens, and that if Egyptian interests were really threatened by the der-vishes France would have as much interest in protecting them as Great Britain. She also, it is argued, has a greater interest in the prevention of the dissipation of the Egyptian surplus in needless expense than has Great Britain.

The only purposes which anyone in France will consent to see in the British plan are, first, an excuse for prolonging indefinitely the hated occupation of Egypt by the British troops, and second, a reo-cupation of the Soudan with the intention of barring the future designs of France for a prosperous colonial expansion on the

upper Nile, M. Berthelot referred yesterday to the dangers which would result from arousing religious fanaticism, not only to Egypt, but which, in the language of the minister of foreign affairs, "might even extend to the possessions of France and other European nations," the precipitation of a holy war of the fanatical Moslem hordes of the Khalifa Abudalla would be viewed with consternation in France. The growth of France's sphere of influence east of Lake Tchad in central Africa has ex-tended over pretty much all the Mahometan states of Baghuiri, Wadai and Darfur. There is the keenest disappointment

felt at Germany's assenting to Great Brit-ain's proposal to expend the Egyptian surplus on the Nile campaign. The German and French colonial projects in central Africa have been conducted on the most friendly terms, and have submitted in common to the grumbling disapproval of Great Britain. The Franco-German agree-ment accords France the unrestricted right ment accords France the unrestricted right to acquire territory to the eastward of her present possessions, even to the point of intervening between British Uganda and the southern Egyptian possessions. Rea-soning from past accord with Germany in central Africa, French statesmen seem to have entertained a hope that Germany would decline to acquiesce in a British project to thwart French plans on the up-per Nile. But the promise of aid to Italy. per Nile. But the promise of aid to Italy, Germany's hard pressed ally, that would extricate her from her unpleasant predic-ament in Abyssinia, seems to have been an inducement that Germany could not

bring herself to decline.

Nevertheless France is not prepared to go to extreme measures in obstructing the Nile expedition. French statesmen are alert to the fact that the Egyptian project is not without its hitter opponents among Englishmen themselves. They are well aware that a large body of influential English statesmen regard the Nile expedition simply as a price paid (a heavy price, they think) for accord with the dreibund.

There is a skepticism felt and expressed here about France's power to prevent the expenditure of the Egyptian budget under the present circumstances. The value of the argument advanced by M. Berthelot in his address to the chamber yesterday, that unanimity of approval among the guaranteeing powers is required to authorize the withdrawal of Egyptian funds is doubted even among Frenchmen. asserted that unanimity is required only when the use to which the funds are to be

put is intended to be permanent. It is also feared that even though the dissent of Russia and France should hold, and the commissioners on the Egyptian debt should not vote the sum required out of the Egyptian surplus, Great Britain would herself supply the money and men and make the whole project a distinctively British instead of Egyptian enterprise occupy the Soudan in her own name in stead of that of Egypt, and enter upon further aggressive action in Africa.

Ridiculing the French Claims. LONDON, March 20.-The Paris corre spondent of The Times ridicules the suggestion made by M. Berthelot, the foreign minister, that a manimity of the Egyptian debt commissioners is necessary to au-thorize an expenditure of Egyptian revenues, "because," he adds, "If this were so any single power could lock up the money and thwart all the other powers. Hesides, if consent were refused, Englishmen control the Egyptian budget, which is elastic enough to provide money for an expedi-

Menelek Anxious for Peace.

ROME, March 20.-A dispatch from Massowah to The Tribuna says that the Negus of Abyssinia, Menelek, is anxious to conclude peace with the Italians and to re-turn to Shoa. Prisoners who have escaped from the Abyssinian camp declare that the prisoners there are ill treated and bally fed, and that numbers of them have been garroted. The dervishes are within an hour of Cassala, the garrison of which has provisions for four months.

mez, Banderas and Maceo are much the best armed of the insurgent forces, other bands having only about 30 per cent. of their number armed. The arrival of Collazo's expedition will be a great boon to the insurgents. A detachment of troops near Cardenas

has captured an expedition bringing arms and ammunition to the insurgents. These were carried to a barracks protected by the gunboat Caridad. Numerous bands of insurgents thereupon attacked the bar-racks. An appeal was sent to Cardenas for aid, and a column has been sent to the relief of the barracks. The result of the affair is not known definitely.

Washington, March 20.—General Wey-ler, in charge of the Spanish military forces in Cuba, has telegraphed to Minis-ter De Lome that he has no intention of resigning, as has been reported. The gen-eral has telegraphed a similar statement to his home government, and has added that, on the contrary, he is satisfied with the progress of military affairs in Cuba.

No traces of his accomplices, if he had any, was discovered.

Morgan Gathers In a Chicago Railway. CHICAGO, March 20.—It was stated to-day on good authority that the much talked of General Electric Street rallway fran-chise in this city has found owners in Messrs J. Pierpont Morgan, H. L. Horton and H. Seward Webb, of New York, and that it is their intention to put the road into operation with as little delay as pos-sible. The General Electric franchise was passed over Mayor Swift's veto Jan. 13, after a bitter fight. The backers of the enterprise have not hitherto been made
