Shoe Factory Fight. A riot occurred yesterday at Landingville resulting from a dispute as to the ownership of the Zuber Shoe Factory at that place, which was sold out about two mouths ago by the Sheriff. J. R. Matthews, of New York city, and Albert Grier, of Philadelphia, two of the heaviest creditions, bought it in, Francis Zuber and the Board of Trade of Landingville claim that through a technicality they still own the property and refused to vacate. Sait was brought to oust Zuber and his party before a Justice of the Peace, who held Zuber under \$300 bail. Zuber immediately brought a similar suit against Moutgomery, who was held under \$1,000 bail. The Montgomery party then senttheir agents to Landingville, who entered the factory, barriended the doors and miled up the windows. The Zuber party hearing of this brought another suit for forcible entry and detainer. Constables who served the warrants were denied admittance. They, assisted by Zuber and about a dozen citizens, \$14,400; Ashland, \$5 assaulted the factory, but were driven back Minersville, \$3,240. with bloodshed, but no serious injury was sustained. After several assaults the factory from licenses, an increase of \$23,585 over last was entered and arrests made, each prisoner being put under heavy ball.
