

ADJOURNED SINE DIE.

The One Hundred and Twentieth New Jersey Legislature.

IMPORTANT WORK OF THE SESSION.

Of the Six Hundred and Sixty-six Bills Introduced About One-Third Passed Both Houses - Constitutional Amendments Which Must Go in Another Legislature.

THESTON, March 27 .- The legislature adjourned sine the shortly after 6 o'clock last night, although 2 o'clock had been fixed as the hour in the resolution provid-ing for final adjournment. Before ading for final adjournment. Before adjourning the house adopted the judiciary constitutional amountments adopted by the senate on Wainesday, and providing for a supreme court of three divisions, appellate, law and equity. The house also adopted the following constitutional amendments: Providing for bionulal es-sions of the legislature; for woman suf-frage at school elections; forbidding gambling in any form; prohibiting the governor appointing ad interim any person whose nomination had been rejected by the senate. These amendments had all been adopted by the senate. The house falled to pass the amendment for the division of counties into assembly districts.

The house adopted a resolution asking congress to extend belligerent rights to Cuba. The usual complimentary resolutions were adopted before adjournment, and Speaker Derousse was presented with a handsome hall clock by his fellow as-

semblymen. a cur The session of the one hundred and only. twentieth legislature had oleven weeks of existence. During that time 600 bills were

Abolishing lay judges of the court of common pleas; putting the clerk in chancery and the suprame court clerk on a salary of \$6,000 each in lieu of fees; track elevation bill; providing for a commission to investigate the question of equal taxation; Palisades park bill; Passale pollution commission bill; codifying the corporation laws of the state; legalizing the government of all boroughs unconstitutionally incomment of all boroughs unconstitution of the properties of the propertie tionally incorporated; repealer of the charter of the West Jersey Game Protec-tive association; bleycle path bill; semi-monthly payment of wages bill; prevent-ing the sale or gift of cigarettes to persons under 16 years of age; prohibiting trolley roads carrying freight; prohibiting men-haden fishing within three miles of the coast without permission of the fish and game wardens; repealing the rebate section of the township law; teachers' retirement fund bill; general deficiency appropriation bills for \$2,478,291 and \$239,077, respectively.

Among the important bills which falled of passage through either one or both

houses are the following:
The anti-trust bill, held up in the senate; jury commission bill; equal taxation bill; marriage license bill; dollar gas and two cent ferriage bills; three cent street car fare bill; township school law repealer; the Harrison and Kearney annexation bill; Erie reorganization bill; bill to allow the United States Pipe Line company to lay its pipes across the state.

LONDON, March 27 .- The Chronicle prints inder reserve a rumor that England has purchased Delagon bay, with the whole strip of territory from Amatonga on the south to the Chartered company's territory on the north, the Limpopo river constituting the eastern boundary, for £5,000,-000 sterling. The Chronicle also has an editorial on this subject which questions the truth of the rumor, and suggests that it is a pilot balloon.

Greater New York Bill Passed, ALBANY, March 27.—Senator Lexow's greater New York bill passed the assembly yesterday by a vote of 91 to 57. The measure now goes to Governor Morton for his approval. The bill unites in one mu-nicipality all of New York, Kings and Richmond counties; part of Westchester county, and Long Island City, Newton, Flushing, Jamaica and part of the town of Hompstead in Queens county.

China's Concession to Russia.

LONDON, March 27.—The Berlin correspondent of The Standard learns from an excellent source in St. Petersburg that China has granted a concession to Russia to build a railroad from Tehita, in the Trans-Baikal district of Siberia, through Manchuria to Port Arthur, "the latter port." says The Standard's correspondent, "being coled to Russia in exchange for certain important concessions
