### THE UNITED MINE WORKERS.

Several New Unions Organized by President Fahy.

President John Fahy re-organized a Local Union of the United Mine Workers at Colorado Monday evening. On Tuesday evening he organized a new Local at Connors and one on Wednesday at Girardville.

Mr. Fahy says that throughout the region the coal workers are taking greater interest in organization than they have for a long time and business men are becoming greatly interested. In many places they are asking that arrangements be made whereby they may be admitted to membership. They do not desire to take part in, or interfere with, differences between the employer and employee, nor to be members of grievance committees, but merely to be members of the organization to such an extent as will bring them closer in touch with its members and thus enable them to move readily and effectively lend their aid and influence, and co-operate with the coal worker in building the organization up to a position of strength and mutual benefit.

The members of the organization are highly pleased with this movement and are anxious that joint meetings between the business men and themselves be called in the several towns in the near future.

### County School Report.

G. W. Weiss, superintendent of Schuylkill county schools, has made his annual report, and says that fourteen school houses have been built during the year by the directors of the following districts: Rythe, Porter and East Union, each two, and Bolter, Cass, Eldred, Foster, Kline, West Pinesgrove, Tower City and Yorkville, each one. He held 23 public examinations, examined 333 applicants, of whom he rejected 143.

### Literary Notes.

The April number of the Forum will have for its leader a noteworthy paper by Senator Sherman entitled, "Deficiency of Revenue the Cause of Our Financial Ills." The Senator contends that the President and Secretary Carlisle mistake the cause of our present financial condition in attributing it to the demand for gold for United States notes, and he thinks that the facts which he submits in his paper will convince every one that the true financial policy is to supply the government with ample means to meet its current expenditures and to pay off each year a portion of the public debt. He certifies that Wilson will very severely, declares that it has produced a deficiency every hour since its enactment, and attributes our financial ills—especially the continued exports of gold—solely to its workings.

### A Probable Murder.

Curtis Cook, of Danville, is in Mt. Carmel searching for evidence of the death of Wesley Bodine, also of Danville, whom Mr. Cook claims was last seen in June, 1885. Bodine was survived by a wife and seven children.

If the widow can prove that her husband is dead she and her children will be entitled to a pension. It seems that Bodine was working in Shenandoah at the time mentioned and was engaged as bricklayer. He left this town on a Saturday evening for Ashland. Rumors that he had been killed reached the ears of his wife but she could get no positive proof of it. Five years ago Mr. Cook started to trace the matter up. He has been in this town various times during that period, he having heard that Bodine was murdered on the Kingtown mountain, near Shenandoah. A few days ago he met a butler named Charles Campbell, who was in 1885 employed in Mt. Carmel, and who stated that he remembered of a man by the name of Bodine dying on a Sunday morning near the Lehigh Valley depot, Mt. Carmel, from injuries received. It is supposed, from highwaymen. Campbell further said that it was generally known in Mt. Carmel at that time that it was Bodine. So far there is no positive proof of the death of Bodine.

### Three Bad Boys.

Warning is given against three boys, one about 14 years of age and the others about 12 years. They have been in the habit of frequenting a Main street restaurant and, although poorly dressed, displayed an abundance of money. Last night the oldest of the boys took a \$5 bill from a large roll and asked for change. The proprietor went next door to get it and on his return found the boy trying to open the cash drawer, which was secured by a combination lock. The boy had already filled his pockets with cigars from a box behind the counter. He paid for them to escape arrest. The names of the boys are not known. It is believed they are conducting a system of robbery. They visit the restaurant frequently, always displaying plenty money and dine on a scale far above the ordinary course to which their stomachs are accustomed.
