The Rising Waters Cause Damage to-Life and Property.

WHOLE FAMILY SWEPT TO DEATH.

Greenville, Miss, Results in the Death of Five Persons and Serious Injuries to

LOUISVILLE, April 2.-Dispatches last anight report an unprecedented rise in the Cumberland river and other southern streams. The rains have swollen all the mountain streams in the neighborhood of Williamsburg, Ky., and become to the value of \$40.00 are in danger of being swent away.

Swopt away.

Heavy tains have washed away the dam at Annis Mills and Faulkner's Mill, which supplied the water power by which electricity was generated for use in the town of McMinuville, Tenn. The town will be without lights for some time, and a number of people are through out of washes. ber of people are thrown one of work.

The worst flood that has visited east Tennessee in years is prevalent in that section. Washouts and landslides are reported along the lines of the southern and K. C. G. & L. rallegads. The power house of the Knoxville street rallway is flooded. and as a consequence every street car line and as a consequence every street car line in the city is tied up. A number of factories have ceased operations and several houses were washed away. All streams continue to rise rapidly.

East Analee creek, at Athens, Tenn., is higher than it has been for thirty years. The streets and sidewalks of the town are

The streets and aidewalks of the town are ruined, and many houses are flooded. The sawmill of T. J. Long and 10,000 feet of tumber, the dam and engine room of the Athens roller mills, all the molds and patterns of the Southern Iron works and the feed and grist mill of Heil & Gouldy are

washed away.

Easter and Allie Anderson and three children, together with two horses, were drowned by the freshet in Powells river. They lived on its banks in Lee county, Va., and the river came down with such force that they were overtaken and drowned be-fore they could escape. The latest news indicates great loss of property and stock.

BOILER EXPLOSION KILLS FIVE. Six Others Seriously Injured, One of Whom Will Die.

GREENVILLE, Miss., April 2,-At 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon the two massive boilers of the Planters' Oil mill at this place exploded, weeking the mill property and causing the death of five men, as follows: Henry Williams, fireman; Oliver Humphreys, assistant fireman; Isol Freeman, laborer; Horace Wilkinson, carpenter;

Ed Strasack, carpenter.

The injured are: Frank Wolfenden, chief engineer, badly scalded and bruised; Columbus Washington, badly burned and ent by timber, will die; Tom Brown, badly bruised and burned; W. E. B. Freeman, leg broken; Freeman Pendleton, leg broken and otherwise badly hurt; Alex Hughes, scalp wound from flying timber. All the dead and injured except Wolfenden, Strasack and Hughes were

colored men.
The explosion occurred while Manager Alexander was at dinner, and the cause is stated to have been a dry botler. This version of it is not, however, definite, as all connected with the boiler and engine room were killed except the chief engineer, and he is too badly injured to make any statement. After the wreck of the plant by the explosion fire seized the ruins, but this was suppressed by the fire department, not, however, until the bodies of the killed had been badly charred. The financial loss will reach \$30,000.

The Bhode Island Election.

PROVIDENCE, April 2.—Election day in this state proved an ideal one for the voter, and throughout the state the indications are those of a very heavy vote. A strange feature has been the disappearance of a contest over the state ticket, and the fights have been entirely on local issues. The Republican state committee issues. Governor Lippitt, Republican, is re-elected over Littlefield by a plurality of over 10,000. The Democrats acknowledge that the election is a clean sweep for the Republicans. License won in this city, Pawtucket, Central Falls and Woonsocket. The Democrats will have three members in the assembly, a loss of five from last year.

Prohibition Presidential Candidates.

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 2.—The interest in the national Prohibition convention, by reason of the factional contest expected, continues to increase. Joshua Levering, of Maryland, and ex-Lieutenant Governor Metcalf, of Rhode Island, will be the leading candidates for president, representing the "narrow guage" wing of the party. C. E. Bentley, of Nebraska, and E. S. Thomp-son, of Ohlo, will be the candidates on the "broad guage" platform. Colonel G. W. Bain, of Kentucky, is being urged as the Shenandoah and Vicinity independent man.

Cuban Patriot Dies in Exile.

St. Louis, April 2.—Colonel Places Ja-rez, aged 60, who recently commanded a Cuban regiment, died at the City hospital here last night as the result of a wound received while escaping from the military prison at Pinar del Rio, Cuba, on Feb. 26. Deceased has a son, Gonzalez Jarez, who is a captain under Colonel Ryder, of Macco's army. As Colonel Jarez has no friends in this city his remains will probably occupy a pauper's grave.

Crushed to Death 'Neath a Boiler. CHESTER, Pa., April 2.—Alexander Don-aldson, employed at Roach's shipyard, was killed in a horrible manner yesterday. The ropes attached to a boiler which was being lowered into the hold of the new steamer Mohican broke, and Donaldson. who was immediately beneath the big mass of iron, was crushed out of all semblance of humanity. Raphael Scala, an Italian laborer, was slightly burt.

Oblo's Small Wheat Crop. -

TOLEDO, April 2.—The grain firm of J. F. Zahm & Co has just received 400 repiles covering every county in Ohio, regarding the condition of the growing wheat. They indicate the smallest crop every produced in the state. The worst damage is in the southern half of the state, where many farmers will plaw up the wheat and sow oats.


