An Alarming Record.

The scarlet fever epidemic broke out last July on Scotch Hill, near Shamokin, and at once found its way into that borough. Since then to the present date 294 cases in the borough were reported, 69 deaths resulting, showing a per centage of 23. In Coal township the ravages made by scarlet fever were almost as bad, 292 cases being reported, 60 deaths resulting. There were 8 diphtheria, 2 fatal; 19 membranous croup, 12 deaths; 8 typhoid fever, 3 deaths; 1 mesles.

Schuykill School Statistics.

Superintendent of Instruction Nathan C. Schaeffer's annual report has been received. It shows there are 2,444 school districts in the state. Number of schools, 25,348; number of superintendents, 134; number of male teachers, 8,628; number of female teachers, 17,460; whole number of teachers, 26,088; average salaries of male teachers per month, \$44.52; average salaries of female teachers per month, \$38.34; average length of school term, 7.91 months; number of pupils, 1,079,012. The estimated value of school property in Shenandoah is \$115,000, the second highest in the county, Pottsville leading with \$305,000. In this county 296 permanent certificates were issued and fourteen school houses built. The tabular statement shows that there are 704 schools in Schuykill county; 263 male and 439 female teachers; 17,692 male and 17,924 female scholars and an average attendance of 24,715. The cost per month per scholar, \$1.18; total amount of tax levied, \$359,370.85; state appropriations, \$178,441.93; cost of houses, purchasing, building, etc., \$138,101.90; teachers' wages, \$309,492.54; cost of school text books, \$24,510.51; total expenditures, \$647,466.42; resources, \$31,694.57; liabilities, \$367,880.59.
