## EASTER AT THE CHURCHES.

Impressive Services Held in All of Them Yesterday.

Easter is the most joyous and glorious of festivals in the ecclesiastical calendar and hence a day of great rejoicing in all the Christian churches. All the local congregations observed it yesterday with impressive services and many of the churches were elaborately adorned with Easter flowers. Among the most impressive services were those held in the German Lutheran church, on West Cherry street. The attendance was very large, the capacity of the church being taxed. The singing of the choir was exceptionally impressive, especially the rendition of the soul-inspiring Easter hymn, "Be not Afraid." Rev. John Grubler, the pastor, preached the sermon on a text taken from the gospel of St. Mark, 16th chapter, 1-8 verses, and handled the subject in a masterly manner. Communion service followed and was partaken of by 150 members. Miss Ida Dornbach presided at the organ during the service.

The congregation of the First Methodist Episcopal church observed the day by holding song and praise service in the morning and in the evening the pastor, Rev. Alfred Hoehner, preached an eloquent Easter sermon.

Rev. C. W. Sechrist preached two Easter sermons in the English Lutheran church yesterday, one in the morning on "Christ's Will, or Testament," and "Death and Resurrection of Christ" in the evening.

Rev. C. H. Spaulding, of Hazleton, officiated at the services in the Calvary Baptist church yesterday morning and evening. Special anthems were rendered by the choir at both services.

Many people of town attended the evening service in the Zion Lutheran church, at Girardville, last evening. This congregation always makes Easter service a feature and the ceremonies last evening compared favorably with the notable events of past years in the church. The service was opened with the choir's rendition of H. B. Danks' "Oh, Glorious Hours" by the choir, and was followed by the usual evening liturgy, after which the pastor, Rev. O. E. Leopold, preached a powerful sermon from Paul's Epistle to the Philippians, 3rd chapter, 20-21 verses. This was followed by E. L. Ashford's beautiful anthem, "Gloria in Excelsis." The singing was remarkably good, especially the solos by the organist, Miss Whitman, and Miss Wendel, of Girardville. Communion service followed and was partaken for the first time by the following children, who were confirmed on Palm Sunday: Louisa Maria Sippel, Ida Natassa Ahrensfield, Mary Darling Wagner, Hattie May Strah, Bertha Mackel, Willie Thomas, Harry Port, Louis Albert Scheele.

Communion service was held in the Trinity Reformed church of town yesterday, morning and evening, and were attended by large congregations. The communications were the longest in the history of the church. The pastor, Rev. Robert O'Boyle, preached an excellent sermon from I Corinthians, 15 chapter, 20th verse. The catechetical class took its first communion. The church was beautifully decorated with Easter lilies.

## A STABLE ON FIRE.

## KILLED TWENTY PEOPLE.

Holmes Prepares a Confession to be Published After His Death.

PHILADELPHIA, April 6.—H. H. Holmes, the noted murderer in Moyamensing prison awaiting execution for the murder of Benjamin Pitezel, has prepared a confession, giving the details of his many crimes, which is to be made public after his death on the gallows. In it he tells how and why he put to death no less than twenty men, women and children. He gives all the facts. He writes as calmly and coolly and remorselessly as he murdered. He neglects no detail, and gives an account of six murders which he planned, but was prevented from carrying out.

It was said that he put eleven persons out of the world. When his confession is printed there will be accounts of the violent deaths of nine people whose absence from their homes and their friends has hitherto been unexplained. He describes in detail the murder of the Williams sisters; of Quinlan, the janitor of the castle, who knew too much; of Benjamin Pitezel and of the Pitezel children.
