RECOGNITION FOR CUBA.

The House Promptly Passes the Concurrent Resolutions.

IN THE HANDS OF THE PRESIDENT.

The Chief Magistrate May Delay Further Action on the Part of Our Government Until After the Five Months' Baluy Season-Quesada Exultant.

WASHINGTON, April 7.-The house yesterday adopted the conference report terday adopted the conference report on the Cuban resolutions by a vote of 24t to 27, and passed the river and harbor bill under suspension of the rules, after a lively debate of forty minutes, by a vote of 216 to 40. The report on the Cuban res-olutions had been debated Friday and Saturday, and the vote yesterday was taken immediately after the reading of the logged Eighteen Ramphileans and the journal. Eighteen Republicans and nine Democrats voted against the report.

After the most determined opposition of those opposed to the recognition of the insurgents in the senate and house there were but ten more votes against the report than against the original resolutions. The former vote was 263 to 17. By its action the house agreed to the senate resolutions, and disposes of the Cuban ques-tion for the present. Those resolutions

were as follows: Resolved, That in the opinion of congress a condition of public war exists be-tween the government of Spain and the government proclaimed and for some time maintained by force of arms by the people of Cuba; and that the United States of America should maintain a strict neu-trality between the contending powers, according to each all the rights of bellig-erents in the ports and territory of the United States.

Resolved. That the friendly offices of the United States should be offered by the president to the Spanish government for the recognition of the independence of

The Cuban resolutions will be officially brought to the attention of the president today by the secretary of the senate, who will present him with an enrolled copy of the document. Ordinarily concurrent resolutions are not forwarded to the president, as they do not require his signature, but these resolutions will be laid before him. as were the Armenian resolutions, because they express the opinion that he should tender the office of the United States to Spain for the recognition of Cuban independence, and are therefore a direction to him in so far as congress can direct the

president in such a proceeding. Senor Dupuy de Lome, the Spanish minister here, was too busy to receive reporters wishing to ascertain what he proposed to do as a result of the action of the house. Probably his course will depend entirely upon the attitude to be assumed by the president on the subject. The course of the latter is purely a matter of speculation. Since the transmission to congress last February of the correspondence relations of the course of the correspondence relations to Cohe much matter has accommo tive to Cuba much matter has accumulated at the department of state bearing on the struggle. For prudential reasons these reports have been withheld even from congress, and so it is not possible to learn whether or not the facts set out therein is such as to warrant any change in the attitude towards the revolution the president assumed and defined in his annual message to congress. The tests he laid down in the beginning which the revolutionists must fulfill remain un-changed so far as can be gathered. Relative to the extension of his good

offices towards bringing about independence, it is entirely possible that the president may find it within his inclination and disposition to move in that direction as far as he can safely do so after he is on record in his message as deprecating the continuance of the present "cruel and bloody" war on the Island. However, in and as the rainy season is about to begin in Cuba, putting a stop to all military

Must sell to disolve partnership. operations for five months, it may be that the president will decide to wait furth during the enforced truce before acting himself in the matter.

Senor Gonzalo de Quesada, the secretary of the Cuban delegation here, is exultant over the advices from Europe, through the newspapers and otherwise, to the effect that the Spanish government is in great straits to raise money to prolong the war. He said the Bank of France and the low countries had refused to advance Spain any more money in addition to the \$10,000,000 already advanced, and this had driven Spain to the doubtful expedient of calling upon her own citizens for help. He doubted the success of the appeal. Then, again, Spain is under obligations to repay the \$10,000,000 loan to the Bank of France before June next, and one-half of it on the 5th of next month. Otherwise she would forfeit the collateral she had put up, a

forfeit the collateral she had put up, a heavy blow for her. According to Que-sada the Spanish people are getting very restive under Weyler's failures in Cuba. The senate spent the entire day on the postoffice appropriation bill, but did not complete it. The bill served to bring out some sharp criticisms by Senator Gor-man on the administration of the post-office department, and by Senator Allen office department, and by Senator Allen on alleged irregularities resulting from the civil service system. Mr. Allen repeated sensational charges as to large money contributions said to have been made in the interest of Mr. Cleveland and Mr. Harrison. The charge that Mr. Wanamaker contributed \$400,000 toward Mr. Harrison's election led to an emphatic de-Harrison's election led to an empirate de-nial from Mr. Hawley. Mr. Allen alluded to the president as "his majesty" and as the chief mugwump of the country.

Now for More Flag Burning. LONDON, April 7.—The Times publishes a dispatch from Madrid which says: "The hope that Captain General Woyler would obtain some decisive advantage over the rebels before the final vote of the Ameri-can congress must now be abandoned. It is quite certain, however, that the Spanish nation will unhesitatingly refuse to accept the United States' dictation, and no mat-ter how far public opinion favors such re-forms in Cuba as would put an end to the rebellion, while the United States maintains its present attitude no Spaniard will be found to venture to utter such an opinion. Even the Republicans would only ask for Cuban autonomy in altered

Peruvians Sympathize with Cuba Lima, Peru, April 7.—It was generally known here that the United States house of representatives was to take the vote yesterday which would finally decide the attitude of congress on the question of Cuban belligerency. When the news spread the greatest enthusiasm was mani-fested by the people.

Should the Boundary Dispute be Decided

Hundred Englishmen in British Gulana
Would Lose Money.

Groundstown, British Gulana, April 7.—
If the Venezuelan British Gulana boundary dispute is decided in favor of Venezuela ninety-nine out of every hundred Englishmen in this country will lease money by it, and the same may be said of nearly every American living in the colony, except the United States consul. British Gulana is divided into three counties, Damarara, Berblea and Essequebo.

Practically all of the gold fields are situated in Essequebo county, and nearly all of the territory which comprises that county is under dispute.

While the rest of the world is looking upon the question as practically settled so far as it concerns the possibility of war, the point of view here is entirely different. The people, that is the Englishmen, who The people, that is the Englishmen, who control everything, despite the large ma-jority of the foreign population, do not fear war, looking upon such a thing with the usual British eyes which see nothing but victory for themselves. But they do fear arbitration above all things, for no matter how little of Essequebo county were given to Venezuella a number of gold mines would pass out of British control. The meager dispatches received here are scanned most eagerly by everyone.

Under the circumstances it is not to be wondered at that the feeling here against the United States is very strong, and the Americans here do not hesitate to blame Americans here do not hesitate to blame the Washington government openly. Instead of the feeling diminishing it is growing with the delay, for until the question is decided any introduction of machinery to get out the gold will be impossible. The men will not invest any more money in Essequebo county with a

chance of having the whole territory taken out of their hands.

Gold there is here, and to what extent may be judged by the registrations for three days amounting to 2.981 ounces, and every bit of it was taken out by placer mining. Owing to the volcanic nature of the country, and the difficulty experienced in getting to the fields, long cance trips being necessary, up to the present time the mining has been very crude. 


