The employees of the Draper and Gilbert collieries will receive their wages on Friday for the last two weeks of March.

**A Wanton Assault.**  
 Constables Dando and Bolin, of town, went to Morea yesterday afternoon and arrested eight Slavs named Lukos Pehush, Wasil Shoppel, Aften Fesh, Mike Kardis, Paul Karshick, Wasil Nester, John Koshitch and John Pehush for committing an unprovoked and murderous assault upon a Jew named Harry Heil, who arrived in Shenandoah a few days ago and sought employment at the Morea colliery last Saturday. The accused men were standing at the boiler house of the colliery when Heil passed and assaulted him without any provocation. The man was terribly beaten and his left ear was cut off. It was shown at the hearing before Justice Williams last night that the Slavs were inspired to make the attack by a remark of one of their number that the Jews killed Christ and "it would be a good idea to kill that one," whereupon they attacked Heil. Each was committed in default of \$300 bail and to-day they were taken to Pottsville.

# Fraud Alleged.

Several hours were spent yesterday afternoon in trying an insurance case before Justice Dangler in which Jacob Mitchell was plaintiff and the Prudential Insurance Company was defendant. S. G. M. Hollinger, Esq., represented the plaintiff and M. M. Burke, Esq., appeared for the company. The suit was brought to recover one-third of the insurance due upon a policy of \$300 issued upon the life of the plaintiff's mother-in-law, Mrs. Margie Staselunis. She was a widow and Mitchell was the beneficiary under the policy, the terms of which provided that in case of death within six months after the issuance one-third the amount would fall due. The company disputed the claim on the ground that the deceased procured it upon fraudulent representations to the company's examining physician, in that she stated that she was free from all disease, had not been ill for a number of years, and had no organic or hereditary troubles; whereas, six days prior to making the application for insurance Dr. C. S. Phillips, a physician upon whom she had called, and who was a witness at the hearing, had treated her for cancer of the liver. Dr. J. P. Roberts was also a witness and testified to having treated the woman for the same disease in January following the issuance of the policy. It was also shown that if Mrs. Staselunis died of cancer of the liver she must have been afflicted for at least seven or eight months. She died on March 2nd, last, and the policy was issued on December 30th, last. The company also claimed that the woman gave her age as 58 years, while in fact she was 60. After hearing all the evidence Justice Dangler gave judgment for \$167.67, one-third the amount of the policy. The company will appeal, it is said, on a question of principal. It is intimated that several mark risks have been brought to light during the past few months in town and it is now proposed to sift the facts in connection with some of them.

**Schuylkill Democrats.**  
 The Democratic state convention will meet at Allentown on the 29th inst., and it is said the Schuylkill delegation will favor Governor Pattison for President. The delegates from this county were elected in January, and the First district will be represented by M. J. Scanlan, of Shenandoah; James J. Quirk, Mahanoy City, and P. J. Ferguson, Lost Creek. The delegates from each county select their own delegates to the national convention. Schuylkill is entitled to two national delegates, Major James Ellis, of Pottsville, and William A. Marr, of Ashland, have been mentioned.

**Will Publish Their Names.**  
 The School Board of Mahanoy City appears to have as much trouble with delinquent taxpayers as other towns in the county, and it has been decided to publish the names of all delinquents. The names of all who do not pay on or before the May meeting of the Board will be published. The Tax Receiver of that town asked for an exoneration of \$2,190.08.

**Another Blow at Gordon.**  
 It is given out on good authority, says the Ashland Telegram, that the Philadelphia & Reading Railroad Company have decided to double track the short line between Big Mine Run Junction and Locust Dale, at which two points this route connects with the main line tracks, and bring it into general use for freight and coal haulage. Supervisor Wolf has received partial instructions concerning the work, and expects to have a force of men engaged within the next week. By transporting the traffic over this route it will do away with much of the haulage by way of Gordon.

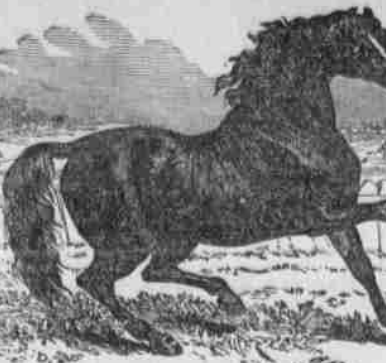
