IN A WATERY GRAVE.

Singular Marine Disaster in San Francisco's Harbor.

BRITISH SHIP CAPSIZED AND SUNK

Blown Over by a sudden squall and sinking so quickly that six of the crew were carried down with the ill-fated vessel.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10.—No stranger disaster ever happened to a vessel than the accident which befell the British ship Blairmore yesterday. While riding at anchor in Mission bay the vessel was struck by a violent squall, which, together with the swift flood tide, threw the craft on her starboard side, capsizing her completely and sinking her in less than fifteen minutes.

Fifteen seamen struggled in the water. Six were confined in the hold, and were probably pinned down by the falling dunnage used to hold the ship's ballast in place. The imprisoned sextants never reached the deck, and their bodies are imprisoned in the steel hull. The Blairmore a mass of level with the bay bottom under seven fathoms of water, and not a sign of the sailors' sunken tomb is visible above the waves.

The unfortunate who lost their lives were: T. Ludwig, first mate; Henry Clark, seaman; Roland Siegel, apprentice; G. Reinbaum, seaman; H. S. D'Amant, watchman; Sam Kerry, steward. The latter was shipped here, and is a native of Brooklyn, N. Y.

The squall that caused the disaster was the most severe experienced on the south arm of the bay for many years. The Blairmore was lashed over so far that a passing tugboat captain hailed her and asked Captain Caw, her commander, if he did not wish a tow to the north end of the bay. Meanwhile the squall blew its fiercest, the sea was heavy and rain fell in torrents. Captain Caw refused a tow, saying he would hold on a little longer. The tug men gave a sudden lurch, dipped her yards and fell prone on her starboard quarter, while the water rushed into her hold in torrents. The rapidly escaping air from the hold blew the water fountain like a high as the lower yards. The men scrambled wildly out on the outer ladder.

A passing tug, with another vessel in tow, dropped her lines and blew for help to speed the rescue, but it was too late. A boat was sent from the British ship Yeoman, a thousand yards ahead of the Blairmore. In three minutes this boat was alongside the upturned vessel and picked up the men clinging to the Blairmore's sides. Two men had struck out for shore and were picked up by the British ship Cromdale. The Yeoman picked up several, including Captain Caw, who reported immediately to his agents and to the British consul. He said the wind was blowing as stiffly as he had ever seen it at sea. Both of the Blairmore's anchors were out, and he thought they would hold her all right.

The Blairmore was comparatively new. She was built at Glasgow in 1884, and was registered 1,787 tons. There were 299 tons of ballast in the hold, and it is thought the ballast shifted and covered the bodies. The loss on ship and furniture will exceed \$125,000. The task of raising the Blairmore will be expensive.

Money Power's Opposition to Bourgeois.

LONDON, April 10.—The Daily News this morning, with reference to the coalition with which President Faure, of France, was welcomed at the Auteuil races (the occasion of a great gathering of fashionable people) on Sunday, says: "As society has decided to make things hot for the president he has resolved not to visit the race show. The rich people's excuse for attacking President Faure is that he keeps M. Bourgeois in office, in spite of the senate. This excuse is more specious than solid; but it serves its purpose, for it would never do to attack M. Bourgeois as the author of the income tax, which is the real ground of the objection to him."

Puzzled Over the Raines Law.

NEW YORK, April 10.—It was announced in the district attorney's office last night that the grand jury would not consider any more excise complaints until an opinion on the Raines law was laid down for their guidance. For the last week complaints of the violation of the Raines law have been piling into the district attorney's office at the rate of about a dozen a day. In some cases the grand jury has been divided as to whether it should indict or not, and so gave a number of offenders the benefit of the doubt and dismissed the complaint.

Constable After Baltimore Baseballists.

PETERSBURG, Va., April 10.—High Constable Pillow left here yesterday for Norfolk to arrest and bring back to Petersburg for examination before the mayor Doyle, Kelly and Brodie, of the Baltimore baseball team. The charges against Doyle is that of participating in the fight at the ball park Wednesday afternoon, and that against Kelly and Brodie is for assaulting Mr. Quarles at the Appomattox park. It is reported that the three ball players left Norfolk very hastily and went to Baltimore.

Double Tragedy on a Crowded Street.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., April 10.—A double tragedy was enacted on a crowded street here yesterday afternoon. With a razor, Bud Owens, a negro, cut the throat of Cora Bustin, a 19-year-old negro girl, and when pursued by a crowd of people who had witnessed the tragedy cut his own throat with the same weapon. Owens bled to death in a few minutes, and the girl will die. The couple were to have been married on April 3, but the girl had broken the engagement.

Winner of the Tennessee Derby.

MEMPHIS, April 10.—The Tennessee derby was won by a length and a half yesterday by Dr. McLean's brown gelding Berclair. The day was an ideal one for racing, and the crowd numbered about 9,000. The Hot Springs stable pair, Lady Inez and Ben Ebor, were held as strong favorites. The time, 1:55 1/2, is the Tennessee derby record, and the best previous performance being that of Pantano, 1:59 1/2, in last year's race.

Rhodes' Reported Death Unconfirmed.

LONDON, April 10.—There were rumors on the Stock Exchange yesterday that Cecil Rhodes, formerly premier of Cape Colony, who has been suffering from fever at Salisbury, Matabeleland, is dead. The officials of the British Chartered South African company discredit the rumor. The report caused a fall in the price of the company's securities.

THE WAR IN ABYSSINIA.

Osman Digna's Presence in the Suakin District Explained.

MEMELIK AND THE DERVISHES.

Negotiations Proceeding for an Alliance between Old Time Foes to Resist the Invasion of Common Enemies—The Result Awaited with Interest.

MASOAWA, April 10.—Colonel Stevani, who has been ordered by General Baidisera to retire from Kassala upon Agordat, telegraphs that the dervishes who have hovered about Kassala are demoralized by the attacks of the garrison of that place, and have abandoned Turuf and fled beyond the Athara to Osobe, leaving their wounded, in addition to mules and a quantity of grain. Turuf was well fortified and entrenched and was able to withstand a reconnaissance in force made by Colonel Stevani on April 3, who took a part of the forts, but was unable to entirely dislodge the dervishes.

So confident was he that he could carry Turuf with the forces at his command that he asked leave of General Baidisera to attack Turuf. But General Baidisera, out of abundant caution and in view of the situation, declined to sanction the attack, and ordered Stevani to leave Kassala for Agordat.

It is not quite clear whether the dervishes have abandoned Turuf, because they agreed with Colonel Stevani that his force could take it whenever they wanted to, or whether their forts have been further harassed in spite of General Baidisera's orders.

There is food for abundant speculation and interest in a report received here that the Emperor Menelik, Italy's late successful antagonist at Adowa, has sent a delegate to negotiate with the dervishes. An alliance between the Abyssinians and dervishes would upset many calculations.

Menelik, negus or king of Shoa, and Negus Mergest, or king of kings over Abyssinia, is a Christian, as are his subjects. In times past they have been at war with the Mohammedan dervishes, to whom they are of the hated class of Infidels, and the hatred between them partook of all the bitterness of religious rancor and fanaticism. During the former occupation by the English of the Sudan Menelik proved himself a valuable and reliable ally to them.

On this account it has been believed that Menelik and the dervishes will, therefore, be watched with some disquietude by all the powers interested. WADY HALFA, April 10.—The presence of Osman Digna in the Suakin district, while the Khalifa is concentrating all his available forces on the Nile to oppose the Egyptian advance, is thus explained: Osman Digna is responsible to the Khalifa for the security of the Suakin district. He first heard the news of the proposed Egyptian expedition up the Nile while he was assisting at the siege of Kassala by the dervishes. He hurried immediately to the neighborhood of Suakin, supposing that the expedition against Dongola would start from there, as expeditions have done with a similar purpose before. He has been in the neighborhood ever since, and has had a number of flying encounters with the natives.

Scouts from Erkowit report that at noon on Wednesday Osman Digna attacked the friendly Arabs, who were procuring a supply of water at the wells. A fight ensued and as a result the dervishes retired, leaving fourteen of their number dead.

Maryland's Peach Crop Safe.

BALTIMORE, April 10.—The first weekly crop report of the season issued by the Maryland state weather service shows that the peach crop is saved. Dr. Cronk says peach trees have been damaged in some localities, but the outlook is for a large crop of fruit. In northern central Maryland wheat is backward, but the prospect for fruit is good. In southern Maryland oats and cloverseedling is in progress, grass is poor, wheat is improving and the outlook for it is good. In eastern Maryland and Delaware the prospect for peaches is excellent.

Seven Dead in a Mine Fire.

BUTTE, Mont., April 10.—Dispatches from Basin report that the fire which started in the Hope mine on Wednesday has been extinguished, and seven imprisoned miners are without doubt dead, as nothing can be heard from them. They are John Buckley, shaft boss; Pat Buckley, Martin Sullivan, Hugh McKeown, Barney Wall, Will Bolden and Ed McArthur. It will be several days before the bodies can be reached. The cause of the fire is still unknown.

San Francisco Journalist's Suicide.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Henry Fitch, a brother of George K. Fitch, one of the proprietors of the San Francisco Bulletin and San Francisco Call, committed suicide here yesterday by shooting himself through the head at his home on Capitol Hill. He had been suffering greatly from pains in the chest for the past six weeks, and it is thought he committed the deed while in a fit of temporary aberration of the mind. He was 57 years old.

Deities That He Son Will Wed.

NEW YORK, April 10.—Mr. Samuel Borrowe denied emphatically yesterday that this is the slighest foundation for a recently published rumor that his son, Halbit Alton Borrowe, who figured in the martial troubles of Mr. and Mrs. J. Coleman Drayton, is soon to marry Mrs. Drayton, who recently secured a divorce from her husband.

To Increase Germany's Navy.

LONDON, April 10.—The Standard has a dispatch from Berlin on the German naval program which says that a navy bill will be introduced in the reichstag next winter which will provide for the addition of three second class ironclads, five ordinary cruisers and probably several other cruisers to the German navy.
