the senatein session for any purpose. Consequently the provailing opinion in the senate is that the final adjournment of the session will not be postponed far beyond the beginning of the first of the summer

It is admitted on all hands that if ad-journment is reached as early as the maority predict and seem to desire a great many questions, which it was hoped the session would dispose of, will be left sussession would dispose of, will be left sus-pended in the air, as it were. Among them are the bankruptcy, Nicaraguan canal, Hawaiian cable, Pacific railroad, fur seal and New Mexico and Arizona statchood bills, besides the Monroe doctrine, resolu-tion for the election of senators by the people, the Dupont election case, the Alabama investigation, the various financial bills and resolutions, and the general bills reported and to be reported from the committees on commerce, pensions and publie lands.

Senators Still Discussing the Dupont Contested Election Case.

Washington, April 13.—The Dupont election case is being reviewed in the sen-ate today, Senator Chandler speaking in support of the committee report favorable to seating Mr. Dupont. The general deficiency appropriation bill—the last of the supply bills—is in process of preparation in the house appropriation committee, and pending the reporting of the bill to the house a variety of matters, which have been held in abeyance in order that the appropriation bills might be pressed, will be brought up for matter. Another Statement from the Volunteers' Commander,

THE OLD GENERAL'S ANTIPATHY

To Our Country, Our Flag and Our Republican Institutions.-The Salvationists Throughout the World Thoroughly Subservicet to London Headquarters.

New Your, April 18.—Commander and Mrs. Ballington Booth gave out the sppended statement last night at Volunteer

Since our statement, written in re sponse to the argings we received to inaugurate a new movement was issued, we avoided making reply to the inaccurate statements which have from time to time appeared in print from the present leaders of the Salvation Army. In this attitude of silence we have been indersed by our friends and the public. It was our inten-tion to maintain this silence, but during the last few days news has coached us that portions of our private letters are be-ing shown by London's representatives, who are putting their own interpretations upon our reasons for our present position Hearing of this our friends and our efficers urge us to state some of our reasons for deciding not to take another command

under international government "It has been repeatedly asked why we do not publish our letter of the 31st of Jan-uary, which has been so wrongfully quoted as our resignation. That letter, being a private communication from a son to a father and brother, we have not felt that we could honorably make public. The receivers of the letter areat perfect liberty to do so, providing they print it intact. In justice to our present position it must be stated, with emphasis, that no one letter embraces all the reasons for our inability to accept another command, but that letters covering a period of nearly two years past, and also those of later date than the list of January, are necessary to an understanding of the situation, especially the letter of April 5, 1896.

"Upon receipt of orders to leave America we wrote a letter dated Jan. 10, asking if international headquarters had taken into consideration all the consequences of the change of command at that particular time; the feeling towards England then existing in this country, the heavy fluaucial responsibility of our new building, and our own peculiar and unfortunate relations with the general (from whom we had received no communication of any character for nearly six months) made it appear to us a most unfortunate and ill advised step. This letter was followed by others from us, stating that we were pre-paring to fulfill their orders and to relinquish our command.

"On Jan. 31 we wrote to London stat-ing some of our reasons for being unable conscientiously to accept another command, but making plain that we did not wish to injure the army, as the follow-ing sentence will show: 'We have wanted to have our dear people who from shore to shore of this territory believe in us and love us, and yet on the other hand we cannot be inconsistent. How could we take another command feeling as we do? The only light we have received from God is that upon the path we have now determined to take, namely, to obey your orders and resign our command, and then as expeditiously as possible to retire. It must not be said at any time that we have left because we were unwilling to leave America. This would be untrue, for we have made no remonstrance, nor have w

"It should be carefully remembered that London's representatives, after they had precipitated the whole transaction and forced us from our position, so pre-venting our quiet farewell and retirement, made the definite statement that we said that we had lost confidence in the general and in our international system of administration, which reasons alone, by their own showing, would prove that we could not consistently accept another field under the circumstances, "The general's visit was the primary

cause between us and himself. From first to last he impressed us with his displeasure and dissatisfaction with us personally, and with our method of administering affairs. upon our crests and constantly spoke deprecatingly of the country, its people and its institutions. Our constant defense and explanation in answer to his attacks only increased the difficulty. With our affection and knowledge of America this placed us in a most unfortunate position. He, in consequence, showed but little interest and sympathy with us personally. He spoke no words in public of approval of our toll, service or success, and in other ways we need not mention made the visit me of the bitterest experiences of our

"During our experience in America we have gradually become convinced that the system of governing the work in this country from a foreign center, by laws made by those unaware of the needs and conditions of the country, is neither wise nor ractical. Constant friction has in this count existed between us and the inter-

account existed between us and the inter-national headquarters.

"The rules governing the army, to the minutest detail, were made in England, and the commissioners of foreign com-mands were obliged to enforce them, though they had themselves in no wise been consulted on the formulating of the same. Some time previous to our orders to say farewell two more volumes came to hand. Portions of these volumes we did not approve, yet such rules and regula-tions we should have had to enforce in

some other countries, if not in this one". The statement then proceeds to discuss at length the thorough subserviency of the army in America and every other land to London headquarters, the commission-ers in other lands being utterly ignored in the formulating of rules of government. As an instance is quoted an order issued by the American commissioners prohibiting the use of tobacco by the army officers. They were ordered from England to countermand this rule, and in answer to protests were ordered to express regret to the American officers that the rule had been
