### MISLEADING REPORTS

Sent Out by the Spanish Agents in Cuba's Metropolis.

### STATEMENT OF A CUBAN OFFICER.

General Gomez Has Thirty Thousand Troops Under His Command, but Needs Ammunition—General Garcia Sends an Apology to the American People.

PHILADELPHIA, April 14.—First Lieutenant Abelardo Peraza, of the staff of General Lacerot, of the Cuban insurgent army, is in this city convalescing from a wound received in the war. In an interview today he denied that General Gomez is in a serious condition.

"He has been sick from liver troubles, but is in a fair way to complete recovery and as active as ever," said the lieutenant. "He has now under him an army of 19,000 men, most of whom are well armed. Counting the divisions of Maceo and other generals, his total strength is about 30,000. What is mostly lacking is ammunition."

"The Spanish reports are to a great extent false. When any of our generals attack a place containing Americans or other foreign interests their property is not touched at all. Gomez has issued strict orders to this effect. The reports of our losses in battle are always exaggerated by the enemy, who never admit their own losses, but count ours to suit themselves.

"The recent successful expeditions have been a great help to us. The rainy season begins about the 15th of this month. Then comes the yellow fever. It will deplete the ranks of the Spanish soldiers, because they are not acclimated.

"General Weyler has not been any more successful against us than was Campos. Our people think him a coward at heart. Campos took the field, but Weyler has not shown himself at all. He remains in Havana, and gives orders which lead to many atrocities.

Lieutenant Peraza has forwarded to him from New York the copy of a letter received by Estrada Palma from General Garcia, written previous to the acquisition of the Bermuda filibusters, in which the general addresses the American people as follows:

"I am fully aware of the obligation which I have contracted to stand trial for my alleged violation of the laws of your country. I have not remained to face the consequence of my acts simply because I feel that I have a higher duty to perform as a soldier and a Cuban. Having fought for the independence of my country for ten years, and having ever since promulgated the idea for which we fought, I deem it my highest and holiest duty to fight and bleed, and if necessary die to obtain the independence of my country.

"Should I fall my death will expiate, I hope, in your eyes any possible offense for which I might have to stand trial there. Should I survive I give you my word as a man and a soldier to return to your country and cheerfully abide by the consequences which the laws of the country may visit upon me."

### Will Resist American Interference.

LONDON, April 14.—The Madrid correspondent of the Standard says that the new chamber elected on Sunday will certainly support the government in resisting American interference in Cuba, and that it will also be a very strong protectionist body.

### Bold Burglars in Connecticut.

MIDDLETOWN, Conn., April 14.—Between 1 and 2 o'clock in the morning four men rushed into the East Hampton station on the Air Line division of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, seized the night telegraph operator, Michael Phillips, gagged him and bound him hand and foot to his chair. Then they blew open the safe with dynamite. The safe was blown to pieces, the office was wrecked and a portion of the station walls blown out. The robbers secured between \$50 and \$60 from the safe, but overlooked an Adams Express package containing \$300. Afterward they robbed Hall's food store of a small amount of cash.

### Three More Election Contests Decided.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Election committee No. 8 yesterday decided three more contested cases, one in favor of the contestant, that of Thorp, Republican, vs. McKenny, Democrat, from the Fourth district of Virginia. Mr. McKenny is unseated. The others were: Hoge, Republican, vs. Osey, Democrat, from the Sixth Virginia district, in favor of Mr. Osey, and Cornett, Republican, vs. Swanson, from the Fifth Virginia district, in favor of Mr. Swanson. A minority report will be submitted on the Cornett-Swanson case.

### The New Irish Land Bill.

LONDON, April 14.—Mr. Gerald Balfour, chief secretary for Ireland, introduced the new Irish land bill in the house of commons yesterday. It is of much wider scope than that of Mr. John Morley, who was chief secretary for Ireland in the late Liberal government, and is upon the principle of purchase by the occupying tenant being the ultimate solution of the land question. The bill prevents the lessee from having rent levied on his improvements.

### Russia and China.

COLOMBO, Ceylon, April 14.—Li Hung Chang, who is to represent the emperor of China at the ceremonies attending the coronation of the czar at Moscow, arrived here yesterday. He was received with high honors. During the course of an interview Li Hung Chang is quoted as saying that after leaving Moscow he will proceed to Berlin, Essen, Paris and London, and thence to America, returning to Peking in November.

### To Deliver Up Rev. Mr. Knapp.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 14.—The porte has addressed to Mr. J. W. Kiddle, United States charge d'affaires, a written promise to deliver the Rev. George P. Knapp, the American missionary recently expelled from Bitlis by the Turkish authorities to the United States consul at Alexandretta.

### Women Delegates Win.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., April 14.—At the session of the Methodist conference it was voted to favor the admission of women as lay delegates to the general conference to be held in Cleveland. The motion was hotly debated, but passed with a handsome majority.

### Schaefer Again Defeats Garnier.

BOSTON, April 14.—The second series of the international billiard match between Ives, Schaefer and Garnier opened here last night. The contestants were Schaefer and Garnier, and the former won by a score of 350 to 225.

### Callum Still in the Race.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 14.—Hon. J. Callum Humphrey, who is a delegate to the national Republican convention from the Seventeenth Illinois district, and who is under instructions to vote for McKinley, has received the following telegram from Senator Callum, referring to the senator's presidential candidacy: "I have not withdrawn and do not intend to withdraw." Mr. Humphrey states that all the stories about the withdrawal are false pure and simple. The Callum club of this city has sent out a circular letter to all the delegates elected to the state convention asking them to vote down in the convention any instructions to the delegates to the national convention.

### Corbett's Windy Warfare.

CHICAGO, April 14.—Last night, from the stage of the Chicago Opera House, James J. Corbett announced that the National Sporting club, of London, had offered a purse of \$10,000 for a fight between himself and Fitzsimmons. "Fitzsimmons is going abroad May 2," said Corbett, "and I close my season the second week in May. I intend to take the first boat that I can get for England, and hope to bring Fitzsimmons to an agreement to fight."

### The Jackson-Walling Trials.

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 14.—The attorney for Alonzo Walling, indicted with Jackson for the murder of Pearl Bryan, has been notified to be ready to proceed with the trial May 5. This indicates that Judge Helm expects to finish the trial of Scott Jackson in two weeks. It is given out that the prosecution will not call either of the men as a witness against the other, being confident that they already have enough evidence to convict both.

### Fishermen Out in a Gale.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., 14.—The fishing boat Olive E. was blown into the lake by the gale yesterday. She left port early yesterday morning, before the wind rose to a gale. Her crew consisted of three men. The Olive E. is a sailboat, but has a small steam plant. When last seen she was several miles out on the lake and driving northward, apparently unable to make headway against the gale. Up to a late hour she had not been heard from.

### Two Hundred Matanzas Killed.

LONDON, April 14.—The manager of the British South Africa company's mines at Gwelo wires that upon the withdrawal of the Chartered company's men from that place they left their stores of dynamite behind. The Matanzas occupied the place after it was abandoned by the British, and while tampering with the dynamite it exploded, killing 200 natives and injuring many more.

### Taken from Jail and Hanged.

COLEMBUS, Ga., April 14.—At Seale, Ala., Sedrick Adams, who was in jail, charged with the murder of B. N. Renfro, a prominent merchant of that place, was taken from jail at midnight by a mob and hanged.

### Death at a Blast Furnace.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., April 14.—By an explosion at the Cambria blast furnace yesterday Gustave Krueger and Isiah Steele were fatally burned. Krueger died last evening and Steele is not expected to live.

### A MEXICAN MASSACRE.

Maddened Mexican Indians Invade the Town of Juquila.

ALL OF THE OFFICIALS MURDERED.

The Town Hall and Government Stamp Office Attacked and Many Stores Looted and Burned—The Revolt is Local and Will be Promptly Suppressed.

CITY OF MEXICO, April 14.—A telegram from Oaxaca City states that the rebel Indians at the town of Juquila killed all the town councillors, school teachers, chief of police and the telegraph operator—in fact, every one holding a government place. The people are in terror, and troops have been sent for the relief of the town.

The military movement made against the rebel Zimatians has resulted in driving the Indians into the mountains. They began their plotting holy week, instigated by Indian lawyers, who informed them that the new state taxes were unconstitutional, but the authorities paid no attention to the excitement among them, considering they were engaged in their usual drunken celebration of the season.

Procuring arms and machetes the Indians made a rush for the town hall, and the prefect hastily closed the doors, which they soaked with petroleum and burned, thus effecting an entrance. They sacked the place and penetrated the private apartments of the prefect, grossly mistreated the women of his family, and then, turning their attention to the officials and armed servants, killed and wounded several. The scene was a horrible one, as the assault took place in the early evening and the excitement of the mob was indescribable. The Indians were possessed with fury, and it was absolutely impossible for respectable inhabitants to control them, as all were drunk and maddened.

The mob after sacking the town hall went to the federal stamp office and assaulted it, burning down the outside door with petroleum, which also communicated fire to the entire house, placing Collector Graciola, who was on the roof with his clerks, in a condition of the utmost peril, but they managed to escape by the rear, jumping for their lives. Many shops were burned after being sacked, and the Indians decorated themselves with stolen finery. They all fled on the approach of the soldiers, and are now in the hills. The revolt is local and will be suppressed, and the instigators of the Indians will be severely punished, as they took advantage of their gross ignorance.

### Killed Her Friend and Herself.

ELGIN, Ill., April 14.—Miss Mary Linnet, of Chicago, shot and instantly killed Miss Elizabeth Trowbridge, a prominent young woman of this city, and then killed herself, shortly after 8 o'clock last evening. The double tragedy took place on South State street, the principal residence street of the city. Miss Linnet some two years ago conceived a singular liking for a young woman in Chicago, a neighbor, and attempted to take her life because she would not live with her. She was sent to the insane hospital here, and was discharged from the institution as cured in December last. Miss Trowbridge was an attendant at the hospital and had charge of Miss Linnet, who became passionately attached to her. Her great regret in leaving Elgin was that she must leave her friend behind.
