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

A Madrid Dispatch Declares That Spain

LONDON, April 15.—A dispatch from Madrid to The Pall Mail Gazette says: Senor Canovas del Castillo, the Spanish premier, is ill and cannot be interviewed. His relatives, however, confirm the existris relatives, however, confirm the exist-since of a communique from President Cleveland, but in the present state of pub-lic feeling, it will be impossible for the government to accept his offer. While the government will do everything in Its power to avoid a quarrel with the United States, it will prefer to fight rather than lose Cuba through foreign pressure. NEW JERSEY ELECTIONS.

Results Encouraging for Both Republicans and Democrats.

REFORM VICTORY IN THE CAPITAL

The Local Government Will be Compe of Men Who Propose to Look More Strictly After Saloous and Largely Reduce Their Number.

NEWARE, N. J., April 15.-Elections were held yesterday in a number of cities throughout New Jersey, that held at New-ark affording the most interest. In Newark the fight was not only between Re-publicans and Democrats, but also be-tween two factions of the Republican party. The result was that Seymour, Democrat is elected mayor by about 4,200. George R. Gray and Thomas D. English, both Democrats, were elected street and water commissioners by about 2,500 and 1,000 respectively. The board of aldermen and school board will be Democratic by a large majority.

In Passaic the vote was light. John

washington, April 15. — Nothing is known at the state department of any such communication from President Mr. C. Bensinger, of the firm of Bensinger eight Bepublicans and three Democrat Ro. At Belvidere Edmund H. Carhardt, Republican, was elected mayor by sixty-six majority over Dr. Lefferts, the Prohibi-tion candidate. The Democrats elected six councilmen.

Jersey City went Democratic by about 1,500. The Democrats elected their mem-1,500. The Domocrats elected their mem-bers to the street and water boards, while the Republicans secured two aldermen out of eighteen. The new board of alder-men is made up of nineteen Democrats and six Republicans. Hoboken went Democratic throughout, as did all of North Hudson county, including West New York, Guttenburg, Union Hill and Weehawken.

In New Branswick the Democrats elected four aldermen and the Republicans two, thus giving the Democrats a majority of the board. The Republicans elected the recorder and the Democrats the collector and the aldermen at-large.

The election at Paterson resulted in the return of four Republican aldermen and three Democrats. The Socialists carried one ward. The board will stand eight Republicans, seven Democrats and one So-Englewood elected Daniel A. Curry,

Democrat, mayor, over the Republican candidate by 142 majority. The Demo-crats elected the rest of their ticket, with the exception of one excise commissioner.

In Princeton the Republican ticket was

elected by a large majority. At Perth Amboy the whole Republican ticket, with the exception of the candidate for recorder, was elected. Phillipsburg elected a Republican mayor Washington voted for license, the new mayor being on the joint ticket. At Bordentown the election resulted in a victory for the Republicans, the full ticket, with the exception of one councilman, being returned. Lambertville returned three Democrats and one Republican to the

council, which stands 6 to 3 in favor of the The election at Trenton resulted in the election of the reform excise ticket by a plurality of about 1,000. The reformers ran on an independent ticket and were supported by the church people. The platform of the reformers was a stricter enforcement of the excise laws and a large reduction in the number of saloons. The councilmanic election resulted in the choosing of nine Republicans and two Demo

At Beverly Jacob D. Fich, Democrat was elected mayor by 164 majority over J. W. Huttingen, Republican. This will be Mayor Fich's third term.

In Camden the Republicans elected the head of the ticket, city treasurer, three excise commissioners, five councilmen and one councilman-at-large. The opposition reform ticket, under the direction of the committee of one hundred, elected two excise commissioners and four council-

Miners Discussing the Eight Hour Day. ISHPEMING, Mich., April 15.—Delegates from branches of the Upper Peninsula Lake Superior ranges, are in secret session here discussing the eight hour question. Most of the Ishpeming miners are now employed under the eight hour plan, and have no reason to ask for a change. It is understood that the Iron Mountain men favor the eight hour movement, but that the Marquette range delegates oppose it. In view of the large piles of ore stocked the companies are unlikely to accede to any demands by the union.

Three Candidates for Electrocution ALBANY, April 15.-Sentences of death were affirmed by the court of a yesterday in the cases of three York city murderers, namely Turfil Tuczkewitz, Louis P. Herman and Charles Pustolka. Tuezkewitz was convicted of the murder of Adolph Balenstefer, business partner. Herman shot and killed his wife in a family quarrel. Pustolka stabbed his wife eleven times because he believed her unfaithful. All three men are confined in Sing Sing prison awaiting

Good Showing for the B. and O.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Persons in a po-sition to know state that the report of Stephen Little on the Baltimore and Ohio and the Pittsburg and Western will show a condition of things considerably more favorable than the public has been led to suppose. The business of the road is now said to be showing satisfactory growth. and the returns are helped by the attitude of competing lines, which are standing by the traffic agreement.

Hauticstown, Md., April 15. - Lowis Ernde, the oldest resident of this city, committed suicide by hanging yesterday. He was 77 years of age, and until six menths ago was able to work. Mr. Ernde lost two sons in the month of April, two ar three years ago. They were smothered in a sandbank along the Antietam creek. He had a large family.
