The thirty-fifth anniversary of the response to President Lincoln's call to arms was fittingly inaugurated today by the remnant of the body of brave men who left Schuylkill county to travel the same route to the nation's capital that they did in 1861. The Pottsville Defenders were escorted to the Reading depot by the Pottsville Cadets this afternoon, boarding the 2:12 special train for Reading. The scene today from that of thirty-five years ago was a very different one. It was a more corporal's guard that marched to the beat of the drum this afternoon, wearing bronze badges awarded them by the government in recognition of their services.

Reading's Relief Association.

The statement of the Philadelphia & Reading Railroad Relief Association for the month of March, 1896, shows payments of benefits aggregating \$17,619.89. On account of deaths, \$7,147; on account of accidents, dismembers, \$4,534.40. Thirteen death claims were paid, four occurring from accidents and nine from natural causes. The total number of new cases reported during the month was 1,914.

Five Year Contracts Valid.

The Supreme Court handed down an opinion declaring valid a five-year contract made by City Councils. The opinion is the result of an appeal taken from the courts of Berks and Delaware counties. Both in the cities of Chester and Reading five-year contracts for street lighting were entered into between Councils and certain electric light companies. In Reading the City Controller refused to approve the contract, or approve warrants for the payment of lighting bills, and the matter was taken into court. Judge Ermentrout deciding no contract for a longer term than one year could be entered into by the City Council. The Metropolitan Electric Light Company took an appeal to the Supreme Court, which now declares the contract valid. This will settle a question that has been in doubt for sometime.

Improvements At Lakeside.

That delightful little summer resort, Lakeside, which furnishes thousands of workers in the coal fields with a day of recreation, is to be made even more attractive than before. The park and the hotel are fortunate in having for their manager this season a man of broad experience at large resorts, and his energy and ideas of the needs of the place have already begun to show themselves very substantially. The manager for 1896 is F. A. McClure, who in previous seasons was the proprietor of the Palace Hotel in the Catskills, a summer hotel provided with all the facilities with which a modern hotel is equipped. The Palace accommodated 150 boarders and rates were from \$15 to \$18 a week. It is partly with a view of accommodating this class of summer trade that the Lakeside Hotel is now being refitted.

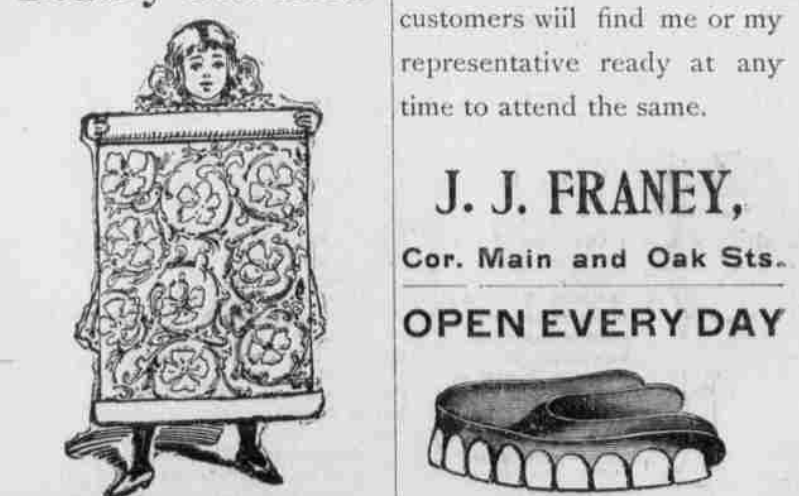
