REMEDIES. The Festivities Attending Emperor William's Visit to Austria.

HOW THE PEOPLE'S MONEY GOES

Expensive Pageants, Banquets and Decorations Mark the Meeting of Two Individuals Who Were Born to Bule-William's Love for His "Illustrious Ally,"

LONDON, April 16.-The Vienna corre spondent of The Times, in a description of the ceremonies connected with Emperor of the ceremonies connected with Emperor William's visit, says: Yesterday's parade goes a deal further than all the prose of the Austrian and German press towards manifesting the intimacy of the two monarchies. It was the first time Emperor Francis Joseph has assumed supreme command of a military parade since 1973, dur-ing the visit of the exar.

The different nationalities of the mon-

The different intionalities of the mon-archy were duly represented in the field, and the picturesque effect was enhanced by a sprig of green fir which every officer and man wore in his helmet as a token of the day being a festival. There were alto-gether forty-one battallons of infantry, or over 20,000 men. The first section was led by the Archduke Eugene, brother of the queen regent of Spain. queen regent of Spain.

The two monarchs were escorted by a

brilliant suite, in which were a thousand Austrain, German and other officers and military men it was the finest review ever witnessed here, both in point of numbers and efficiency. The spectators included four such dukes and the Arch Duchess Maria Josepha. Over 2,000 equipages con-tained the aristocracy.

At the lunch at the Josefstadt barracks,

Emperor William gave the following

toast:
"I remain faithful to the traditions of
my august grandfather. As he loved the
brave Austrian army, so am I devoted to
the gailant troops of my illustrious ally. I the gallant troops of my illustrious ally. I have highly appearated the opportunity afforded me today of leading my own regiment past the Emperor Joseph. I feel that I interpret the feeling of all present at this table when, with all my heart, I cry 'Hurrah for the emperor and his army.''

At 5 o'clock Emperor Francis Joseph

gave a grand military banquot of 189 covers at the palace. After the ban-quet a prolonged reception was held. No speeches were made at the banquet, and Emperor Francis Joseph accompanied Emperor William to the railway station at 8 o'clock. As an incident of the visit decorations have been showered upon the suites of both emperors.

ASSAILING PRANKLIN AND SMITH.

In the House Mr. Blue, of Kansas, Attempts to Prevent the Re-election of These Two Members of the Board of Managers of the National Soldiers' Homes

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The house yes WASHINGTON, April 18.—The house yes-teriny witnessed a rather sensational as-sault on General William B. Franklin, of Connecticut, president of the board of managers of the national soldiers' homes. and Governor A. J. Smith, of the Leaven-worth home, in connection with a resoluworth home, in connection with a resolu-tion for the reappointment of General Franklin and others to membership on the board. Mr. Blue, of Kansas, who de-clared war on General Franklin some time ago, while the sundry civil bill was before the house, renewed the attack yes-terday with the avowed intention of de-feating General Franklin and electing in his place General O. O. Howard. Mr. Blue charged that General Franklin was either grossly negligent and incompetant or disgrossly negligent and incompetent or dis-honest. His main assault, however, was directed at Governor Smith (for whom he charged General Franklin was responsi-Governor Smith he charged with drunkenness, cruelty and favoritism. He produced letters and telegrams to support

his allegations General Curits, of New York, a gallant soldier, who lost an eye at Fort Fisher, and Mr. Steele, of Indiana, a member of the board of managers, who is named for re-election on the board, defended the governor. The former said the official investigation of Governor Smith's conduct com-pletely exonorated him, and the latter in the course of his remarks declared that he had a library full of such literature as Mr. Blue had adduced. It was, he said, all ex parte and unworthy of credence. Both paid high tributes to General Franklin. Mr. Poole, of New York, who lost an arm during the war and who was a comrade of Governor Smith, testified to his personal character as a man and bravery as a soldier. The vote on the resolution will

be taken at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The senate spent the entire day on the Dupont case, Mr. Gray, of Delaware, arguing against the claim of Mr. Dupont. A TILT IN THE HOUSE, Mr. Blue Assails General Pranklin and

Washington, April 16.—The senate in executive session yesterday ratifled the Behring sea arbitration treaty. The treaty provides for a commission to arbitrate the claims made by citizens of England against the United States for seizures of vessels engaged in the capture of fur scale prior to the Paris award. It was verbally amended by the committee on foreign re-lations, but not to an extent to materially

change its purport.

The senate ratifled it without making any changes in addition to those made by the committee, and without any dissent-ing vote. The agreement was explained by Senator Sherman, chairman of the committee on foreign relations and by Senators Gray and Cullom. Senators Hoar and Chandler criticised the wording of the document, but interposed no obstacle to its final disposition. Senator Pugh sug-gested the absence of his colleague, Senator Morgan, and stated that the latter was desirious of being present when the treaty

should be taken up. should be taken up.

Attention was called to the fact that Mr. Morgan had opposed the settlement proposed by Secretary Gresham during the last session, but it was stated in reply that Mr. Morgan would be satisfied with the treaty as amended, and it was urged that as so much time had already ciapsed it was important that action be no longer delayed. Some questions were asked as to the amount involved in the proposed settlement, and it was stated in reply that this could not definitely be piven. 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
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
