HILL DEFENDS CARLISLE.

The New York Senator Objects to the Bond Issue Investigation.

BLUE'S FIGHT AGAINST FRANKLIN.

The Kansas Congressman Defeated in His Attempt to Prevent the General's Appointment as a Manager of the National Soldiers' Homes.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The resolution for an investigation of recent bond issues was taken up in the senate yesterday, and Mr. Hill made a sensational and dramatic speech in opposition. The New York senator defended Secretary Carlisle and his administration of the treasury against loose insinuations of irregularity, and showed the prevalence of charges of this character by presenting and reading in full the charges made by Senator Chandler against the friends of Mr. McKinley, that a levy of money was being made on protected industries in behalf of Mr. McKinley's candidacy for the presidency.

As a further evidence of the prevalence of charges Mr. Hill spoke of the sugar investigation, where, he said, one senator, referring to Mr. Quay, had frankly admitted that he bought sugar stock and had a right to buy it, and today that senator was the favorite son of the leading Republican state candidates for the presidency. In the course of his speech Mr. Hill disclaimed that he had authority to speak for the administration in opposing this investigation. The speech was continued today.

Mr. Blue's fight against the reappointment of General William B. Franklin as a member of the board of managers of the national homes for disabled volunteers, which was the feature of the proceedings in the house on Wednesday, terminated unsuccessfully yesterday, when his amendment to substitute the name of General O. O. Howard for that of General Franklin was rejected by a vote of 61 to 149. The debate on the subject was continued until 3 o'clock, and was at times quite spirited.

Both General Franklin and Governor Smith, of the Leavenworth Home, were eloquently defended by General Grosvenor of Ohio, General Henderson and Mr. Hull of Iowa and others. Mr. Hepburn of Iowa and Messrs. Kirkpatrick and Caldwell of Kansas spoke against General Franklin. The resolution adopted appoints General Franklin and Mr. Steele, of Indiana, to succeed themselves, George L. Beale, of Maine, to succeed General Fessenden, and General Thomas J. Henderson, of Illinois, to succeed General John C. Black.

Not a Case of Suicide.

PHILADELPHIA, April 17.—Coroner Ashbridge will hold an inquest this afternoon in the case of Joseph H. Louis, of New York, who died suddenly in the Bellevue hotel on Tuesday, and who was thought to have committed suicide. Louis was to have appeared yesterday in court in New York to answer four indictments charging him with forgery and embezzlement. Failing to appear, Recorder Goff declared his bail of \$10,000 forfeited, notwithstanding he was told the man was dead. The inquest, it is said, will result in a verdict of death from convulsions. Coroner's physician, Dr. Mattern, who died suddenly yesterday, had finished his autopsy on the body and told Undertaker Good the cause of death. Coroner Ashbridge, however, declined to express any opinion as to the outcome of the inquest.

Was Prepared to Break Jail.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 17.—In the cell of William Taylor, the Mosko family murderer, brought here from Carrollton to prevent a lynching, Marshal Koshler yesterday found a steel saw eight inches long and half an inch wide. It was concealed in an old satchel brought from Carrollton by Taylor. With this tool Taylor would have been able to saw his way out within half an hour could he have worked uninterrupted for that length of time. After making the discovery Marshal Keshler ordered two deputy marshals to watch the murderer's cell day and night, and refused to allow him to see any one but his lawyers.

Schaefer and Ives Both Winners.

BOSTON, April 17.—Billiard enthusiasts were given two opportunities yesterday to witness the contestants in the International billiard tournament at Bumstead Hall. Schaefer and Daly were drawn for the afternoon game, which resulted in favor of Schaefer by a score of 330 to 293. In the evening Ives and Garnier were matched, and the former was an easy winner, the score being 300 to 298. All of the men put up some brilliant billiards, but a draw shot by Garnier, fully half the length of the table, on which he scored, was one of the most clever witnessed during the tournament.

A Verdict for \$330,375.

NEW YORK, April 17.—Dudley Porter and others of Haverhill, Mass., in a suit against J. M. Siskin for \$1,000,000 secured a verdict yesterday in the United States circuit court for \$330,375. The plaintiffs charged that the defendant sold them a gold mine in Riverside county, Cal., and misrepresented its character. The defendant claimed that the misunderstanding arose over the incompetency or the negligence of the experts employed by the plaintiffs to inspect the mine. They also claimed that the mine was mismanaged after the sale.

Dishonest Election Methods in Madrid.

MADRID, April 17.—The figures of the poll at Madrid give more votes than there are registered electors. The Marquis Carbinana was not elected. He only obtained 14,000 votes, and has protested, contending that votes in his favor were given to other candidates. It was the marquis who brought the sensational charges of fraud against the municipal council which resulted in a riot and considerable legal complications.

The Harrisons First Reception.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 17.—General and Mrs. Harrison gave their first informal reception since their marriage yesterday afternoon at their home on North Delaware street. The callers, of whom there were many, were received in the drawing room, where there were simple decorations of palms and roses. General and Mrs. Harrison will receive again on Thursday afternoon in April.

A Retired Clergyman Burned to Death.

SOUTH MANCHESTER, Conn., April 17.—Rev. John B. Griswold, a retired Congregational clergyman, was burned to death yesterday while burning brush at his farm here. The exact manner in which the affair occurred is unknown.

DIPHTHERIA CONQUERED.

The Wonderful X Rays Will Totally Abolish the Disease.

CHICAGO, April 17.—Professor H. P. Pratt and Professor Hugh Wightman announce to the world their diphtheria and typhoid are absolutely killed by the Roentgen rays. This statement is made without reserve. The decision was reached last evening in the laboratory, when the last of the germs which had been exposed to the rays failed to show signs of life under the microscope. The result is the most important and most tempting imitation of human tissue. Professor Wightman prepared four new colonies of epidemic breaders. They were labeled as cholera, tuberculosis, hog cholera and diphtheria. They were located in tubes filled with nutrient. Professor Pratt turned the current into the great coil, and the rays, which is believed to be the great solution of infectious and contagious diseases, was thrown into the groups of bacilli. All the faults of the first trial were eliminated. The magic agency was allowed to work sixty-two minutes.

A critical and elaborate examination showed a great medical change. It was evident that the force had acted upon the artificial tissue. It is expected that free oxygen was made and an acid created, exactly as would take place in the human body. This acid either kills the germs or puts them to sleep. They will now be transplanted. The two physicians are risking their professional reputation by the prophesy that not one of the four groups will ever be able to recover. They are certain of the effect on the diphtheria—confidence concerning the other three. There can possibly be no failure on the score of machinery or appliances, and they have already proven the correctness of their theory.

Clover Club Honors Cuban Leaders.

PHILADELPHIA, April 17.—The Clover club gave a Cuban dinner last night, at which several members of the Cuban junta were present and made speeches. President A. K. McClure was in the chair, and among the guests were General Tomas Estrada Palma, the Cuban plenipotentiary to this country; Gonzalo de Quesada, secretary of the delegation; F. G. Pierra, of New York, chairman of the Cuban press bureau; Marcos Morales, president of the Cuban American league; Dr. John Gutierrez, several of the local Cuban leaders, and Captains Wiborg, Hughes and O'Brien, of the steamships Horsa, Laura and Bermuda. The latter in their speeches acknowledged that they had landed arms and ammunition for the Cuban patriots, and declared that they would do it again.

Nicaraguan Rebels Suing for Peace.

MANAGUA, April 17.—A telegram has just been received here from Nicaragua, where President Zelaya now is, which says that a messenger from the rebels is now on his way to this city bearing a message from the leaders of the revolt to the United States minister, Lewis Baker. It is supposed here that they want Mr. Baker to intervene and arrange a peace between the contestants. The only time that President Zelaya has up to this time been willing to consider an unconditional surrender on the part of the armed forces and the giving up for trial of the leaders. The progress of events recently had been steadily against the rebel cause.

Suffocated by Molasses.

CHICAGO, April 17.—Charles Vieth, a baker, suffocated himself with molasses on Wednesday. He was very fond of it, and in order to get enough he lay flat on his back on the floor, so that when he opened the clip on the barrel the syrup would flow into his mouth. Then he opened his mouth and clip, and was literally drowned by the syrup. He was found dead with his mouth open and the molasses pouring into it. He was known as a glutton, but was not strong mentally, because of an injury on the head sustained in an accident.

Two Lumbermen Drowned.

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., April 17.—While a number of men were trying to start a jam of logs on the Ausable river, between Keene Village and Bedes, a boat containing seven of the laborers was overturned. Henry Poole and Edward Nichols were drowned and Walter Harburst was badly injured. The bodies were not recovered.

Predicts a Victory for Silver.

DENVER, April 17.—Hon. Allen W. Thurman, of Ohio, sent a message to the Democratic state convention of Colorado predicting a victory for silver at Chicago if the Democrats from the western states are united and determined.

In the Interest of Wheelmen.

BOSTON, April 16.—The committee on railroads yesterday appointed a sub-committee to draft a bill compelling the railroads to carry bicycles free, as passengers' baggage, within the limits of the state.

NUGGETS OF NEWS.

At San Francisco Eddie Jones, the crack jockey, was thrown from Sweet Rose yesterday and badly hurt.

John Long, 38 years old, a Philadelphia and Reading railroad brakeman, was killed by a train at Mohrsville, Pa.

During a fire at St. Louis fireman William Gleason, formerly a well known baseball player, was seriously burned. He may die.

W. A. Boynton, ex-cashier of the bank at Franklin, O., is under arrest at Cincinnati on a charge of misappropriating the bank's funds.

On the opening of navigation on Lake Superior a big strike of coal handlers is threatened. They will demand a 30 per cent advance.

Miss Rose Roemer, of Zanoville, O., accidentally touched her eye with a hot curling iron, while frizzing her hair, and destroyed its sight.

Minister Ramsom telegraphs from the City of Mexico that he will secure the extradition of George M. Clarke, who is charged with drawing forged paper to the amount of about \$54,000 in South Dakota.
