

Fusion Fails in North Carolina.

RALEIGH, April 18.—The concurrence committees of the Republican and Populist parties, appointed by their respective executive committees to meet and determine whether there should be a continu-ance of fusion in North Carolina, as car ried out successfully two years ago, falled to agree after a prolonged session. The Populists demanded the governor and submitted a resolution declaring for free coinage of silver. The silver resolutions made it obligatory to vote only for silver candi-dates for office. The Republicans refused to accept the proposition.
