THE Evening Chronicle appeared yesterday in twenty-four pages in celebration of its twenty-first anniversary. The Chronicle is in the front rank of county seat journalism, and unlike some of its contemporaries of the same faith can always be found battling the cause of Democracy first, last and all the time. We wish our friends continued success for another period of twenty-one years.

J. WESLEY DURHAM, who has charge of the artistic end of the Quay campaign, says that he had superintended the distribution of about 500,000 buttons containing the portrait of the Senator. Of this number he has sent 187,000 to Allegheny, and he said the Quay leaders there wanted more. He says the demand for Quay buttons throughout the state is so great that enough cannot be had to satisfy it, and he points to this as indicating that no one else would have a show for President in Pennsylvania if the choice were left to a popular vote.

CONGRESSMAN KULP has announced himself as a candidate for re-election. As late as two years ago, the Seventeenth Congressional district was considered by the leaders of the great political parties as being absolutely certain to return a Democratic member of the House. The Republican nomination was an empty honor which was only accepted in order to complete the ticket and with no idea of success. The result, however, was a surprise to many when the returns showed that "Farmer" Kulp had carried the district. He will no doubt receive the Republican nomination again this fall.

McCLURE'S MAGAZINE for May will have an article by the eminent surgeon, Dr. W. W. Keen, indicating the uses already possible, as well as those likely to become possible soon, of the Röntgen rays in the study and cure of human deformities, injuries and diseases. The article will be fully illustrated from photographs taken by the new process. The Lincoln paper will contain some very interesting unpublished letters and anecdotes, showing Lincoln's rare tact and sagacity as a political manager, even as a young man. It will also describe Lincoln's life in Washington as a member of Congress in 1847-1849, and reproduce from the newspaper in which it was reported at the time an important but now unknown speech of Lincoln's made in New England in 1848. A number of rare pictures will appear with the paper.

THE announcement of the candidacy of Deputy Attorney General John P. Elkin to succeed Senator Quay as state chairman has fallen flat. He was identified with the Combine, and next week's convention is not likely to select one of that crowd for the position. As we have had occasion before to state, Frank Willing Leach will be the next state chairman. He will receive the endorsement of Senator Quay, and the fact that the latter's friends will control the convention assures Mr. Leach's election beyond a shadow of doubt. His canvass has not only brought to his support the younger element in the Republican party, but the old stalwarts recognizing him as a well tried and efficient

organizer with few equals and no superiors in the state are urging his selection. His great ability for detail work, his extensive acquaintance among the party workers, coupled with his knowledge of political warfare, make him an ideal chairman. We again assure that Leach will succeed Chairman Quay, and he will be selected by the state convention next Thursday.

Two Killed by an Explosion.

PROHA, Ill., April 18.—Shortly after 2 o'clock in the morning John Hoy and a man named Barnes were instantly killed by the explosion of a converter at the Lower Sugar works. John Wilson, Matt Connolly and John Dooly were seriously injured. Over a hundred men were at work on the fourth floor of the building in which the explosion occurred, and many narrow escapes are reported.

Mrs. Kane Committed for Murder.

PHILADELPHIA, April 18.—Mrs. Lizzie Kane, aged 40, accused of causing the death of her husband, William, at their home, 584 Lombard street, on Wednesday last, was committed to prison yesterday afternoon by Coroner Ashbridge. To await the action of the grand jury. The jury gave a verdict to the effect that Kane came to his death from a stab wound inflicted by his wife.

A Presumptuous Englishman Convicted.

FINDLEY, O., April 18.—Rev. Joseph E. Ebon-Powell, who was indicted at the January term of court for false registration, was convicted on Thursday. He is a native of England, and registered and voted without being naturalized. The act was done with the intention, he himself stated, of showing how the election laws in the United States are not enforced.

Murder Ended Her Honeymoon.

COLUMBIA, Pa., April 18.—James Dougherty, aged 26 years, last night shot and killed his wife, aged 19 years. He then sent a bullet into his own brain, and will die. The couple had been married less than four months, and lived at Litz, where the shooting occurred. No cause for the deed is known.

Fusion Falls in North Carolina.
RALEIGH, April 18.—The concurrence committees of the Republican and Populist parties, appointed by their respective executive committees to meet and determine whether there should be a continuance of fusion in North Carolina, as carried out successfully two years ago, failed to agree after a prolonged session.
