**THE TRIAL OF JACKSON.**  
Damaging Evidence Against Miss Bryan's Alleged Murderer.  
**WILL WOOD ON THE STAND AGAIN.**

Women Excluded from the Court Room While Two of Wood's Letters to Jackson Were Produced in Court—Fifty-two Witnesses Thus Far Examined.

NEWPORT, Ky., April 28.—In the Jackson trial yesterday not only was every available seat in the court room filled, but the occupancy of standing room in narrow passages was permitted. Ten witnesses were examined, fifty-two up to the present time. Much time was devoted to debating by counsel. Many questions during the day offered by the commonwealth were ruled out. The number of objections by the defense overruled was too great to enumerate. Twice during the day the jury were required to retire during debate. For the first time during the trial the court gave notice to women to retire, because the letters of Will Wood to Scott Jackson were not proper for them to hear. It has been the policy of the prosecution to bring out the bloody garments of the dead girl every day since the beginning of the trial, and yesterday was no exception.

The testimony of several witnesses was to strengthen links in the chain that have been already forged. Such was the case with the evidence of Mr. Legner, in whose saloon the valise in which Pearl Bryan's head was carried was hidden; of Ed Grillo, the Commercial-Gazette reporter who saw a river bridge ticket found on Jackson when first arrested, calling for the passage of horse and vehicle. One important point in Detective Crim's testimony of what he heard Jackson say in the sensitive cell was that, speaking to Walling, he said: "Well, old boy, you have played your part well."

Of the new testimony there was that of Charles Rogers, night clerk of Heider's hotel, that Walling came there after 3 o'clock in the morning of Feb. 1 with his clothes wringing wet, and rushed to bed without registering. He had never before or since staid over night at the hotel.

Harry Hays, of Greensburg, Ind., testified that he sold the shoes to Pearl Bryan on Nov. 18, 1895. He described them as No. 3, needle toe, diamond tip, the only pair of that kind that had been in his house. He also described the old rubbers which she wore on that occasion, which were not suited to that style of shoe, but had an opera toe. This he did before the shoes were shown him. His statement corresponds perfectly to the facts as shown when he identified the shoes.

Lieutenant Safferens, of Fort Thomas, gave the most minute and intelligent description of the immediate surroundings of the corpse, early after it was found, that has yet been given. He and Detective McDermott agree in testifying to an imprint in the slope like that made by one's foot to sit down heavily. He testified to seeing tracks along the slope and to discovering a glove trodden in the ground, which has already been identified as that of Pearl Bryan.

The defense brought Will Wood on the stand to interrogate about two vile letters written by him to Scott Jackson Feb. 1 and 3. Here it was that the women were required to retire. These letters are too coarse and indecent to be printed. One sentence reads: "Doc, if you have let a chance go by I'll give you h—l." Another reads: "If you have grown chicken headed you ought to be shot."

**The Spanish Elections.**

MADRID, April 28.—The final results of the elections for the senate are as follows: Ministerialists, 118; Liberals, 41; Independents, 17; Republicans, 4; Dissident Conservatives, 3; Carlists, 2. Senor Calleja (who was superseded as governor and captain general of Cuba by Martinez Campos) has been elected to the senate. It is expected that he will make some piquant declarations. The principal features in the elections have been the bribery in Bisaya and the huge contest in several provinces where the opposition candidates won despite the usual official pressure.

**North Carolinians Against McKinley.**

RALEIGH, April 28.—The Sixth district Republican convention at Maxton, although resulting in a bolt by the supporters of one of the candidates for the congressional nomination, refused to elect a single McKinley man on either ticket, one set of delegates being for Allison and the others preferring Morton or Reed. This is important, because the McKinleyites had been claiming this district, and it had been conceded to them until about two weeks ago.

**Probably the Victim of Thieves.**

VALPARAISO, Ind., April 28.—The body of a man, literally cut to pieces, was found early in the morning near Furnessville, on the road from the Michigan Central road. From papers found on his person it is thought his name was James B. Davis, of Francisville. He was well dressed, but no valuables were found on his person. It is thought he was robbed and thrown from a train.

**No Evidence Against Him.**

PHILADELPHIA, April 28.—Nicola Rossi, a young Italian, was on trial before Judge Gordon yesterday, charged with the murder by poison of Michael Santossous on Nov. 3, 1894, in a lodging house kept by Santossous at Seventh and Fitzwater streets. Rossi was arrested in New York some two weeks after the alleged crime. There was not a particle of evidence against the young man, although he had been kept in prison over the seventeen months, and Judge Gordon ordered the jury to acquit him.

**CONVICT'S CONFESSION.**  
Miss Allen's Statement Not Credited in Buffalo.

**CONVICTION OF THE ROBINSONS.**

It Was the Result of a Careful Trial, and the District Attorney Believes That Guilt Was Clearly Proven, Though Their Counsel Takes an Opposite View.

BUFFALO, April 28.—Sadie Robinson, who, with her husband Clarence, was convicted of the murder of Montgomery Gibbs, is alleged to have made a confession of the crime to Patrick Cusack, chief of detectives, while he was bringing her on a train from Cleveland to Buffalo. She repeated the alleged confession at police headquarters in Buffalo.

On the trial Cusack testified to the confession Sadie made on the train, but when she was called upon to testify she denied she had made a confession to Cusack. She said the detective had put the story in her mouth, and promised her immunity from punishment and a part of the reward if she would swear against Clarence.

Cusack's testimony of the confession was corroborated by Arthur D. Bissell, vice president of the People's bank, of Buffalo, and Montgomery Gerans, of the Hotel Iroquois, who were passengers on the train with Cusack and Sadie, and overheard her telling the detective she murdered Gibbs.

In an interview Mr. Cusack said, referring to the confession of Minnie Allen, the Wisconsin convict:

"I think she is a thief and a morphia fiend with whom we had some dealings about the time we were trying to solve the murder mystery. In response to a telegram from Deputy Schaffer, of Laporte, Ind., I interviewed her about eight months after the murder. She told a story about a sweetheart of hers named John Harvey, who she said shot Gibbs. She declared that if I would bring Harvey before her she would prove the truth of her story, but before I left her she admitted that she was faking; that there was no truth in her story."

District Attorney Kenefick views the confession in the same light as Mr. Cusack. He is convinced that the Robinsons are the guilty persons, as every detail of their confession was corroborated on the trial.

Attorney Hardesty, who was counsel for the Robinsons, says:

"Notwithstanding the conviction of the Robinsons, I have always believed that they did not commit that murder. I do not know who this woman prisoner is or anything about her beyond what is indicated by the chaplain's letter. Without such knowledge I cannot, of course, form an opinion as to the genuineness or falsity of her statement. I am satisfied that it was not the Robinsons who murdered Gibbs. But who did I cannot say. There is one impressive thing about her story, however, and that is that it came voluntarily."

"The first step I shall take is to find out who this woman in the Wisconsin prison is. Then the next thing is to investigate her alleged connection with the murder. In case there should prove to be evidence that she is willing to tell the truth to the liberation of the Robinsons is easy. On the other hand, if the confession should not prove to be founded on fact, then matters will revert to the situation they were in before I received the chaplain's letter, and I shall continue to work for the Robinsons on the evidence I have in hand."

**Senator Blackburn Will Not Compromise.**

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Senator Blackburn, of Kentucky, makes the following statement: "My attention is being daily called to statements made in the newspapers of compromise, either agreed to or pending, between the gold standard advocates and those who think with me in Kentucky. No compromise or adjustment has ever been offered from the gold men to me, and I surely have not suggested one to them. In the coming state convention in Kentucky the issue between the gold monometallists and my people will be definitely and finally settled, if my counsels shall prevail. With me there is no middle ground."

**Killed by a Flat Blow.**

PITTSBURG, April 28.—Josh Stahl, a furniture man employed in the wire works at Brookwood, was instantly killed by a blow on the neck delivered by Charles Edwards, a colored charger, employed in the same works. Stahl interfered with Edwards while he was working. When this was resented Stahl struck Edwards in the mouth and received the blow on the neck which caused his death. Stahl was quarrelsome, while Edwards, who is of giant stature, has always been noted for his quiet disposition.

**Kruger's Invitation Withdrawn.**

LONDON, April 28.—The cabinet held a meeting in order to consider the terms of the reply of President Kruger to the invitation of the secretary of state for the colonies, Joseph Chamberlain, to visit England. As a result of the discussion which followed Mr. Chamberlain subsequently made a statement in the house of commons to the effect that the government had withdrawn its invitation to President Kruger.

**Striking Against Child Labor.**

CHICAGO, April 28.—Three hundred employees at the yards of the Chicago Shipbuilding company, located at South Chicago, are out on a strike. Their complaint is against the introduction of child labor, wages not being considered. Some time ago boys were put in as "iron punchers," their duties being to perforate iron sheets, and this has caused unfavorable comment among the men in that department.

**Canada's Premier Resigns.**

OTTAWA, April 28.—Sir MacKenzie Bowell left the privy council department for Rideau Hall yesterday afternoon to tender his resignation as premier. There was a meeting of ministers afterwards in the council chamber. There is no doubt that Lord Aberdeen will send for Sir Charles Tupper to form a new cabinet.

**Despondency and Suicide.**

SALAMANCA, N. Y., April 28.—The dead body of John Rott, a Philadelphia hatter, was found by boys in a pond at Irvins Mills, where he is supposed to have committed suicide through despondency. Rott came here with his wife two months ago to secure work, and was unsuccessful.

**Another Conflict in Crete.**

ATHENS, April 28.—Another conflict has occurred in the Hagion Vasilion, district of Crete. It is alleged that twenty Turks were killed and thirty wounded. This is probably exaggerated.
