# NEW FRENCH PREMIER.

M. Meline Succeeds in Forming a Cabinet for France.

SOCIALISTS WILL OPPOSE HIM.

They Assert That the Formation of the Min-Parliamentary Usage -They Promise a Resolution Aimed at President Faure.

PARIS. April 20.—The announcement was made last night that M. Meline had succeeded in forming his cabinet. It is expected that M. Valle will become minister of commerce and that M. Lasombes will be minister of public works. All the others have already accepted. This will make the cabinet as follows: M. Meline, premier and minister of agriculture; M. Barthou, interior; M. Hanotaux, foreign affairs; M. Cochery, finance; M. Lebon, colonies; M. Valle, commerce; General Billot, war; M. Darlan, justics; Adimiral Besnard, marine; M. Lacombe, public works; M. Ramband, public instruction. The ministry will probably be gazetted tomorrow, as M. Meline wishes to be in PARIS, April 29,-The announcement

It is generally expected that at tomor-It is generally expected that at tomor-row's session of the chamber the cabinot will meet with vigorous opposition upon the part of the Radicals and Socialists. The latter have already declared a pitiess war upon the Meline ministry, the forma-tion of which, they assert, is unconsitu-tional and contrary to parliamentary usage. They promise a resolution almed at President Faure. The friends of M. Meline say he will not be deterred by this prospect, and it seems certain that with May day close at hand the chamber will not care to overturn a government which not care to overturn a government which is not yet guilty of any political wrong. The newspapers, however, all regard a dissolution of parliament as inevitable.

M. Felix Jules Meline was born at

Remirement, in the department of the Vosges, in May, 1838, and studied for the bar. After going to Paris his first public office was when Jules. Ferry was chosen mayor of Paris during the slege. In 1872 he was elected to the assembly, and re-elected in 1877. He was under secretary to the minister of the interior, M. de Mar-cere, in the Grovy cabinet.

cere, in the Grevy cabluct.

Not being in touch with Gambetta, Grevy's successor, M. Meline, rather lay under a cloud until 1883. In that year the Reinach and the Scheurer Kestner influence caused Ferry, to the astonishment of Gambetta's old friends, to be named his successor. When he entered office he gave his old friend Meline the portfolio of agriculture. He presided over the chamber of denuties when Floquet was at the mindeputies when Floquet was at the min-istry of the interior as premier. The elec-tion for the speakership in 1888 was a ti-Brisson and Meline having the same num-her of votes. But it was decided in Meline's favor, because he was a few months the senior of Brisson, who was, besides, out of favor.

The Republican candidates having been beaten at the first ballot at the general elections of 1885, Meline remained president of the chamber until the general elections of Constans in 1880. M. Meline is the recognized leader of the Protectionist party, and has also been very fortunate in holding on to his large following of farmpoliticians to whom no scandal attaches.

Feeble Anti-Consolidation Meeting.

New York, April 29.—If there are many thousands of people in this city op-posed to the greater New York bill last night's anti-consolidation raily at Cooper Union did not show it. The meeting was designed to be a citizens' protest to Gov-ernor Morton against the signing of the bill, and the call for it was signed by such men as Cornellus N. Bliss, General Hor-ace Porter, Colonel S. V. R. Cruger, General Anson McCook, ex-Mayor Hewitt and Lyman Abbott. The number of persons in the hall, however, did not exceed 300. A resolution denouncing the bill. and calling upon Governor Morton not to sign it, was adopted and sent by special messenger to the governor at Albany.

Ravages of Yellow Fever,

WASHINGTON, April 29. - The Marine hoswashing to stage in the most pital service is beginning to receive reports indicating that there is reason to fear severe outbreaks of yellow fever in Rio Janeiro and in Cuba this season. Dr. Cleary, United States sanitary inspector at Rio de Janeiro, in a report dated March 17, says that the fever attacked all except five of 258 persons aboard the Italian vessel Lombardis, and that 115, including the cap

The cause assigned for the act is that Locklin publicly stated that Secretary Carlisle was bribed by a gift of a cabinet position to change his at-titude on the silver question. Two Sets of Republican Delegates for St. Louis.

The Autis Flect Four Delegates with Differing Presidential Preferences and Ferm a Fusion with the Populists-Great Difficulty in Getting Halls for the Conventions

MONTHOMBER, April 28.—The Republicans of Alabama held two state conventions here yesterday. One, the McKinley convention, adopted a ringing protection and anti-free sliver platform, and determined to put a straightont Republican ticket in the field, headed by General J. W. Burke, of Calhoun. The other, composed of all the anti-McKinley factions, adopted a platform declaring that all other issues in Alabama were subservient to one issues in Alabama were subservient to one —fair elections—and therefore all issues excepting this were avoided in the plat-form. Money and protection are not re-ferred to in it.

A resolution was adopted by the antiMcKinley forces that the Republicans
fuse in the state elections with the Populists, allowing the latter to name the
nominee for governor and dividing the
balance of the state ticket between the
parties. The idea is to co-operate with
the Bentler. the Populists and secure fair elections in Alabama.

The intention until 10 o'clock had been for the Republican convention to be held in the assembly room at the state capitol, but the intimations of threatened trouble growing out of the seating of the thirtyfive contested delogations was imparted to Governor Oates by members of the state executive committee, and he declined the

use of the hall.

The McKinleyites promptly secured Dorwas made chairman. The temporary or-ganization of the McKinley convention was effected before dinner, and at the afternoon session a ringing platform de-manded a gold standard, protection and fair elections were adopted.
