Kemmerer's Sunday school class; broken wheel from Miss Anna M. Dengler's public school class; broken link from Mrs. Anstook; and a harp with seven strings from the family. The strings of the harp represented the children of the family and the second and seventh were broken. It was designed by Mrs. J. A. Giddin. A broken column was presented by companions of the deceased. The services were held in the Methodist Episcopal church and were conducted by Rev. I. J. Reitz, pastor of the United Evangelical church, Rev. Alfred Heebner, of the first named church, assisting. The pall bearers were E. C. Malick, J. G. Thuman, William Smith, Harry Wortz, William Campbell, of Mahanoy City, and Philly Maloy. Interment was made in the Odd Fellows' cemetery. COAL WILL BE HIGHER.

Anthracite Coal Companies Give Notice of an Advance on May 1.

The Philadelphia and Reading and the Lehigh Valley Railroad companies issued circulars in Philadelphia yesterday announcing that on May 1 they would advance the price of anthracite coal 25 cents a ton for all sizes. The Delaware, Lackawanna and Western gave notice of a like advance, and its example will be followed by the other New York companies.

The prices after April 30 will be \$4 a ton for stove, \$3.75 for egg and chestnut, and \$3.50 for grate. It is estimated that the reports for the current month will show an output of 3,000,000, which was about that of the same month last year, although the sales agents have agreed upon an output of only 2,500,000.

The spring trade has been dull this year, but all authorities agree that the stock in the yards of the retail dealers is small.

PENNSYLVANIA DEMOCRATS.

The Largest State Convention in the History of the Party.

ALLENTOWN, Pa., April 25.—The largest gathering of Democrats that has attended a state convention in years is sheltered in this city this morning. The remotest sections of the commonwealth have sent unusually large delegations, and as a result Allentown is overcrowded. Last night a big parade, participated in by organizations from all the eastern cities of the state, attracted thousands of people to the main streets. William F. Harity rode in a carriage at the head of the parade, and he was greeted with enthusiastic cheers all along the line. A dozen bands played lively music and tons of fireworks were burned. Such universal decoration of business houses and private residences has never before been seen in a convention city in this state, and much money has been spent by the citizens in this particular direction.

Everybody is for Pittison, and that gentleman will receive the unanimous and hearty endorsement of his state for the presidency in the convention. Mr. Harity is likewise on top and nobody doubts that he will secure the adoption of his unit rule. The platform makers have done their work, but nothing is given out regarding its declarations beyond the fact that it will contain a strong sound money gold standard plank.

William B. Given, of Lancaster county, will be the temporary chairman. The four electors-at-large will be William M. Singery of Philadelphia, James D. Hancock of Venango, Thomas Collins of Centre and George W. Guthrie of Allegheny.

Seven of the eight national delegates-at-large will be William F. Harity, Charles A. Fagan of Allegheny, State Chairman Robert E. Wright of Allentown, J. Henry Cochran of Williamsport, John S. Rilling of Erie, ex-Congressman B. F. Myers of Harrisburg and John T. Lennah of Wilkesbarre.

For congressman-at-large, John M. Braden of Washington county and Smedley D. Garrett of Delaware county have been slated.
