Obituary.

James M. Morgan died this morning at the residence of his son, R. H. Morgan, 26 South White street, aged 72 years, 4 months and 29 days. Death was due to general debility. The deceased had been a resident of this town from 1878. He arrived at St. Clair from England in 1849 and resided there until 1864, when he became a resident of Mahanoy City and remained there until he moved to this town. Mr. Morgan was a prominent member of the Episcopal church and was the organizer of the churches of that denomination in St. Clair, Mahanoy City and this town. He held the office of vestryman in All Saints' church, of town, at the time of his death. The deceased is survived by three children, R. H. Morgan, the West Centre street merchant; Mary H., of Lehigh, Pa., and Bertha A., of Bloomsburg. The funeral will take place on Monday, 4th inst. at 10:45 a. m., from the residence of the deceased's son, and proceed via Pennsylvania R. R. train from the Lehigh Valley depot to St. Clair. Services will be held in the Church of Holy Apostles and interment in the Odd Fellows' cemetery at St. Clair.

The Miners National Bank of Pottsville has declared a dividend of three per cent.

Hazleton wheelmen are up in arms over an ordinance that prohibits a speed of more than four miles an hour in the borough limits.

Mine Accidents.

In the Shamokin district not one accident has been reported, while in this district twenty-two accidents have occurred for the month of April. Four of the above number were fatal, while the remaining 18 are either working again, or rapidly recovering from their injuries. Gilberton colliery takes the lead with 1 fatal and 4 non-fatal accidents. Suffolk is credited with 4; East Bear Ridge, 3; Honey Brook No. 5, 2; and the following collieries 1 each: Oneida, North Mahanoy, Bear Ridge, Elmwood, Boston Run, Shenandoah City and Schuylkill. Of the four fatal accidents two occurred outside and two in the mines. Of the eighteen non-fatal, three occurred outside and fifteen inside. That which is the most noticeable in this report is that so few Polish were injured during the month, while they usually outnumber all other nationalities. This being a rare case we record the unfortunate as follows: American 7, English 6, Irish 3, Polish 5, Slavs 1, Welsh 1 and Russian 1.

Mine Inspector Roderick,

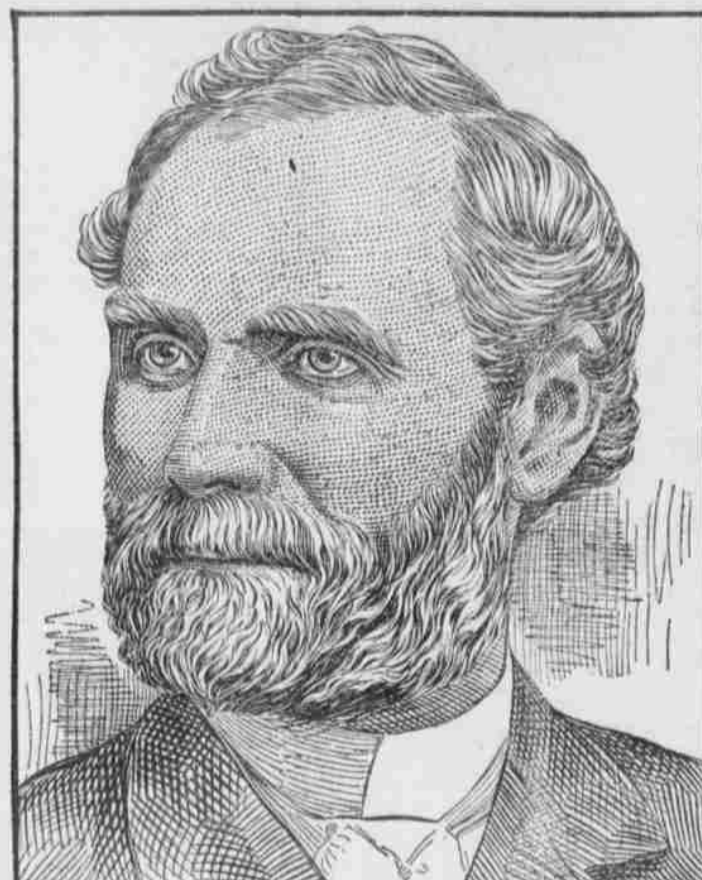
