POTTSVILLE LETTER.

The Result of a Bitter Newspaper Feud in Tamaqua.

POTTSVILLE, May 13.—In pursuance of the decision of Judge McPherson, the County Commissioners, by advice from their Solicitor, John O. Ulrich, Esq., have refused to recognize those Justices affected by the decision. They cannot do business without a commission, which has been refused them.

The libel suit of Richard O. Jones vs. Sophia M. Harris, John M. Harris and Henry Walters, all of Tamaqua, came up before Judge Albright yesterday. The suit is the outcome of a bitter feud between the Tamaqua Recorder and Tamaqua Courier. Richard O. Jones, prosecutor in the case, was a reporter for the Recorder and wrote under the name of "Cynic." Mrs. Harris is the widow and Administratrix of the late Robert Harris, proprietor of the Courier. John M. Harris is a son of Mrs. Harris and is acting as manager of the paper, and Henry Walters is a reporter for the Courier. An alleged libellous article appeared in the Courier and was applied to "Cynic." George J. Wallinger, Esq., stated that he had only been employed in the case at noon as R. H. Koch, Esq., counsel for defendants, was unable to be present. On this account he wanted a discontinuance in order to examine the indictment more thoroughly, which he thought was defective, so much so that there was grounds for a motion to quash the indictment.

District Attorney Dechler and J. O. Ulrich, Esq., on behalf of the prosecution, objected to a continuance as there were two homicide cases in the next term, one of which would take up at least a week. Judge Albright overruled the motion to continue, but counsel for the defense were granted time to make a motion to quash. At 4:30 p. m. the case was again brought up and the motion to quash was argued. After argument Judge Albright announced that the indictment should be quashed for the following reasons which were a part of the motion: First, that the alleged libellous matter does not refer to some ascertained person or is ascertainable from the matter itself, as being the said Richard O. Jones, as alleged by inuendo in said indictment; second, that the inuendo contained on the second page of the said indictment purporting to define or explain who "Cynic" is, is not clear and intelligible, and in not such an inuendo as can be made the basis of admitting evidence to prove who was meant by the word "Cynic."

Patrick Murphy and "Dick" Amour, the well-known detectives, were in Pottsville yesterday on business.

William Francis Doyle, M. D., has returned home from Philadelphia. Dr. Doyle graduated with honors last week from Hahnemann Medical College.

W. H. Jones died at the Pottsville hospital from an accident which at the time it happened was not considered serious. He was standing on a ladder, holding a water pipe, when it fell from his hands and threw him to the ground. He struck on his head and never regained consciousness.

John Leonard, an old and well known resident of Pottsville, died yesterday after a lingering illness. The deceased was 71 years old, and was born in County Derry, Ireland, and came to this country when a youth. In politics he was a Republican, and was elected County Commissioner in 1884. He leaves a widow and seven children. The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon.

Jacob Wilkales and Mike Savick, charged with assault and battery, on oath of Charles Goguzes, of Shenandoah, were found not guilty and the prosecutor must pay the costs.

The Centralia Shooting.

SPECIAL TO EVENING HERALD. CENTRALIA, May 13.—The condition of William Hepper, who was shot in his bar-room yesterday by Mike Corrigan, has improved so much and a diagnosis of the wound has proved so favorable it is now believed he will recover. Corrigan's whereabouts remain a mystery, although the police and detective force of the county has been on the alert since shortly after the shooting.

Cave-in at Lost Creek.

At about 4 o'clock this morning the caving in of workings of Packer No. 2 colliery near Lost Creek, pulled down the surface under the Lehigh Valley railroad main line, causing a breach 62 feet deep and 12 feet in diameter. It was necessary to maintain a transfer system at that point during the day. A gang of navvies from Delano was put at work soon after the occurrence to fill the breach. The work will be completed by eight o'clock to-night.

Eisenhart Buried.

The funeral of John G. Eisenhart, who was burned by an explosion of gas at Shenandoah City colliery on Monday, took place this afternoon, at 1:30 o'clock. Services were held in the United Evangelical church, Rev. I. J. Reitz officiating. The attendance was very large. The pall bearers were C. W. Dengler, G. W. Beddall, M. L. Kemmerer, John L. Hassler, R. Stocker and John Link. Interment was made in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

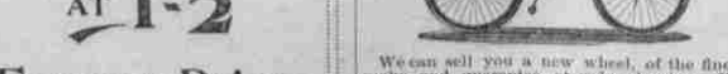
