AFTER BOODLERS. Taxpayers Say School Directors Share in Teachers' Salaries.

Special to Evening Herald. CENTRALIA, May 21.—An interesting law suit was tried here last evening before Justice of the Peace Loughlin, in which Miss Bridget McLain, a school teacher, was the plaintiff and the School Board of Conyngham township defendant. Miss McLain sued for four months' salary, aggregating \$390. The Board had paid her the salary for the first four months at the same rate, but in answer to the suit alleged that at the time Miss McLain and others were elected teachers nothing was said about salary. Two members of the Board, who made the motion electing the teachers and the one who seconded it, swore that the salaries were fixed, and it was a mistake of the secretary that the salary was not noted in the minutes. M. M. Burke, Esq., of Shenandoah, appeared for the teacher, and W. A. Marr, Esq., appeared for the taxpayers, mine operators and other large taxpayers for whom the opposing School Directors in the matter acted. In the summing up Mr. Marr gave an inkling to the true issue. He contended that a deal had been made between Miss McLain and certain School Directors by which the latter were to receive \$25 per month from her salary of \$95, and it was by reason of this deal that the heavy taxpayers of the township had made the fight. Justice Loughlin gave judgment for the full amount claimed and the taxpayers gave notice of appeal, their counsel claiming the case would be fought until the boodlers would be cornered.

The Coal Trade. In anthracite coal there is nothing of moment to report. 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GOVERNOR HASTINGS DENIES IT. He Is Not a Candidate for Vice President with McKinley.

HARRISBURG, May 21.—Governor Hastings said tonight emphatically denied the report emanating from Washington to the effect that Senator Quay wants him nominated for vice president with McKinley. The governor not only declared that he is not a candidate for the vice presidency, but added that he is satisfied with the office he now holds.

The only element of truth in the story, he said, is that concerning the governor's visit to Senator Quay at Washington. It is no secret that he went there ten days ago and talked with the senator in reference to the speech placing his name before the convention for president. As to the report that Senator Quay is going to Canton to consult McKinley on the money question, the governor said he knows nothing apart from what he sees in the newspapers.

"I have been elected a delegate-at-large by the Republicans of this state," he continued, "and I am instructed to support Senator Quay for the presidential nomination. I have agreed to make the nominating speech, and am assured by Senator Quay that he will be a candidate until a nomination is made. Every quality of good faith to the Republicans of the state and to myself precludes the idea of my being a candidate."
