BRILLIANT PAGEANTRY.

A Most Imposing Feature of the Czar's Coronation.

THE FORMAL ENTRY INTO MOSCOW.

The Czar and Czarina Visit the Holy Shrine and Offer Prayers for Russia's Prosperity. Over Forty Million Dollars Already Expended in the Celebration.

Moscow, May 22.—The scenes along Tverskaja street yesterday, the route which the czar followed from the palace to the Kremlin, were varied and picturesque. On this highway stands the Petrovskij palace, where the czars always reside previous to making their formal entries into Moscow. Consequently this thoroughfare is one of the most attractive in Moscow, and competition for windows along its length had been unprecedented, prices ranging from \$100 to \$800. But fabulous prices were paid for the best locations. All along the route special stands were erected for the accommodation of privileged people, some of the structures being gorgeous pavilions, more like permanent houses than anything else.

The French government, especially, has been put to a very great expense for the coronation fetes. Two of the largest palaces of nobility have been rented and fitted out in the costliest manner for the French representatives, one of the towers being a mile and a quarter of the most costly carpeting produced in France. The cost of the supper which their imperial majesties will attend under the auspices of the French delegation will cost over \$100,000, and the carriages used by the French envoys were the property of the Emperor Napoleon, built especially for the christening of the late prince imperial. Emperor Eugene allowed them to be sent to Moscow for the use of Comte de Montebello and General De Boisdeffre, the representatives of France.

Both carriages are in Louis XV style, with seven glass panels. That of the Comte de Montebello was painted, picked out and lined with green and amaranth, and the vehicle used by General De Boisdeffre was dark blue, striped with white and red and having rich mountings of gilded bronze. The hammer cloth was gurgundy and the borderings were in fine gold twists, with gold ropes and tassels behind for the footmen to hold on by. The muffs of the horses were plaited with gold cord.

The head of the procession which escorted the czar started from the Petrovskij palace at 2:30, but it was some time later before the royal family appeared, headed by the czar on horseback, and surrounded by courtiers who were superbly mounted.

A BUILDING COLLAPSE.

It Brings Death to Unsuspecting Workers in Buffalo.

PROBABLY SEVEN WERE KILLED.

Three Dead Bodies Already Removed and Four More Believed to be Buried in the Mass of Timbers and Brick—A Large Number Injured.

Buffalo, May 22.—Yesterday the Seneca street side of the Brown building, formerly occupied by the Western Union Telegraph company, collapsed, and a severe calamity was the result. The building was filled with offices, almost all of which were occupied. The Western Union left the building a few weeks ago, and the owners of the block began the work of remodeling and strengthening it. On the Seneca street side workmen were engaged in putting in place new iron columns and beams, when the walls of a section of the building fell in.

A Victory for Liberal Presbyterians.

SARATOGA, May 22.—The first day's session of the Presbyterian general assembly brought with it two surprises. The proposal in the moderator's sermon for a conference to arrange and pacify the differences which have troubled the denomination during recent years was the first. The second was the election as moderator of the first ballot, by a handsome majority, of a man who has been regarded as the candidate of the liberal party in the church. He is Dr. John L. Withrow, of Chicago. This view of the new moderator's tendencies was stoutly denied, but at all events his first act was accepted as showing a determination to be independent of control and dictation. This was a call for a meeting of two representatives from each presbytery to aid him in the selection of committees. Instead of calling upon a few prominent commissioners for advice.

The czar and czarina, the imperial prince and the imperial princess, upon arriving at the gate left their carriages and entered the Cathedral of the Assumption by the south gate, preceded by the grand marshals of the coronation, the arch grand marshal of the coronation, the arch grand marshal of the court.

The czar was followed by the minister of his household, the minister of war, the aide-de-camp general commanding the military household of his majesty, and other important aides-de-camp. Behind them came the imperial highnesses and the foreign princes, and all witnessed the solemn celebration of a Te Deum, which was accompanied by prayer for the lives of their majesties and for the happiness of Russia.

Inside the cathedral their majesties found assembled all the personages who had not been able to take part in the procession from the Petrovskij palace to the Kremlin, such as many ladies of the court, a number of members of the council of the empire, the ministers, the chiefs of different administrations, the senators, the secretaries of state, etc.

The czar and czarina bowed reverently before the relics of the saint and prayed before the images. From the Cathedral of the Assumption the czar and czarina, accompanied by the imperial family and by the most distinguished of the foreign princes, went to the Cathedral of the Archangel Michael, where a Te Deum had been previously celebrated. Their majesties were followed and were received at the steps of the Cathedral of the Archangel Michael by his highness, the Archbishop of Novgorod, with the cross and holy water.

After having venerated the holy relics and the holy images, and prayed before the tombs of their ancestors, their imperial majesties went towards the Cathedral of the Annunciation, preceded and followed in the same manner.

Upon leaving the Cathedral of the Archangel Michael their majesties found assembled at the door all the ladies of the court who had accompanied the czar and czarina from the Cathedral of the Assumption. They followed their majesties to the door of the Cathedral of the Annunciation, but without entering it, although they subsequently followed the imperial party to the Palace of the Kremlin.

At the gate of the Cathedral of the Annunciation, where a Te Deum and prayers had been previously celebrated and enthroned, their majesties, preceded and followed in high state in the manner already described, approached the holy images and relics in the same manner as before, and eventually left the sacred edifice for the palace, traversing the principal halls in state, and being received everywhere with the highest ecclesiastical military and civil honors.

At the moment their majesties entered the Palace of the Kremlin an artillery salute of 101 guns was fired, and throughout the journey of their majesties the bells from all the belfries in Moscow were tolling.

The czar and czarina will remain at the palace in partial seclusion until May 28, when there will be a grand review of the troops and the community of the consecration of the imperial standard, which always occurs three days before the coronation.

The building is the property of the estate of one of the Brown brothers, of London, England, and was by him willed to two of his daughters.
