METHODIST CONFERENCE

It Honors Editor Buckley with a Unanimous Re-election.

A COMPLAINT AGAINST BISHOPS.

Rev. Mr. A. C. Bowditch Profers Formal Charges of Unfair Treatment—The Coming Fight Over the Tobacco Habit—Proposed Retirement of Bishop Taylor.

CLEVELAND, May 23.—The Methodist general conference occupied itself yesterday in electing editors of church papers and secretaries of church societies. Very little remains now in the way of elections. When Rev. Dr. J. M. Buckley was overwhelmingly elected editor of the New York Christian Advocate there was an immoderate ovation to the popular New Yorker. Resolutions were adopted favoring arbitration and will be copied into foreign languages and sent to rulers of nations throughout the world. Bishop Goodsell was excused from further attendance upon the conference, as he must go abroad. Portland, Ore., was selected as the sixteenth episcopal residence, and rules to be followed by the bishops in selecting their stations from among the residences provided were adopted.

In the afternoon several of the committees met, certain of them for the last time, since they have accumulated enough reports to keep the conference busy for the rest of the month. The bishops met in the afternoon and talked about the selection of their residences, but did not reach a conclusion. In the evening a meeting in the interests of the deaconesses' work was held and a number of deaconesses were consecrated.

Rev. A. C. Bowditch, of Springfield, L. I., proffered formal complaint against Bishops Fowler and Fitzgerald, before the committee on episcopacy. He claims that in 1894 Bishop Fowler, while presiding over the New York conference, transferred him, without his knowledge or consent, from New York to the New England conference. He says he went to the New England conference, then in session, and that Bishop Fitzgerald declined to receive him, on the ground that he already had more ministers than he could use. Mr. Bowditch went back to New York, but the conference was ended and he was left without occupation. He asks for \$250 for house rent and furniture. Bishop Fowler says Mr. Bowditch wanted to go to Boston and that he supposed he had a call from a church there. The case was referred to a sub-committee.

The committee on episcopacy had an important meeting last night. The request that a missionary bishop be elected for the colored people of America and Africa was temporarily tabled. The proposition to cut India into two conferences was tabled, but another missionary bishop to assist Bishop Thoburn in India was recommended. A missionary bishop was also recommended for South America. The committee decided to report the non-effectiveness of Bishop Taylor, of Africa, who is 70 years old, and recommended that a missionary bishop be elected to take his place. The retirement of Bishop Taylor was considered when the cases of Bishop Bowman and Bishop Foster were considered, but action was deferred owing to the unfinished condition of financial affairs under his management.

There was a hot debate in the committee on itinerancy on the proposition that the bishops be directed not to appoint at annual conference officers addicted to the use of tobacco. The vote stood 24 yeas and 22 nays. The fight in the general conference on this matter will be even more lively. The proposition that bishops be guided in appointment of ministers by the wishes of the majority of presiding elders was very quickly killed.

The committee on state of the church, after much discussion, decided not to take action on a petition requesting that section 25 be stricken out of the discipline. This section relates to certain passages of scripture which recommend that women do not wear precious stones and fine apparel.

Died Cheering for Cuba.

KEY WEST, Fla., May 23.—Advices from Cuba state that on May 6 a fight occurred at Cruces, province of Santa Clara, between the Spanish and insurgent troops. The Spaniards lost ten killed and twelve wounded, and then sheltered themselves in small forts. The Cuban loss was ten dead and wounded. The Spaniards captured Commander Mamerto Romero, who, with seven men, endeavored to capture an entrenchment. The Spaniards wanted to burn Romero alive, thrusting him with their bayonet points and committing various other outrages upon him. On May 14, notwithstanding that Romero was badly wounded, he was shot. As he knelt he shouted "Viva Cuba Libre!"

CZAR AND AMERICANS.

Our Representatives Received by the Russian Autocrat.

WORE THE CIVIL COURT DRESS.

The Grand Duke Michael to Resign the Presidency of the State Council and Retire to Private Life After the Coronation Ceremonies.

Moscow, May 23.—The Duke of Connaught, representing Queen Victoria at the coronation festivities, has presented to the czar the Grand Cross of the Victorian order, which has been newly founded by Queen Victoria, and also an ornamental vase of the Armada pattern.

The czar yesterday received in private audience the United States minister, Mr. Breckinridge, and the members of the special envoy of the United States sent to represent the government of the United States at the coronation, together. Those included General A. McD. Cook and his brother, Aide-de-Camp Scriven, Commander Bronson and Major J. W. Patzki, of the special embassy, and Rear Admiral T. O. Selfridge, in command of the Mediterranean squadron, who brought his flagship, the Minneapolis, to Constantinople to attend the coronation as the naval envoy of the United States.

Mr. Breckinridge, the United States minister; Mr. H. H. Poiree, secretary of the United States legation, and the other civil representatives wore for the first time at the Russian court the full civil dress prescribed for those who are not allowed to wear the official uniform.

Minister Breckinridge, the special envoy and their staffs last night attended a reception given by the Russian foreign minister, Prince Lobonoff-Rostovsky. Next week Mr. Breckinridge will give a dinner to distinguished American visitors to the coronation, and later, probably on June 3, will give a reception, inviting the Russian princess and foreign princesses attending upon the coronation and the foreign ambassadors and about a thousand others.

The special embassies to the coronation of France, Spain, Japan and Korea were also received in audience by the czar and carina in the great palace of the Kremlin yesterday. A gilded six horse coach and several four horse carriages were sent to fetch each embassy and suite. Each embassy was escorted by six mounted gendarmes, and was received by guards of honor at the Kremlin, where they were conducted with great ceremony to the Alexander salon and thence to the Ekaterin hall, where they were received in audience.

Grand Duke Michael to Retire.

BERLIN, May 23.—According to news from Moscow, after the coronation the czar's great uncle, Grand Duke Michael Nicolaevitch, will resign the presidency of the state council and retire from public life. He will be succeeded in that office by the Grand Duke Vladimir Alexandrovitch, the czar's oldest uncle, whose post of commander of the guards goes to the Grand Duke Sergius, whose wife, formerly Princess Elizabeth of Hesse, is the czar's sister, who will thus be located at St. Petersburg. It has been the czar's desire to have his favorite sister near her, Count Voronoff-Dashhoff will succeed Grand Duke Sergius as governor general of Moscow.

Russian Opposition to France.

LONDON, May 23.—The Daily News publishes a dispatch from Moscow which says: "Popular comments on the French mission are in no way flattering, and the French alliance is strongly deprecated by the lower classes, and even by the enlightened official classes, who have justly discovered that there is no depth of sincerity in the professed feelings of the French alliance is simply regarded as an extension of the European situation, to be dropped when it has served its purpose. The time is probably not far distant when Russia will be in a position to discard all western European alliances."

Alleged Violation of Contract Involving a Big Fortune.

TRENTON, May 23.—Charles A. Furbush, of Philadelphia, yesterday brought suit in the United States circuit court against Secretary of State Henry C. Kelsey, of the Newark Gas Light company, the Citizens Gas Light company, of Newark, and the Newark Gas company. Mr. Furbush states that in 1898 John P. Porsch, of Philadelphia, entered into a contract with Kelsey under which the latter was to sell him the entire capital stock of the two first named corporations for the purpose of consolidating them and forming the Newark Gas company. Porsch was to pay Kelsey \$7,000,000, reserving as his profits out of the deal \$1,000,000 of gold bonds and \$1,500,000 of the preferred stock and \$300,000 of the common stock of the proposed new company. Kelsey is alleged to have secured for the new company all the gas business in Newark for ten years or more, supplying the gas for not less than \$1.40 per thousand cubic feet to private consumers and for not less than \$1.25 to public consumers.
