Collapse of a Bridge at Victoria, B. C., with Fatal Results.

DROWNING ACCIDENT IN ILLINOIS.

Boat Epset by Wind and Fourteen Lives Lost - Further Reports from the Cyclone Strickelp Districts of Michigan and Iowa. Forty-tipree Deaths in Michigan.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 27 .- A terrible acrident occurred here yesterday by a bridge giving way, carrying a crowded street car with it. All the train cars (were packed. Two cars left Government street with upwards of a hundred peciple. 886,000 Damage in Two Counties. BAY CITY, Mich. May 27.—The wind storm that swept over this city Monday night developed into a cyclene in Merritt township just before it reached Tuscola county.
