**FATHER KENNEY BURIED.**  
 The Services Attending the Beloved Pastor's Funeral This Morning. Special to EVENING HERALD.  
**CENTRALIA, May 25.**—For the second time within a year the congregation of St. Ignatius church at this place, was called upon today to follow the remains of a beloved rector to their last resting place. It was a little over a year that Father Powers was laid at rest in the church yard, and this morning the remains of Rev. Charles F. Kenney, who died on Monday, were interred in the parish cemetery.  
 Vicar General Koch, of Shamokin, conducted the ceremonies, assisted by other prominent clergy of the Catholic church. Revs. H. F. O'Reilly and Henry Naylor, of Shenandoah, were in attendance. The funeral cortege was a large one, and while the remains were being interred the sorrow of a mourning people was noticeable.  
 Father Kenney was born in Ireland 34 years ago, where several sisters, the only surviving members of his family, now reside. He was educated for his priestly office in Maynooth College, Ireland, and shortly after his graduation in 1870 he came to this country, and was ordained by the now deceased Bishop Shannon, of the Harrisburg diocese. Had he lived until July next he would have celebrated the 25th anniversary of his elevation to the priesthood. He was assigned to church work at Harrisburg, Middletown, and Geneva, in this state, and two years ago he came to Centralia from Williamson, having been appointed curate to the late Father Powers. On the death of that reverend gentleman he was invested with the full powers of pastor of St. Ignatius church.
