PHILADELPHIA, May 29.—Herman Keok, a member of the firm of Keok, Coasterman & Co., diamond importers, of Cincinnati, was found guilty yesterday in the United States district court of attempting to smuggle diamonds. It was shown that Keok had given the captain of the steamer Rhynland a package containing \$7,000 worth of diamonds addressed to F. Von Reiter, of No. 21 West Fourth street, Cincinnati. Counsel for Keok made a motion for a new trial.
