Happenings Throughout the Region Chronicled for Hasty Perusal.

Carpenters have begun work on Connellman Magargle's new house on South White street.

A Taxpayers Association has been organized in Luzerne county "to watch the county officials."

Jacob Kunzig, of Mahanoy City, aged 92 years, died on Sunday. The funeral will take place to-morrow morning.

Thomas McCole, of town, is serving 48 hours in the Mahanoy City lockup for being drunk and disorderly.

Lehigh Valley shop employees at Hazleton are much incensed at an order prohibiting smoking during the noon hour.

Gottlieb Eyer, of Shamokin, has resigned as outside foreman at Bear Valley colliery. He assumes charge of a colliery in West Virginia. He is succeeded by Peter Wendling, of town.

Pope Leo XIII, on June 21, celebrates his 75th jubilee and Archbishop Ryan has requested the prelates of his diocese to have all the young children of their congregations to make their first communion on that day.

GOOD HAUL BY ROBBERS.

P. J. Cleary is a Larder of at Least Two Hundred Dollars.

Sometime between midnight and 5:15 o'clock this morning burglars got into the Cleary residence, at the corner of White and Cherry streets, and made a good haul. They entered through a cellar window which had been left open. The articles stolen consisted of a gold watch and chain valued at \$175, two hats, two pairs of cuffs, a pair of cuff buttons and a collar. All the articles except a hat and cuff buttons belonged to P. J. Cleary. One of the coats stolen contained a mileage book and a time book used in connection with his Hazleton contract. From a vest belonging to Anthony Cleary \$1.25 was taken. There is no clue to the robbers. The only thing thus far learned is that Mrs. Parrish, a neighbor, says she heard a noise about the Cleary house at about 4 o'clock this morning. The robbers did not visit the upper part of the house, and it is lucky for John F. Cleary, the bottler, that they didn't, as there was a wad of \$500 within easy reach. Mr. Cleary having made his collections yesterday.

Salesman Ware Returns. S. T. Ware, the salesman for the Hooten Mercantile Company, of Mahanoy City, who so mysteriously disappeared from his home about a week ago and was last seen at Brownsville, returned home yesterday morning. Mr. Ware is unable to account for his disappearance and stated that he does not remember anything from the time he left Brownsville until he awakened on Sunday morning and found himself lying under a freight car in Philadelphia. He finally reached the home of his brother-in-law in that city, who placed him on a train for home. He is now lying in a critical condition at his home in Mahanoy City, and no one is allowed to enter his room. At times he is delirious.

AN INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION.

The House Passes the Phillips Bill to Create That Body.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Yesterday was a suspension day in the house and a number of minor bills were passed under suspension of the rules. The Johnson-Stokes election contest from the Seventh district of South Carolina was settled by the adoption of a substitute for the committee reports, which declared that there had been no election and that the seat was vacant. The bill for validating certain territorial bonds of New Mexico was passed with some amendments, but will have to be again acted on by the senate because of a parliamentary error. The Phillips bill for an industrial commission of twelve members and the bill for funding all obligations of Arizona were also passed.

The final vote on the Butler bill to prohibit the issue of bonds will be taken into the senate before adjournment today. Most of the session was given to debate on the bill, Mr. Cullom speaking against it as a step toward repudiation, and Mr. Brown, of Utah, in favor of the bill or a resolution offered by him, declaring that bonds under any future issue would be illegal and void.

Children's Ghastly Find. LANCASTER, Pa., June 2.—The mutilated body of a child supposed to be between 7 and 8 years of age was found in a remote part of the Colebrook hills, just across the Lebanon county line, Sunday afternoon. The body, which was minus head, hands and feet, was sewed in a sack which was lying among some rocks in a lonely wilderness that is rarely frequented by human beings, and some children on their way to Sunday school were attracted to the spot by a stench which was caused by the decomposition of the body. It had probably been there for a month, if not longer. The general supposition is that the child was killed at some distant place.

Quay Admits McKinley's Nomination. WASHINGTON, June 2.—It is now stated, on what appears to be excellent authority, that Senator Quay will cast the vote of Pennsylvania for Major McKinley on the first ballot at St. Louis. Senator Quay's name will have been presented to the convention as a candidate for the nomination. He will thus have carried out the pledges he gave to the other presidential candidates. When Pennsylvania is called, with the certainty that McKinley's nomination will be an accomplished fact on the first ballot, Senator Quay will see to it that Pennsylvania gets the credit of casting the decisive vote.

St. Louis Appeals for Aid. ST. LOUIS, June 2.—Both houses of the municipal assembly of St. Louis last night adopted resolutions asking outside aid for the cyclone sufferers. All donations are to be sent to the mayor or police commission of St. Louis, or to any other committee which may have charge of the relief funds. A large number of leading citizens, including the mayor, oppose the appeal for outside aid. The list of known dead in this city is now placed at 141; unknown dead, 13. Known dead in East St. Louis, 109; unknown dead, 2.

Reed Won't Have Second Place. BANGOR, Me., June 2.—In an interview today Hon. J. H. Manley said: "I have never written to Mr. Hanna or any other person that Thomas B. Reed would accept the nomination for vice president. On the contrary I know that Mr. Reed will not accept this nomination under any circumstances. We expect to nominate him for president."

Lavigne Defeats Borge. LONDON, June 2.—"Kid" Lavigne fought "Dick" Borge last evening before the National Sporting club for the international championship of the world, a purse of \$3,500 and a side bet of \$2,500. Lavigne won in eighteen rounds. The fight was to be limited to twenty rounds, but Lavigne was so evidently the superior that the referee stopped the fight to prevent serious result.
