The court yesterday granted a preliminary injunction to restrain County Treasurer Dechert from selling the lands of the Phila-Dechert from selling the lands of the Phila-delphia & Reading Coal & Iron Company, in Blythe township, for unpaid road taxes levied in 1884. The bill in equity as filed by John F. 
