

Visited by Consul General Lee at Cabannas Fortress.

TO RECEIVE BETTER TREATMENT.

General Weyler Promises That They Shall ter Quarters-General Gomez Greatly and

Havana, June 10.—On Sunday after-mon United States Consul General Lee-visited the Cabanas fortress and saw Julio Sanguilly and the prisoners taken on board the schooner Competitor. General Les found them shut up in a dungeon with negro prisoners. Alfredo Laborde, with negro prisoners. Alfredo Laborde, who is said to have been the leader of the Competition expedition, and who is an American citizen, was found to be very sick. He said that he was suffering from grip, and that the doctor had said that he would get better eare while confined in the fortress than in the hospital. Laborde did not complain of bad treatment, though the air of the durseon whose he the air of the dungeon where he was confined was damp and the walls moist.

Consul General Lee, having learned that

the officer of the guard was reprimanded by the governor of the fortress for allow-ing the visit, visited Captain General Weyler to offer his excuses. Captain General Weyler, however, apparently did not think badly of General Lee's visit to the prisoners, although it contravened the the presenters atthough it contravened the rules and laws of the fortress. General Lee informed Weyler of the sickness of the prisoners and of the bad condition of their dungeon. General Weyler promised that they should be placed in a better sit-

Jose Maceo, Perico Perez and Rabi have entered the town of Jiguani, province of Santiago de Cuba, which was defended by a garrison of eighteen Spanish soldiers. General Gasco afterwards dislodged the insurgents from Jiguani. No further de-tails of this engagement have been re-

The insurgents who were recently defeated at Ventas and Casaniva were under the leadership of Calixto Garcia. Major Ramos had a skirmish at Puenta Brava, this province. The Insurgents lost two

Both were members of the Illinois state militia, and went to Cuba on the Torre especiltion last November, and worked their way up to the rank of first licatenant. Now they are in co-operation with Licatenant Arteaga in fitting out an transportant expedition.

Associated with them in this work is Major Tomas Bosser Roemer, who also was with Gomez. These four men have credentials signed by the commander-inchief, Maximo Gomez, which constituted each of them a commissioner to forward supplies of ammunition to the insurgent army. As soon as these arrangements. army. As soon as these arrangements have been perfected these commissioners will return to Cuba-

"The trocha is not much more difficult to pass than any other Spanish line," said Lieutenant Arteaga. "Our messengers go back and forth at will. General Gomez is much pleased with the trocha. He says:
'I have 30,000 Spaniards shut in along that
trocha line. I wish Weyler would estab-lish more. They are as good as prisoners.
As long as the Spaniards are there they do not bother me. In fact, they die along that ditch faster than they would be killed in battle and with infinitely less trouble

BOND INVESTIGATION

Secretary Carlisle Reports to the Senate Sub-Committee.

NECESSITY FOR RECENT ISSUES.

The Large Exports of Gold, Which Began In 1893, Reduced the Beserve Fund Early In 1894 to 869,757,824-A Formidable Array of Figures.

Washington, June 10.—Secretary Car liste's report to the sub-committee on the senate finance committee charged with the investigation of the sale of United States bonds during the years 1894, 1895 and 1886 is just made public. Reviewing the con-ditions which led to the bond issues the secretary says:
"Largely on account of apprehensions

in this country and abroad as to the abil ity of the government to continue the current redemption of its notes in gold coin and maintain the parity of the two metals the exports of gold during the fiscal year 1865 reached the unprecedented amount of \$108,680,844, nearly all of which was withdrawn from the public treasury by the presentation of notes for redemption. During the three months next preceding March 7, 1898, when I assumed control of this department, the withdrawals of from the trensury amounted to \$35,563,000 and during the eight months next suc-ceeding that date withdrawals amounted to \$50,507,219, while the exports amounted

"These withdrawals and shipments be gan on a large scale in June, 1892, and con-tinued with only short periods of inter-mission until the close of the fiscal year 1893. On Dec. 31, 1892, the free gold in the treasury amounted to \$121,286,692.25, and on the 28th of February it had fallen to \$100,784,918.91. The reserve fund would have fallen below \$100,000,000 before March i, 1898, if my predicessor in office had not effected arrangements in January and February by which the sum of about 88,250,000 in gold was procured from cer-tain bankers at New York in exchange for United States notes and otherwise.

Notwithstanding the most strengen efforts of the department to maintain the \$100,000,000 reserve intact the presentation of notes for redemption to procure gold for shipment abroad continued to such an extent that on April 22, 1893, for the first time since the fund was established, it be came necessary to use part of it for redemp lon purposes, and it was reduced to 805 and was reduced on Jan. 17, 1804. to \$69,757,824.

"The cash balance then in the treasury, excluding the current liabilities, but including the gold reserve and all subsidiary and minor coin, was only \$83,961,492. Very little gold was being received on account of dues to the government, and it was therefore impossible to increase the reserve without resorting to the issue and sale of bonds under the authority conferred by the resumption act. The call of Jan. 17, 1804, for an Issue of \$39,000,000 brought to the treasury \$58,000,917.

brought to the freesury \$55,009,017.

"On March 6, 1894, after this sale had been completed, the free gold amounted to \$107,446,802, and after falling to \$52,189,509 on Aug. 7, 1894, it was slowly replensished by voluntary exchanges of gold cain for United States notes and other currency by the banks, and by small receipts of gold in the payment of dues to the gov-ernment, until Nov. 17, 1894, when it reached \$61,878,374. In the meantime the frequent presentation of notes for re-demption in gold by individuals and in acception in gold by individuals and in-stitutions not desiring it for export clearly indicated the existence of uncasiness in the public mind. And as the season was approaching when large exporta-tions nearly always occur it was considered absolutely necessary for the main-tenance of the public credit and the con-tinued execution of the momentary policy

tinued execution of the monetary policy declared by congress in the act of July 14, 1890, and repeated in the act of Nov. 1, 1893, to resort again to an issue of bonds. "Public proposals accordingly were issued for the sale of additional 5 per cent. ten year bonds to the amount of 850,000, 000. There were 486 bids received amounting to 8178,836,050, nearly all of which were at rates which would yield to the investors 3 per cent. or less. One bid for the whole sum of 850,000,000, 'all or none,' upon the sum of \$50,000,000, 'all or none,' upon the basis of 2.878 per cent., being the most advantageous offer for the government that was made, either singly or by aggregating the separate bids, was accepted.

"The payments into the treasury on account of this sale, amounting to \$58,518, 500, were not entirely completed until after Dec. 1, 1894, and it soon became evident that the transaction had not been effectual to stop withdrawals of gold, and on the 8th of that month the reserve had been reduced to \$41,540,181. The situation was so grave that the attention of congress was called to the subject by a special message

from the prosident.
"Congress having failed to pass any measure for the relief of the treasury or to keep any action calculated to allay the serious apprehensions then existing in the public mind, a contract was entered into on Feb. 8, 1895, with August Belmont & on Feb. 5, 188, with August Bernott & Co. of New York, on behalf of themselves, and N. M. Bothschilds' Sons of London and J. P. Morgan & Co. of New York, on behalf of themselves, and J. S. Morgan & Co. of London, for the purchase of 3,500,000 ounces of standard gold at the price of \$17.8044) per ounce, to be paid for in United States thirty year 4 per cent. bonds."
"Withdrawals of gold again set in, and

The total proceeds of the sale, exclusive of interest, were \$111,105,202.
