The Present Session Ends at Four O'Clock This Afternoon.

TRIAL BY JURY FOR CONTEMPT.

The Bill Limiting the Power of Judges Goes Through the Senate-Under Its Provisions Eugene V. Debs Could Not Have Been Sentenced to Prison Except After a Trial

Washington, June 11.—The senate yestering disposed of the last of the appropriation bills, and fixed 4 p.m. today as the time for final adjournment. After being in session throughout the day a night session was determined upon in order to adjust the many minor differences be-tween the two houses.

tween the two houses.

A number of bills were passed during the day, including the important bill giving trial by jury and other safe guards in prosecution for contempt of court. The measure has been vigorously urged by labor interests, particularly rallroad employes. It is the result of the agitation resulting from the imprisonment of Eugene V. Debs for contempt of an injunction issued at the time of the Chicago strike.

The bill as passed continues the power of summary punishment when an offense is committed in the immediate presence of a judge. But in direct contempt, such as violation of an injunction, the bill pro-

of a judge. But in direct contempt, such as violation of an injunction, the bill provides that the accused shall be given a full hearing, with opportunities to summon witnesses and offer a defense. An amend-ment was made by Mr. Cannon, of Utah, giving the accused the right of trial by piving the accused the right of trial by jury on application. In case of conviction an appeal is provided to the supreme court. Senators Hill, Butler and Peffer supported the bill and Mr. Platt opposed it as revolutionizing the judicial system.

An enormous amount of business was An enormous amount of business was transacted by the house yesterday, in order to clear the desks for the final adjournment. The absence of Mr. Kem permitted members to pass bills in the closing hours in which they were vitally interested. There was a great clamor for recognition. Fifty-three bills and joint resolutions were passed the most investment of which were probably the most important of which was probably the bill appropriating \$200,000 for the trans-Mississippi exposition at Omaha. Mr. Allen, of Mississippi, the wit of the house, enlivened the day with a hu-morous speech. Chairman Cannon, of the appropriations committee, made a gal-lant fight to induce the house to stand out lant fight to induce the house to stand out against the senate public building items in the sundry civil bill, but the members

the sundry civil bill, but the members outvoted him by 100 to 88.

After the conference report on the District of Columbia bill containing its compromise on sectarian charities had been presented. Mr. Cannon precipitated a heated discussion of the political situation, in which Mr. Dockery, of Missouri, and Mr. Dingley, of Maine, participated. The conference report on the District of Columbia bill was adopted. The senate resolution for final adjournment at 4 p.m. lution for final adjournment at 4 p. m. today was passed. The house held a session at 9:30 p. m. to enable the speaker to sign the enrolled bills.

The victory in the joint adjournment resolution, if there be one, rests with the senate, for its dozen amendments to the sundry civil bill making appropriations for public buildings in western cities were accepted gracefully by the house, while house leaders still insisted upon the pre-rogative of their body to originate approprintions. Both factions to the contest over government aid to church institutions claimed to have pravailed in the compromise of the District of Columbia bill, which continued for one more year the disbursals to church charitable institu-tions, coupling the extension with a declaration that the government's policy is to expend no more money in this field.

The men were buried beneath a mass of sand and rock. The steam shovel, which stood on the track, was hurled twenty feet away.

Yang Yu Receives Church Representatives Washington, June 11.—Yang Yu, the Chinese minister to the United States, reecived the members of the Woman's Board of Home Missions of the M. E. church south yesterday afternoon, and the minis-ter's wife accepted a Bible and member-ship pin of the missionary society of the church. This is believed to be the first time a Chinese minister has ever accorded a formal reception to church representatives. The minister, through his interpreter, stated that the missionaries in the Chinese empire had the good will of the emperor and of the educated upper classes, but opposition came from the lower and ignorant classes.

BRADLEY'S ATTITUDE.

Kentucky's Governor Denies Certain Published Statements.

HAS ALWAYS OPPOSED FREESILVER

Has Never Attempted to Make Terms with Major McKinley or Any Political Managers-McKinley Never Wrote Him Urging a "Silver Tinge" Plank.

FRANKFORT, Ky., June 11 .- During the past week statements have been sent out from Washington that Governor W. O. Bradley, who was last year elected gov-ernor of Kentucky on a gold standard platform over a Democratic free silver candifate, had originally been in favor of a compromising policy, and that Governor McKinley had induced him to adopt the gold standard policy, that he has since negotiated with McKinley and other candidates, and this has been followed by stalements purporting to come from Frankfort that Governor Bradley had in his possession letters written him in confidence from various Republicans of national prominence, which he would make public.

It has been intimated that the expected

disclosures would create a great sensation in national politics, and in consequence the governor has been overwhelmed with inquiries on the subject. Concerning these reports Governor Bradley last night made

reports Governor Bradley last night made the following statement:

"I cannot permit the Washington dis-patch to the Chicago Record to pass un-challenged. In response, I deny that I was ever the representative of Mr. Hanna in any way. Nor is it true that my action was ever controlled or governed in the slightest degree by what is politically called in that dispatch the 'Platt-Clark-son crowd.'

"There never was any combination be-

"There never was any combination be-There never was any combination between those gentlemen, or any of them, and myself or any of my friends. I have not attempted to make terms with Mr. McKinley or any of his managers, or with any one of the presidential aspirants or any of their managers. I have not offered to trade sixteen value or any vote for the to trade sixteen votes or any vote for the vice presidency, nor will I be a candidate for vice president, nor would I accept a cabinet position.

"I did write to Mr. McKinley, and at the "I did write to Mr. McKinley, and at the same time wrote to a number of leading Republicans throughout the country concerning the Kentucky campaign. The insimation that I wrote favoring a straddle on the currency question, or that Mr. Mc-Kinley advised me not to pursue such a course, or said that "the silver agitation was the result of hard times, just as the results of hard times, just as the greenback craze was the result of the panie of 1878' is totally false. I did not write him that a majority of the people in Ken-tucky were in favor of free coinage, or that both parties were rapidly drifting that

"My expressed opinion was that the Minneapolis platform was too general, and that the party should make a distinct declaration. My views concerning the curliaration. rency question are too well known to re quire explanation in Kentucky. Week perore the convention assembled the Louisville Critic announced my declaration that I would not accept the nomination on a free silver platform, and I have time and again declared in favor of the gold standard, with every dollar of equal value, and against the free and unlimited colnage of silver.

"I believe that sound currency will be The honor of the republic and the welfare of the people demand its correct solution. It is far above personal success or individ-It is far above personal success or individ-ual advancement, and in this hour of su-preme trial the Republican convention should declare unhesitatingly in favor of the single gold standard. It is no time for quibbling or evasion. We may lose some western states, but this loss will be more than compensated by gains in the old slave border states. But if I thought that such a declaration would cause the that such a declaration would cause the Republican nominee to be defeated I would none the less favor it, for success at the expense of national welfare would be neither creditable nor profitable

"In justice to McKinley I will add that statement in today's Courier-Journal that he wrote me recommending the 'adoption of a plank with a strong free silver tinge' is not true. Neither he nor any one of the gentlemen addressed suggested anything of the kind."
