But it had been raining all day, and a steady drizzle continued all the overhin. Consequently there were only about 5,000 men in line. A flag of Cuba carried in the parade was uproarlously greeted on every bend hand.

Nothing could have been in more striking contrast with the dull, featureless set sion of Tuesday than the brilliant, ani-mated and enthusiastic session of yesterday. The hall was packed to its utinost capacity with spectators keyed to the ligh-ost pitch of enthusiasm, and the high-corr of 12,000 volces as it came thundering down to the pit from the black wall of people on all sides, accompanied with wav-ing of handkerchiefs, made the pulses beat faster






