SENATOR TELLER'S VALEDICTORY.

The Colorado Senator, Followed by Twenty-two Other Delegates, Deserts the Republican Party Rather Than Inforce the Strong Gold Plank of the National Party Platform—The Bolters Will Nominate Teller as a Silver Candidate for the Presidency.

St. Louis, June 19.—The Republican convention began its work yesterday at 10:30 o'clock, at which time President Thurston called the body to order. Without waiting for the delegates to get into their seats he introduced the Rev. John H. Scott, a colored clergyman of Florida, who opened the proceedings with prayer.

Ex-Governor Foraker was then introduced to read the platform, and the announcement of his name produced an out-

## PRISONER TELLS HIS STORY

During His Recital Eisenhower Weeps Bitter Tears, Affecting the Jury.

DEFENSE PRESENTS A STRONG CASE

The Prisoner Tells of the Difficulty Between Himself and William Schwindt at the Former's House—The Case Goes to the Jury.

POTTSVILLE, June 19.

As anticipated from the character of Congressman Brumm's cross-examination of some of the Commonwealth's witnesses in the early stages of the trial of Theodore Eisenhower for the murder of John Schwindt, a big fight has developed in behalf of the defendant on the method by which the doctors attempted to relieve him. New York City has her battle of medical experts in the Fleming poisoning case and Pottsville seems destined to have a contemporaneous battle of surgical experts. Of the two there is no doubt that the latter will excite the greatest interest in this region.

After the prisoner's brother was allowed to leave the stand Miss Lizzie Keithan, of Shenandoah, was called by the defense and testified that in the morning of the day of the shooting Eisenhower, the prisoner, called at Keithan's store in Shenandoah and purchased candy for his little boy, who accompanied him. Miss Keithan did not notice anything peculiar about the man.

### OUTSET OF ADDRESS WHICH CARRIED FOR SEVERAL MINUTES.

After the reading of the platform Mr. Foraker moved its adoption. Senator Teller, of Colorado, here appeared on the platform and was greeted with applause. He moved as a substitute for the financial plank the minority report—a declaration in favor of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at a ratio of 16 to 1.

The name of Teller set the westerners wild. In little scattered squads, the hundreds of delegations who had been sitting under the banners of Colorado, of Idaho, of Utah, of Nevada, California and Montana, and some of those from Tennessee and other western and southern states, were on their feet, waving hats, flags, umbrellas, fans and handkerchiefs, and shrieking like madmen.

The fire spread to the galleries and swept across them until they seemed to be alive. For two or three minutes the uproar continued.

Senator Teller, as he stood on the platform to make his final protest to the Republican party against the adoption of a gold standard policy, was a striking figure. Tall, gaunt, he wore the old fashioned frock coat of the old time statesman. His valedictory to the Republican party, which was frequently interrupted by applause, mingled with hisses, was in substance as follows:

SENATOR TELLER'S VALEDICTORY.  
This plank, or the proposition, was presented to the whole committee, and by it rejected. Loyalty to my own opinion, consideration of great interest that is felt in this country, compels me in the face of unusual difficulties to present this for your consideration, not with that bounding hope or with that courage that I have presented this in other bodies with greater measure of success than I can hope for here. The great and supreme importance of this question is all of my excuse. For the few words that I shall say to you, I represent a state that produces silver, but I want to say to you here

prisoner's sister, was then called to give evidence tending to show that the prisoner was not of sound mind. She testified that after the disturbance at the Eisenhower home on August 3rd, and several times after, the prisoner called at her house and he looked different from what he did before the trouble. He looked sick and wild. At one time he was afraid to go out unless she would go with him. He complained of pains in his head and at times jumped up and said he would have to go outside, or his head would burst.

Witness asked him what was the cause and he said his wife and daughter had driven him out of the house, that the wife had gone back on him, was going with other men and had thrown him out. Witness also stated that the prisoner complained of pains in the head and acted strange eight years ago and from that time she did not consider him of sound mind. On cross-examination Mr. Whalen succeeded in getting the witness to modify her opinion of the prisoner's mind to some extent, but she insisted to the last that his actions appeared quite strange to her after the date of Eisenhower's encounter in his home with William Schwindt.

At the present time there is a strong public opinion that Eisenhower will not be convicted of murder in the first degree. The summing up of the case will be awaited with impatience. Mr. Brumm will make one of the greatest efforts of his life, and it is said that Mr. Whalen will render like service to the Commonwealth.
