

# CONSUL LEE ON CUBA.

An Interesting Letter from Our Representative in Havana.

SPANISH ATROCITIES CONFIRMED.

The Consul General Declares There Is Abundant Evidence to Confirm the Charges-Believes That Peace Cannot be Made Short of Absolute Independence.

WASHINGTON, June 23 .- A very interest-WASHINGTON, June 23.—A very interest-ing letter was received yesterday by a rela-tive from General Fitzhugh Lee. It was written on the 12th, and deals fully with Cuban affairs. The Spanish authorities, the general says, have treated him with great courtesy, and Captain General Wey-ier has granted every request thus far pre-ferred, even allowing him to visit the prisons were the captured Americans are prisons were the captured Americans are confined

Of the Spanish troops, he says, they are fairly well drilled, but under a system of tactics and manual totally different from any the general had ever seen.

As to the insurgents, they practically have control of the island. Their emissaries come in and go out of the towns and cities as they will, and he believes the entire native population is in sympathy with them. As to the inhumanity of the Spanish commanders, General Lee expresses himself in the plainest terms spansa commanders, General Lee expresses himself in the plainest terms. "They do not regard the laws of modern war nor the usages customary among civilized nations at all," he says.

"From every quarter there is the same

testimony concerning the barbarities of the Spanish soldiers. Some of the evi-dence I have heard would be beyond belief did I not know it to be the most reli-able. Violations of women, the plunder of inoffensive citizens, murder, every form of rapine, is the invariable story of prisoners and natives of the Island who happen to be under suspicion, and it takes very little, indeed, here to place you under sus-

pleion."

General Lee doubts if peace will be made now short of a basis of absolute independence and freedom from Spanish control.

Buried in a Fallen Building.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—A three story building occupied as a lodging house at the corner of Fifth street and Mint avenue collapsed, burying several persons in the ruins. The body of a woman has already been recovered, and it is feared there are at least six others in the debris. broke out in the ruins and enveloped all that was left of the structure. Three of the wounded have been rescued. The disaster was caused by workmen engaged in laying the foundation for another building undermining the walls.

Yellow Fever Vessel Quarantined. New York, June 23.—When the British four-masted ship Nile, from Rio Janeiro, reached quarantine last evening, Captain Clark reported that on May 11, Neils Johansen, seaman aged 22 years, died from yellow fever, and on the 16th, John Sloan, sailmaker, of Ginsgow, aged 27 years, died from the same disease. There was no other sickness during the voyage, which lasted forty-one days. The vessel was de-tained in quarantine for disinfection and deansing, and the entire erew were trans forred to Hoffman Island.

Ailsa Defeats Britannia.

LIVERPOOL, June 23.-Britannia, Ailse and Satanita competed yesterday in the regatta of the Royal Jersey Yacht club, off New Brighton, over a fifty mile course and for prizes of \$400 for first and \$100 for second. Allsa was the winner, Britannia coming in second with Satinita a long way astern. It is announced that Emperor William will race the yacht Meteor at Swansea today.

Transvaal Invaders Indicted.

LONDON, June 23.—The grand jury yes-terday found true bills against Dr. Leander Starr Jameson, Major Sir John Will-oughty, Colonel R. White, Colonel F. White and the Hon. Henry F. Country, who were held for trial at the Bow street police court on June 15, charged with violating the neutrality laws by invading the Transvaal republic.

Suicide by Dynamite.

WERR CITY, Mo., June 23 .- John Martwars City, 210., sine 28.—John Marr-solf, one of the oldest and most prominent residents of this city, committed suicide by blowing his head off with a stick of giant powder. He was 57 years old, and for years was a central figure in municipal mining and social affairs.



# HORRIBLY MUTILATED

By the Bursting of a Tram Engine Boiler in Texas.

SEVEN MEN INSTANTLY KILLED.

Six of These Were Decapitated by the Force of the Explosion, and Three Others Were So Seriously Injured That Their Lives Are Despaired Of.

Woodvilla, Tex., June 23.-At Douette, three miles north of Woodville, yes terday the tram engine boller of the Nebraska Lamber company exploded, killing seven men outright and seriously if not fatally injuring three others. It seems that the engineer was just ready to start for the log camp when the explo took place, some six or eight men being in the call. Six of these seven victims had their heads entirely torn from their biddles and were otherwise mutilated beyond

The dead are: A. L. Doucette, president of the Nebraska Lumber company: Grant Hammerly, engineer; Charles Walworth, section foreman; Charles Smith, section hand; Wylie Sargent, mill hand; a man known about the mill as Frenchy, and another unknown man.

another unknown man.
The wounded are: Dan A. Harmon, fireman, arms terribly lacerated and painfully scalded about the face and neck; D. O. Sullivan, section hand, badly scalded. and George Dowling, scalded about the

The reports of just how the terrible accident happened are somewhat conflicting. One report is that the engine had just left One report is that the engine had just left.

men crowded around to get the engine
back when the explosion occurred. Another report says the men were in the calwhen the accident occurred. The engine was what is known as a Shay, with the machinery on one side and the drivers

propelled by cog wheels.

Just what caused the explosion will probably never be known. The water which supplied the engine has been low and muddy and the sediment is supposed. to have caked in the bottom of the boiler until it became dangerous. Another reason given is that the engineer let his water get low, with a hot fire, and turned on the injector. An eye witness says he heard the noise and squatted between the ties and looked. Iron flew through the sky like shot and carried everything in its path. The men who met death never knew what killed them. A sharp report, a rain like patter of iron and it was all over. Six of the dead were buried near the scene of their death and the remains of Mr. Dou-cette were brought here and forwarded to Orange.

Brutally Treated by Robbers.

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., June 23.— Milton Rolley, an aged pensioner, who lives about seven miles from here, came to this city on Saturday and drew 8000 from the bank, in-tending to pay off a mortgage. Soon after he reached his home two men drove up and called him out, requesting him to go at once to the bedside of his dying daughter. American General Killed in Cuba-KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 23.—Advices brought here by messengers from the Isl-and of Cuba report the death of General W. W. Wilson, leader of an American ex-pedition which landed in Cuba on Dec. 8 in order to assist the insurgents. General Wilson is said to have been killed in bat-tle near Guantanamo.
