## CONFEDERATE REUNION.

Men Who Wore the Gray in Convention at Richmond.

GOVERNOR O'FERRALL'S WELCOME.

He Eulogizes Jefferson Davis as a Statesman Whom Posterity Will Honor-General Gordon's Touching Tribute to the Veterans of the Southern Armies.

RICHMOND, Va., July 1.—The Confederate reunion opened yesterday with charming weather. An immense throng is present, and the exposition grounds, where the convention is held in a large au-ditorium erected for the purpose, is crowded. The auditorium is handsomely decorated. As General Gordon showed his face on the rostrum a mighty cheer went up and the battle scarred veteran reelved an evation.

Before the convention was called to or-der General Gordon was presented with a gavel made from a tree from the battle-field of Chicamauga. Rev. J. William Jones offered forvent prayer to the God of Lee and Jackson and Davis. General Gordon, without making a speech, intro-duced Governor O'Ferrall, who on behalf

of Virginia welcomed the veterans. He paid an eloquent tribute to Jefferson Davis, concluding as follows:

"In calmer years, when the last ember of sectional feeling has burned out, and the last cord of love has gently bound the hearts of all Americans together, fathers will have their thin little will be the property of the cord." will bring their little children to this spot and tell them the stary of a pure, great man, who suffered for his people and for the right as they understood it, and how for this they loved him as they loved no other. Long as yonder noble river shall roll its tide to the sea it shall behold no man more kingly. May the story of his life be sweet in days to come, and at last all men come to understand Jefferson

While Governor O'Ferrall was speak ting Wade Hampton came in and was speaking Wade Hampton came in and was presented by General Gordon. He was received with cheers, lasting several minutes. At the conclusion of the governor's address Mayor Richard M. Taylor delivered an address of welcome on behalf of the city of Blehmond.

General Gordon Introduced General Peyton Wise to turn over to the veterans the building in which the convention is being held. General Wise made an eloquent ad-dress in performing this task. Several times during the day there had been calls for a speech from General Hampton. When General Wise gook his seat the calls were

General Wise took his seat the calls were renewed, and the South Carolinian walked to the front of the stage.

The band struck up "Dixie," while the whole audience arose and applanded. A voteran was passed to the front bearing an old battleflag that had been shot through in many places and waved it be-fore the vast assemblage. When General Hampton was permitted to speak some one cried "Londer, londer."

"I used to be able to speak lond enough

"I used to be able to speak loud enough to make you charge," replied General Hampton. Words, he said, could not ex-press his gratifude for the great honor which had been done him. He had come to mingle with the veterans, perhaps for the last time, and do honor to the mem-ory of that great man, President Davis. The general said he would be still fight-ing now if the Confederate flag were waying. He had no apology to make for his course. When his state called upon him

course. When his state called upon him he went into war as a private and served his country as best he could. General Gordon responded to the address of welcome and received the building on behalf of the veterans. He spoke in part as follows:

"You will not wonder that I am liter-ally overwhelmed by the flood of emotions which this scene evokes. As we look upon the grizzled locks and furrowed brows of these men who thirty years ago were sol-diers of an army which they immortalized by their deeds how utterly lindequate are the words of our lips to express the emo-tions of our hearis. Let me say to those gentlemen who in the name of this great people bid us welcome that full and cordial as is our appreciation of this splen did reception, we are in no sense surprised at its princely munificence. We are not at its princely munificence. surprised, because we know Virginia and Virginians

The museum is the building formerly the White House of the Confederacy. So great was the crowd that all could not enter the house, and the two ladies bowed their acknowledgments from the windows.
