DEATH OF MRS. STOWE.

Writer of the Famous Slave Story, "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

ONE OF A REMARKABLE FAMILY.

Phenomenal Spocess of Her Greatest Work, Which Paid Her. \$400,000 in Boyaities, She Being Too Poor at the Outset to Share the Expense of Publication.

HARTFORD, July 2. - Mrs. Harriet Beecher. Stowe, the gifted authoress of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," "Dred" and other works of world wide reputation, died at her home. No. 73 Forest street, yesterday, without regaining consciousness. She passed peace-fully away, as though into a deep sleep. By her bedside at the time were her son, the Rev. Charles Stowe, of Simsbury; her two daughters, Eliza and Harriet; her sis-ter, Mrs. Isabella Bescher Hooker, and her husband, the Hon. John Hooker; Dr. Edward B. Hooker, her nephew, who was her medical attendant, and other relatives.

Mrs. Stowe's malady of many years' continuance, a mental trouble, took an acute form on Friday, when congestion of the brain with partial paralysis appeared. During Friday, Saturday and Sunday Mrs. Stowe was about the house, but suffering very much. Since Monday morning she has been confined to her bed, and on Tuesday afternoon she became unconscious.

Mrs. Stowe's body will be taken to Andover, Mass., tomorrow. The burial will be in the cemetery connected with the Andover Theological seminary, where Mrs. Stowe's husband, Professor Calvin E.

Stowe, and her son Henry are buried.

It was the good fortune of Dr. Lyman Beecher, the most famous Congregational elergyman of his time, and one of the most eloquant pulpit orators of any age, to be the parent of several children who were to shed greater justre upon the family name even than that which he himself conferred upon it. The best known of these were Henry Ward, Harrier, Thomas, Catherine and Edward. Of these, Catherine was born in 1800, Edward in 1804, Harriet in in 1813, Henry Ward in 1813 and Thomas in 1824. The most celebrated were Henry Ward and Harriet.

Harrist Beecher Stowe's birthplace was Litchfield, Conn., and on June 15, she en-



THE LATE HARBIET RESCHER STOWN. tered the 85th year of her life. At the age of 15 Harrier became associated with her elder sister, Catherine, in the charge of a female seminary at Harrford, Conn., havfemale seminary at Hartford, Conn., hav-ing previously studied there under Cath-erine's care. In 1853 she accompanied her father, who had been elected president of Lanc Theological semisary, to Cincinnati. Associated with her father was Rev. Cal-vin E. Stowe, professor of Biblical litera-ture—a man of culture and of learning. In 1854 Professor, Stowe and Herriet In 1836 Professor Stowe and Harriet Beecher were married. In 1850 she removed with her husband

and family to Brunswick, Mc., where Mr. Stowe had been called to a professorship in Bowdoin college. At this time the northern states were in a frenzy of excitement over the passage of the fuglitive slave law, and it was during this excitement that Mrs. Stowe wrote "Uncle Tom's Cablar," upon which her fame rests. Nearly 500,000 copies of the work were sold in the

five years following its publication. It has been translated into eighteen languages.

The story was fifst published in installments in The National Era, and when it was finished Mrs. Stowe was the proud possessor of \$300 she had received for writ-ing it. John P. Jewett, a Boston publisher, had noticed it and offered to publish it. He proposed to pay a half share in the profits if the author would share in the expense of publication, but Professor Stowe regarded this too much of a hazard for people so poor, and a royalty of 10 per cent, was accepted instead. The receipts from the sale of the book were enormous, and it is said that Mrs. Stowe was paid over \$400,000 during her life for her literary ork and for royalties on the play.
"Uncle Tom's Cabin" was dramatized

soon after its publication in book form, and was performed at many of the leading theaters of this country and Europe. It was presented in various ways over 7,000 times, and it is said that no play has been given as often.

Polish Quarry Strikers Resist a Sheriff's Pesse.

ONE OF THE MOB FATALLY HURT.

Women Take a Hand in the Conflict, and Drive Out the Workmen Who Had Taken the Strikers' Places.-Militia Called Upon to Aid the Sheriff.

Westview, O., July 2 .- Over a hundred shots were exchanged by deputy shoriffs and strikers yesterday at the Beren stone quarries. No one was killed so far as now known. One striker had his leg broken in two places, and many have sore heads as the result of a hand to hand con-flict. The strikers approached the quarries through the woods with the avowed in-tention of driving out the non-union men at work. They were met by the sheriff and forty deputies, who commanded them to stop. For an answer the strikers began firing and the fight then became general. The strikers were finally repulsed and fell back to the woods.

While the strikers were at Westview the women in overwhelming numbers took the quarry by storm and drove out the workmen with elubsand strong language. The sheriff was at Westview with all but a handful of his deputies, and in conse-quence the women had full sway. When the news reached them that some of the strikers had been injured at Westview the women were beside themselves with rage, and were only kept in check by the large number of citizens that were hastily sumnumber of citizens that were mastry sum-momed from the village.
