

Impressive Ceremonies at the Laying of the Corner Stone.

BIG PARADE OF CONFEDERATES.

Thousands Cheer the Veterans as They Pass in Review Through Richmond's No Other Medicines Receive Daily Crowded Streets-Heat Compelled Many Old Soldiers to Retire from the Parade.

RICHMOND, Va., July 3.—The corner-stone of the monument to be creeted in Monroe Park to the memory of Jefferson Davis was laid yesterday afternoon with ceremonies which were impressive and pathetic. Under a bright sun and sky, through densely packed streets, and with the applause of countless thousands to cheer them on, the followers of the lost cause marched through the city which is dearer to the old Confederate than any other in the land. It was a sight to stir the enthusiasm of the most sluggish nature, as with bands playing, companies moving and colors flying, the parade passed in section.

Two hundred children, boys and girls, Two hundred children, boys and girls, wearing white and red sashes followed the police, who cleared the way and led the procession. The chief marshal, General Gordon, in civilian dress, looked a royal commander, as did Governor O'Ferrall, who rode with bared head. Mrs. Jefferson Davis was in an open carriage and bowed and smiled as the cheers greeted her on every side. The superior and makes her on every side. The sponsors and maids of honor, chosen for their beauty from all the southern states, rode in carriages fol-lowing that of Mrs. Davis.

The military under command of Briga-dier General Phillips represented the pick of southern soldiers. North Carolina was the first state to exhibit a tattered battle-flag, and as it fluttered in the breeze it

was greeted with great cheers.

The veterans made the pathetic feature of the parade. Nearly all old, and for the most part weak and feeble, but summoning their weak and recon, on summor-ing their remaining strongth, they mare het with pride and pleasure, cheered on by the spectators. A large number of them car-ried sticks for support, and many were compelled to use umbrellas in order to withstand the rays of the sun. On the backs of the marchers were many buller torn Confederate coats, old canteens and knapsacks. Several darkies, true to their old masters, marched with them in the parade.

It was a grand parade and a great spec-tacle, one not likely to be seen again for years. From 1:45 to 3:40 o'clock veterans, sons of veterans and military passed the city hall. The column moved very slowly, owing to the age and disabilities of many of the marchers. From the military down to the negro cooks who brought up the rear the parade was an imposing and inspiring speciacle. It was estimated that 15,000 men and children started in the parade, but a large number were affected by the heat, and withdrew before they had marched many blocks.

When the procession reached the park the military formed a square around the grounds, preventing any lat those in the parade from entering the inclosure. The grand lodge of Masons, escorted by the Knights Templar, marched to the park where the corner stone was laid with Masonic ceremonies. Prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. George H. Ray. At the close of the Masonic exercises the Howltzers out the Alsonic exercises the Howitzers out on the Lee monument grounds fired a su-late of thirteen guns. Hon H. J. Taylov Ellison, president of the Davis Monument association, then called on Bishop John-son C. Grauberry to offer prayer, after which General Stephen D. Lee was intro-duced as the orator of the occasion. The benefiction closed the averages. benediction closed the exercises.

Troops Called Out to Suppress Disorder in Cleveland.

ONE OF THE STRIKERS KILLED,

He Was Shot by a Non-Unionist Who Had Been Attacked by the Mob, and This Incident Led to the Calling Out of the Mil-

CLEVELAND, July 3.—The strike at the Brown Holsting company's works has reached a point where the authorities as well as the strikers are in no mood for trilling. When the non-union men left the works at 5 o'clock last evening there was rioting. Two hundred and fifty pollecement emerged from the gates, guarding fifty-three workmen. An immense crowd has guthered a block away, but the pullectook a new route and cluded them for the moment.

Patrolman Gibbons heard the shot fired, and rushing up seized young Saunders and burried him into the office of the Bishop-Babcock company. In a wonder-fully short space of time a furious crowd. which packed the streets as far as the eye could reach, surged against the front of the office, demanding that Saunders is given up to it. Some one brought a rope, and the cry to lynch him was raised. A few began to pry at the windows of the office, when Patrolman Gibbons, who was once a union working, addressed the mob-and partly quieted it. Two patrol wagon leads of police arrived, and a guard was posed in front of the building.

Long before this Mayor McKleson, Po-

lice Director Abbott, Lientenant Colonel Whitney, of the Fifth regiment, and others were gathered for consultation in the city hall. Word of the critical condition of affairs was telephoned to them from the Bishop-Babcock office and a request for militia The mayor responded by order ing the Cleveland City Guards and Company F to the scene of the riot.

The guards arrived first, just as the mob-was preparing for another effort to cap-ture Saunders. As the soldiers came down the street the mob-shrieked and howled. and the guards were compelled to open a way for themselves with leveled bayonets. Several men and boys were wounded slightly by the soldiers. The guards formed in front of the office, and just then Company F was seen coming.

Amid a frenzy of excitement on the part and a really of excitement on the part of the dense crowd, a pairol wagen was backed to the door of the office and Saunders was jerked into it and made to lie on the bottom. The guards formed around it with bayoners at "charge," and they forced their way to the Central police really of the house of the house of the control police. station, part of the howling mob surging along with them. Saunders, whose head is badly out up and his body a mass of brutses, is a prisoner, charged with the killing of Rettger.

Company F. in command of Major Lie-bich, marched to the center of the crowd that remained behind. The soldiers were menaced and jeered. Major Liebich halfod his mon, drew his revolver and declared that upon the slightest attempt at violence he would give the command to fire. After that the noise ceased and the crowd scattered, the company returning to quarters.

The mayor caused a proclamation de-claring the riot act to be in force to be posted in the neighborhood of the Brown works this morning.
