Happenings Throughout the Region Chronicled for Hasty Perusal.

The Mt. Carmel post-office has been raised from the third to second class.  
William Nelwenter, the liveryman, is having electric call bells placed throughout his stables.  
John L. Hassler, the painter, was to-day engaged in lettering the new Wilkinson building, corner Main and Lloyd streets.  
The new cycle track at Hazleton seems to be an assured fact. Thus far no riders have signified their willingness to purchase season tickets at \$5 per year.

Gordon will have a parade under the auspices of the Jr. O. U. A. M., to-morrow. In the afternoon bicycle races will be a feature of the celebration.  
Next Monday John Sager, of Hazleton, will ship 25 pigeons to Gainesville, Ga., to be released at that place next Friday for flight back to Hazleton, a distance of 600 miles.  
A cow at Upper Lehigh rolled down into a mine and reached terra firma after being driven a mile and a half along a gangway and up a slope. The animal only sustained a broken horn.

The Reading State League team and the Hamburg team crossed bats at West End park, Ashland, to-day.

School Superintendent W. F. Harpel, of Shamokin, was married Wednesday to May Elizabeth Steadman, at Orange, N. J. Miss Steadman was formerly teacher of art and modern languages at the Shamokin High school.
