PERSONAL.

Important to Health Boards. Judge Albright yesterday at Allentown rendered a decision which is of general interest to the public, and of special interest to the Boards of Health and Councils.

The facts in the case were set forth in the court's opinion as follows: "The family of Mr. Hoppie were quarantined by the city, because a member of the family had a contagious disease, and all the inmates were forbidden to leave the house; that Mr. Hoppie was unable to follow his usual occupation and procure the means of a livelihood for himself and family, the Board of Health directed the procurement of the groceries, the price of which is here claimed from the plaintiff for the Hoppie family, and that said goods were necessary to maintain and support the family."

Judge Albright reasoned that "it must be held that the municipality is bound to pay for said provisions. By virtue of the police power delegated by the State to the municipality, the latter has the undoubted right to isolate and confine persons because of the existence of contagious diseases. Humanity and preservation of life are the basis of such right. The same grounds forbid that those who for the benefit of their neighbors are detained in their dwellings and prevented from procuring food and other things necessary to sustain life shall furnish."

"It can be laid down as a rule that in this age and in this land the right to confine a human being imposes the duty of supplying him with necessary food while deprived of his liberty. There being no express power to pay a claim of this nature, it was the part of prudence of the city authorities to decline to approve an expenditure of this kind. It was a proper case to submit for judicial decision."

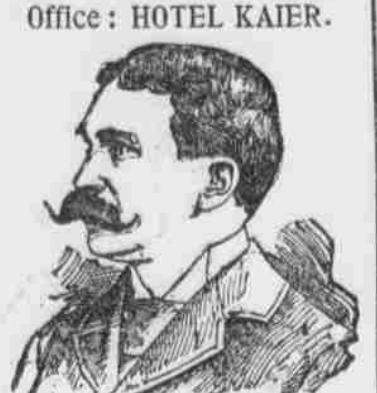
