

Judge Simonton, of Harrisburg, has handed down three opinious in contested fee cases that concern every committing Magistrate and Constable in the State. The suits were brought by Alderman Landis and Constables Diehl and Winters'against the Commissioners of Dauphin County to settle questions arising over the fee bill passed by the Legislature in 1893, and which is now in force in this State, and all questions were decided in favor of the county. Alderman Landis' suit was whether for issuing a warrant for three persons he was entitled to charge for three or for only one. The Court decided in favor of but one. A similar decision was made in the Diehl case. In the case of ex-Constable Winters different questions were involved. He claimed a fee for a recommitment after a hearing, and, in making a trip of two miles, charged for four, counting two miles for a return trip. Neither of these claims was




