### BRYAN AT CENTRALIA.

The Candidate's Reception There Almost a Failure.

GROWDED OUT BY REPUBLICANS.

The City Park Had Been Engaged by a Senatorial Condidate, and Mr. Beyon Was Compelled to Leave Early, After Making a Speech.

Centralia, Ills., July 15.—For some reason the ovation that was to have been given to William J. Bryan here has night was almost a failure. Scarcely 300 people were at the station when the train bearing Mr. Bryan and his wife pulled in. A club of Democratic votors arrived from Nashville with a band about 7.30, and a few inlimites later one came in from Fairfield, but they added scarcaly 200 people to the crowd. To make matters worse the place selected for Mr. Bryan to meet the crowd was at the city park, which had already been engaged by William E. Mason, a Republican candidate for the United States senate from this state. On this account Mr. Bryan and his friends had to vacate before 8 o'clock. Governor Altgeld vacate before 8 o'clock. Governor Altgeld was not there, and does not seem to have been invited, though it was announced by

was coming.

It was originally intended by Mr. Bryan and his wife to quietly visit this place where Mr. Bryan has many relations. There was to have been a sort of reunion.

There was to have been a sort of reunion of the Bryan family of Marion county. It was, however, decided by Mr. Bryan to give the visit and reunion up. The people here heard that he was coming, and he was urged not to disappoint them.

The train which brought Mr. Bryan here arrived at 5 %5 o'clock. Mr. and Mrs. Bryan were hurried through the crowd to a carriage in waiting. Captain S. L. Dwight met them and took them to his home. Mrs. Dwight is a consin of Mr. Bryan. At the home of Captain Dwight there was an informal reception to the hadies of Centralia, who were presented to the nogaines and his wife. There were several hundred women there, and the af-

The visiting party was then taken to the city park. Preceding the carriage in which Mr. and Mrs. Bryan rode was a brassbard, and following were several hundred citizens on foot. "It matters not whather you believe in the restoration of silver or in a gold standard. You must admit that the seatlement of the money question is of the first and prestest importance. When that is done other things can be considered. On the money question the two great parties have taken continued. taken positions directly opposite to each other. Four years ugo the positions taken by the Republican and Democratic parties on the money question were identical.

"As this campaign approaches the two

great parties line themselves up on this great question. The Republican party at St. Leuis declared that the gold standard should be maintained until it could be changed by international agreement. That platform does not say that the gold stand-ard is a good thing, because that platform pledges the party to get rid of the gold standard and substitute for it something better as soon as it can be done. This better substitute could not be received until the world should help. The Demo-cratic party declared itself unalterably opposed to a single gold standard. We also declared that the silver dollar should be legal tender for all debts, public and pri-vate, and that such legislation should be enacted as is beceasing to prevent for the future the demonstration of any kind of legal tender money.

The issue is drawn, and we have our the issue is drawn, and we have our choice in this campaign between an American joople and an English financial system to be forced upon us. Those who believe in running this government upon the European plan should go and legislate with the Republican party. If the gold standard is a good thing why ought we to try to get rid of it! If it is a bad thing why should we keep it until some other nation helps

we keep it until some other nation helps us to get rid of it?

"We who stanil upon the platform adopted at Chiengo do not come to you as suppliants legging for your votes. These votes are your own. You are free men, and no man should stand in the attitude of petitioning for a free man to do any-thing but what is according to his our science, but we come before you standing upon a platform and pledging its enforcement if elected, and we beg you to study the questions presented by the issues in-volved, and then let your ballets register

a free man's will."

There was tremendous applause when Mr. Bryan ceased speaking. Even these who had come to hear Mr. Mason joined in the demonstration of apparent approval. The visitors were then escorted to a carriage and amid the peals of bands driven to the railway station where they took the

Alleged Attempt to Assassinate M. Faure, of France.

ESCAPED WITHOUT A SCRATCH
