The Chartered South Africa Company Supplied the Funds.

CEUIL RHODES KNEW ALL ABOUT IT.

The Report of the Select Committee of the Cape Colony House of Assembly Shows That Bhodes, Though an African Premier, Encouraged the Raid.

CAPETOWN, July 20.—The select com-

Carerown, July 20.—The select committee of the house of assembly of Cape Colony to impuire into the circumstances of the Jameson raid has made a report. It fluds that Cecil Rhodos was fully acquainted with the preparations for the raid, and that Africa Gelt, director in the South Africa company, Dr. Jameson, the administrator for the company in Rhodesia, and Dr. Rutherford Harris, sceretary for the company at Capetown, were active premoters of the raid. It also finds that Dr. Jameson personally obtained from Johannesburg a letter of invitation for his raiders to come fully a month before the raiders to come fully a month before the ostensible date. There was no evidence addition to show

There was no evidence addited to show that Ceell Rhodes intended that the Pitsani force should invade the Transvati unluvited, but at the same time there was an absence of any peremptory command from Mr. Rhodes to prevent the raid. Mr. Rhodes and Dr. Harris drafted a belegram containing such a command, but it was never dispatched, not even when the wires (cut by Dr. Jameson's orders) were restored. stored

The committee, therefore, cannot acquit Mr. Cecil Rhedes of responsibility. Mr. Rhodes never informed his colleagues of the raid. Sir Herenbes Robinson, governor of Cape Colony, and Sir Jacobus Dewett, British agent at Preteria, alone sent telegrams to arrest Dr. Jameson's CURE

The Chartered South Africa company, the committee finds supplied all the funds for the raid with the knowledge of its London office. Cecil Rhodes afterwards refunded this amount to the company.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—For the pur-pose of diverting the great bulk of ten trade-from the Suczroute and from the trade from the Sucz route and from the Puget wand ports to San Francisco, and with the idea of making this city the distributing center for the whole country in so far as the traffic in that commodity is concerned, the Southern Pacific company and its connections, the Union Pacific alone excepted, has joined in a movement which is calculated to seriously disturb the traffic conditions which have for years past enabled New York to hold the ten trade of the United States. Freight rates on tea will in a few days be reduced to little more than one-half of what they are today.

DEFEAT OF SPANIARDS

Signal Victory of the Forces Under General Antonio Maceo.

HE LED HIS FOES INTO A TRAP.

Insurport Forces Surrounded the Govern Buchi Troops and Compelled a Surpender Muceo Declares That, Properly Armed. He Could End the War in Two Mouths,

Kay Wgar, Fla. July 30 - The Span lards, under General Suares Inclan, have sustained a crushing defeat at the hands of the insurgents under Antonio Macoo secording to advices received by the Cuban revolutionary leaders in this city. Not only was Inchin's column defeated with heavy loss, but the Cuban leaders are informed that it is currently reported in Havana that the Spanish general himself was captured and is now held as a prisoner by Maceo.
The battle is said to have occurred on

The battle is said to have occurred on July 15, near Masco's stronghold in the province of Finar del Rio. For the last two weeks the insurgents have been very aggressive, and small parties have repeat-odly attacked the trocha, oausing the Spaniards much annoyance. General In-cian was ordered to drive back these de-tacked bands of insurance and for the

cian was ordered to drive back these de-teched lands of insurgents, and for this purpose took with him 2,000 men.

Maceo seems to have expected such a movement, and arranged to another the Spaniards. He stationed a large force in a favorable position and ordered his de-tached hands to draw Inclan into the trap. The Spaniards followed the insurgent akirmishers incantiously and fell into the ambush.

amoush.

Then the Cubans opened fire from all sides, which threw the Spaniards into confusion. While the Spaniards were thus disordered the Cubanscharged, completely routing their foes. General Inclan made a desperate effort to rally his demoralized

forces, but was surrounded by the Cubans and compelled to surrender.

It is said in Havana, according to the revolutionists hore, that the Spaniards were pursued almost to the trochs, and lost more than 300 men killed and wound ed. There were fourteen officers among the killed. Cubans here also say that Ma ose will hold Inclan as a hostage to save the lives of prominent insurgent officerwho have been captured by the Symmuchs. One of these officers is Capote. If this robel lender is shot by the Spaniards it is sald Inclan will meet the same fate at the hands of Macco.
