

WORSE THAN FIRST REPORTED.

In the Trolley Car Accident Near Columbin Six People Were Killed and Sixtytwo Injured-The Coroner's Jury to Make a Thorough Investigation.

COLUMBIA, Pa., Aug. 11.—The fatal trolley car accident near this city Sunday night was far more disastrons than first reports indicated. There were about ninety presongers aboard, who became panic stricken when they realized that the car was beyond control. The hill was a long one, and every moment the runaway gathered additional speed, until it is estimated by those on board that it was running fully a mile a minute when it struck a sharp curve and left the track. It ran across the turnpike running parallel with the trolley road, and struck against a tros and then toppled over into a deep ditch, being turned upside down. To add to the horror of the situation there was no light of any kind until some time after the

The first body taken out was that of Henry Smith, an iron worker of Colum-bia, who had been instantly killed by a piece of wood, which pieced his head. Adam Foeblinger, the motorman, was found a few moments later under the car, having been crushed to death. He had stuck to his post to the last, and met death in a noble effort to avert the catastrophe. William H. Pinkerton, boy, Columbia, was also instantly killed.

HIS RECEPTION IN PITTSBURG.

(8) It Amazes the Inhabitants of the "Smoky City," and Causes the Candidate to Remark That the "Wild East" Has Succecifed the "Wild West,"

PITTERIORO, Aug. 11.—The trip of Wil-Pitrasic no, Aug. II.—The trip of Wil-liam J. Bryan from Chicago to Pitrsburg was a continuous ovation. At every sta-tion where the train stopped crowds of people were in waiting to greet the candi-date. Wherever the train stopped long enough to permit it the Nebraska craises was obliged to yield to demands for a speech and to submit to a hand shaking orded. The resention accorded Mr. Bryan ordeal. The reception accorded Mr. Bryan in this city proves a fitting capsheaf of the day's triumph. It has excited the annæment of the people of Pittaburg, and the joy that it has afforded Mr. Bryan and the redoubtable "Silver Dick" Bland has manifested itself in their beaming features

since they struck the city limits.

The exceptionally large train on the Pennsylvania Central, which it was almost impossible to traverse during the last 199 miles because of the numerous committees and enthusiasts who had boarded and spread themselves out over the carriages, ran into the Pittsburg depot at 5:50 p. m. When they entered their carriages the relentless throng closed around them and seemed to bear them along at its will.

Through the various streets traversed Through the various streets traversed no available space could be discerned. Every fost of ground along the way was occupied by enthusiasts. When the Central hotel was reached a cordon of police trai hotel was reached a curdon of police was stationed at the main entrance and formed a narrow passageway leading to the stairense. No one was allowed to tread it unless he could show unmistakable credentials. There were police on the stairs, police in the halls, police at the dining room door and everywhere else where men and women might used to go, and even at and women might seek to go, and even at the door, of Mr. Bryan's room. While Mr. and Mrs. Bryan were suppling with a committee of fadies and gentlemen the streets resounded with the continuous clamor from thousands of throats. Many marching clubs piercod the stubborn crowds, andd showers of pyrotechnics and a roar that would have rivaled Ninerara's thun-

The evening meeting had been announced to occur at 8 o'clock in the Grand Opera House and the Avenue theater, kindred halls, side by side, and owned by the same parties. Each hall will seat be-tween 2,500 and 3,000, and meetings were to be held in each.
